Pioneers Gather, Swap Yarns About Littlefield When . . .

Approximately 350 Lamb County settlers and many of their children gathered at the Country Club Tuesday afternoon and laughed with one another about the days when Littlefield was little — and mighty lively.

All of the pioneers had lived in the county before 1930. Several of the older settlers recalled the days when Littlefield consisted of one store and a house here and there.

Registration began at 2 p. m. and was followed by a "reminiscing period" during which the old timers shook hands with one another, chatted and looked back through the years.

Gus Shaw, who has been president of the organization during the past year, called the meeting to order and outlined the program for the afternoon.

He announced the names of the members who had been chosen earlier by a nominating committee to be elected as officers of the organization.

A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to elect all officers nominated by acclamation.

Simon D. Hay of Sudan, who was named president, announced that he was resigning in favor of Judge R. C. Hopping of Lubbock.

Other officers elected were Mrs. A. C. Barton of Springlake, treasurer; Mrs. Lester LaGrange of Amherst, vice-president; Mrs. Guy Willis of Littlefield, secretary; Mrs. Sid Hopping of Littlefield, custodian of the scrapbook; Mrs. Ray Blessing of Amherst, Mrs. T. L. Hinson of Spring Lake, George Bohner of Olton, Lon Campbell of Littlefield and Mrs. Simon D. Hay of Sudan, directors.

After the election of officers, the pioneers dispersed to rest, talk and drink cold drinks.

Before a broadcast of the program was made, several old timers were called to the speakers stand to relate stories of the past and to express their feeling about the reunion. Among them were Mayor Art Chesher and Pat Boone.

First Settler In County Tells Of Early Life Here

Among the old settlers attending the Lamb County Pioneers Reunion at the Country Club Tuesday was Judge E. N. Burrus, 79, of Olton, who has been a resident of this county since January 1, 1900. Even before that date—in 1897 and 1898—he was a cowboy in this area.

Judge Burrus claims to be the first settler and to have built the first house in Lamb County. All the way from Estelline he hauled the lumber of which the house was constructed.

RAISES FIRST BALE OF COTTON

Judge Burrus also has the distinction of having raised the first bale of cotton in Lamb County. He grew the cotton in 1903 and hauled it to Hockley county. He was paid two or three cents per pound.

In reporting this instance to the Leader representative Tuesday, he stated that, "when I got home I turned the cows in on the rest of it."

HAS TWO SONS

Judge Burrus married Miss Dorey Walling in 1898 at Floydada, to which union were born two sons, Roy Burrus of Hart, Texas, and Paul Burrus of four miles southwest of Olton.

Roy, born in November, 1900, is said to be the first child born in Lamb County. He operates a gin and grain elevator at Hart, Texas. Paul Burrus farms four miles southwest of Olton.

Judge Burrus unfortunately fell and broke his leg about three years ago, but has recovered nicely from that accident.

Roy Burrus has one son, Roy Neal, of Hart; and Paul Burrus has three children, two sons and one daughter. They are Ed and Charlie T. Burrus, and Naomi Ann Burrus. They live on the old Burrus farm four miles southwest of Olton.

**Reminiscences**

20 Years Ago



Work will be underway immediately in the construction of a \$75,000 school plant for the Spade Community.

This project will be located six miles east, one half mile north and six miles east of Littlefield and will form an important unit of a town in the making known as Spade which is just getting underway. Already there is a grocery and filling station; a modern gas is under construction; and several other projects are contemplated.

New residents of Littlefield are enthusiastic in their praise of the city and district.

Included in the large group of new residents are: A. F. Amel and L. M. Blair, owners of the Eagle Drug Store, which they purchased recently. They came to Littlefield from Clovis, N. M., where they were connected with a large drug concern.

Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock Miss Mercedes Allen of Anton was united in marriage to Carl D. Williams, this city, the ceremony taking place at the home of the groom's mother, Mrs. E. H. Williams. Rev. Jess Mitchell officiating. The bride is the accomplished daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Allen of Anton.

Work is underway on the erection of a cotton gin, which is being moved to the Oklahoma Flat Community, 14 miles southwest of Littlefield. The gin is being moved from Duncan, Okla., by the Valley Gin Company of that place, and will be managed by Mr. Howell, formerly of Duncan.

Littlefield and Lamb County settled down to routine matters this week after two days in which most everybody gave their major attention to voting, then to determine the success or failure at the poles of the large number of candidates for precinct and county offices. Outstanding interest was also manifested in the state contests.

In the county contests there will be runoffs for county attorney, county clerk, tax collector, tax assessor, county treasurer, and superintendent of schools.

The second primary will take place August 25.

There will not be runoffs for county judge and sheriff. Judge Simon D. Has, incumbent, eliminated his opponent, C. W. Renge. In the race for sheriff G. E. (Bob) Crim eliminated his two opponents, J. L. (Lem) Irwin, incumbent, and O. H. Brown.

The runoff for various county offices will be between the following:

For county attorney between J. E. Dryden and Herbert C. Martin; for county clerk between J. W. (Jake) Hopping and A. H. McGarock; for tax collector between T. L. Matthews and Gaston Patterson; for tax assessor between Ray Gilbert and A. A. Wayne; for county treasurer between M. M. (Jimmie) Brittain and Miss Bessie Bellamy; for county superintendent of schools, between L. D. Rochelle and Susie C. Rowe.

Littlefield's new two-story \$38,000 city hall, which is under construction in city park, will be occupied early in September.

Though no definite action has been taken in the matter, it is probable that a formal opening will be held. This event, it is believed, would bring several thousand people to Littlefield.

Erection of the building was started 90 days ago and marked progress has been made by Albert Neuenackwander, of Littlefield, the general contractor. Practically all exterior work has been done, and there remains very little interior work.

Burke & Co. of Lubbock are the architects.

Littlefield is to have a new department store about September 1. The new business will be established by Tom Cobb, owner of Cobb's Department Store at Brownfield, and will be located in the building, which has just been

vacated by Hogan's Department Store.

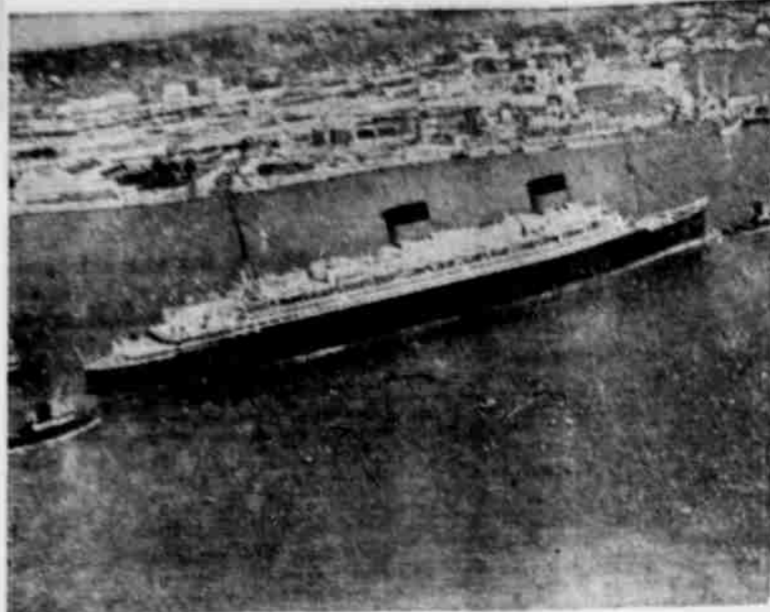

either case, recall orders will in-  
dicate where reservists should re-  
port.

If a delay is not requested, a  
reservist will be allowed 10 days  
plus travel time to settle his af-  
fairs and report for duty. Orders  
will be sufficient authority for ob-  
taining government transportation  
requests to assigned stations. The  
U. S. Army & U. S. Air Force  
recruiting station at 110 West 5th  
Street in Littlefield is authorized  
to supply reservists called to ac-  
tive duty with the required trans-  
portation requests within the  
Lamb county area.

Recall is effected as follows:  
a. First Air Force, Mitchel AFB,  
Hempstead, L. I., N. Y.; b. Fourth  
Air Force, Hamilton AFB, San  
Rafael, Cal.; c. Tenth Air Force,  
Selfridge, AFB, Mt. Clemens,  
Mich.; d. Fourteenth Air Force,  
Robins AFB, Macon, Ga.

Each officer or airman is di-  
rected to report to either the reg-  
ular established parent organiza-  
tion to which he belongs, or to  
one of the following processing  
stations: a. Portland Municipal  
Airport, Portland, Ore.; b. Hamil-  
ton AFB, San Rafael, Cal.; c.  
Brooks AFB, San Antonio, Texas;  
d. Chanute AFB, Rantaul, Ill.; e.  
Francis E. Warren AFB, Chey-  
enne, Wyo.; f. Scott AFB, Belle-  
ville, Ill.; Keosler AFB, Biloxi,  
Miss.; h. Langley AFB, Hampton,  
Va.; i. Fort Dix, N. J.

Realizing that immediate recall  
of certain community and national  
interests in others, the following  
types and categories of AF reser-  
vists are eligible for recall delay:  
1. Individuals enrolled in educa-  
tional institutions. 2. Those en-  
gaged in research and scientific  
activities. 3. Students of profes-  
sional graduate courses in dental,  
veterinary or medical colleges or  
performing first year of medical  
internship. 4. Individuals engaged  
in certain critical civilian occupa-  
tions or essential activities,  
identified as such by the Depart-  
ment of Labor or Commerce. 5.  
Hardship and dependency cases

identified as such by existing AF  
regulations. 6. Key managerial  
personnel whose call to duty would  
cause material loss of production,  
services, or research necessary to  
the national health, safety or in-  
terest.

In cases where delay is sought  
on the basis of a critical occupa-  
tion or participation in an essen-  
tial activity, an individual must  
produce a statement from his em-  
ployer or school office testifying  
as to his occupational or scholas-  
tic status.

If, after receipt of recall orders,  
an individual feels it essential that  
his call to active duty be tempo-  
rarily delayed he will proceed as  
follows: 1. Forward his request to  
the headquarters of the numbered  
Air Force issuing the recall or-  
ders, asking for a delay in com-  
pliance with the orders. A mini-  
mum of 10 days plus travel time  
is provided in all recall orders,  
but upon personnel request the  
period may be extended to a maxi-  
mum of 30 days in justifiable  
cases. 2. If 30 days is deemed in-  
sufficient by the individual or his  
employer, a written request for  
further delay may be forwarded to  
the appropriate numbered Air  
Force with documentary evidence  
to support the request. Normal de-  
lay period will not exceed six  
months, after which time the case  
will be reviewed. 3. If the case is  
clear-cut within recall delay poli-  
cies the individual will be auth-  
orized the delay before leaving

his residence. If the case can not  
be decided on the merits of the  
correspondence alone, the individ-  
ual may be required to appear be-  
fore a deferment board to supply  
additional information upon which  
to base a decision. Such boards  
are set up at the processing sta-  
tions or will be sent to a unit  
when a unit is being activated. 4.  
If the individual appeals the de-  
cision or the numbered Air Force,  
the case will be referred to the  
Command Appeal Board at Con-  
tinental Air Command for final ac-  
tion. Reservists, however, must  
comply with recall orders if initial  
delay request is not honored, or  
has not been acted upon by the  
time are to be effective.

All cases will be treated on their  
individual merits and no "blanket"  
deferments will be made.

Requests for delay may be sub-  
mitted by either the Reservists  
or his employer, but no requests  
should be made prior to receipt  
of recall orders.

According to Sgt. Cutshall, there  
are approximately 50 air force re-  
servists within the Lamb County  
area that may be affected by this  
recall.

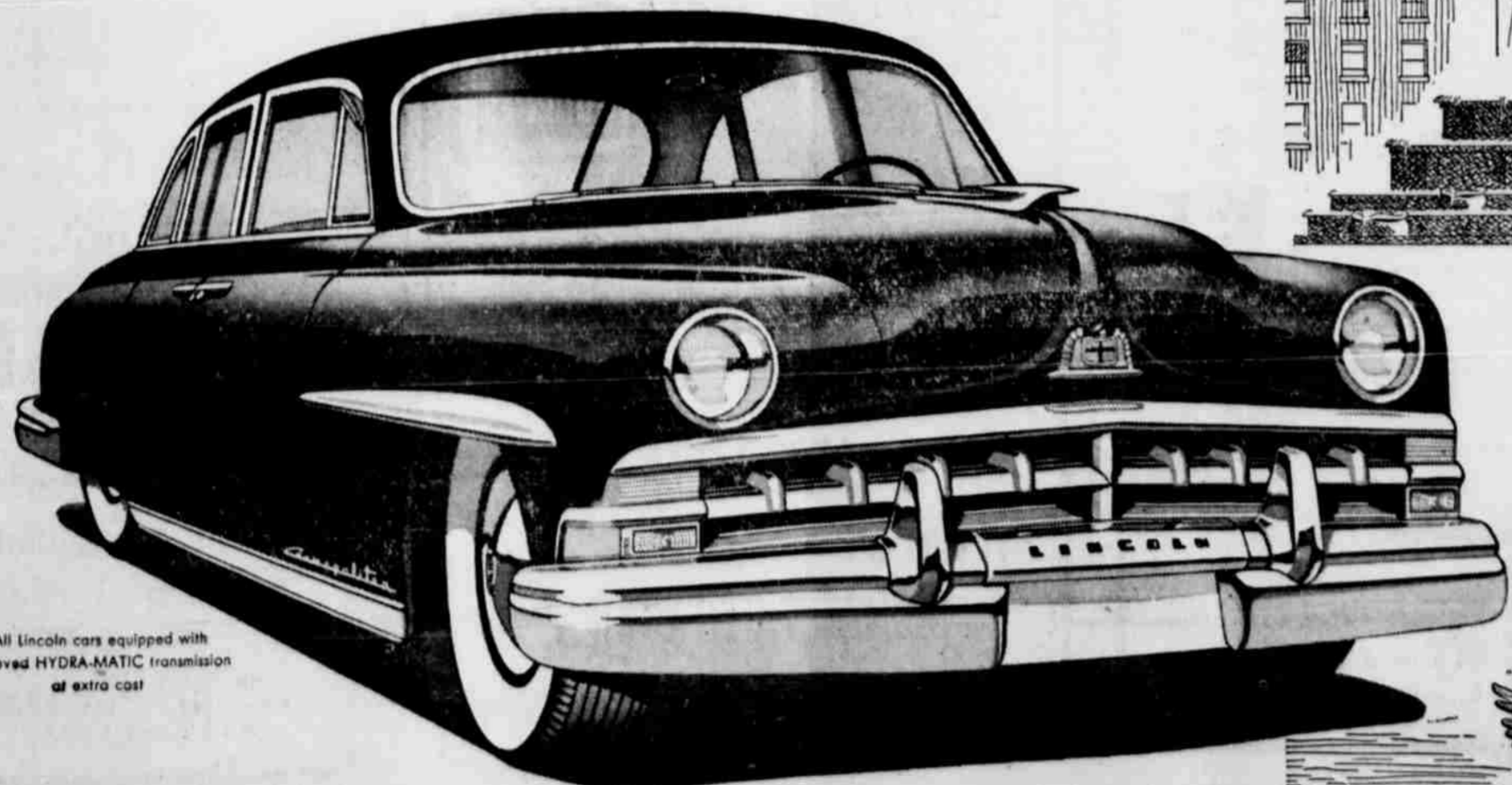

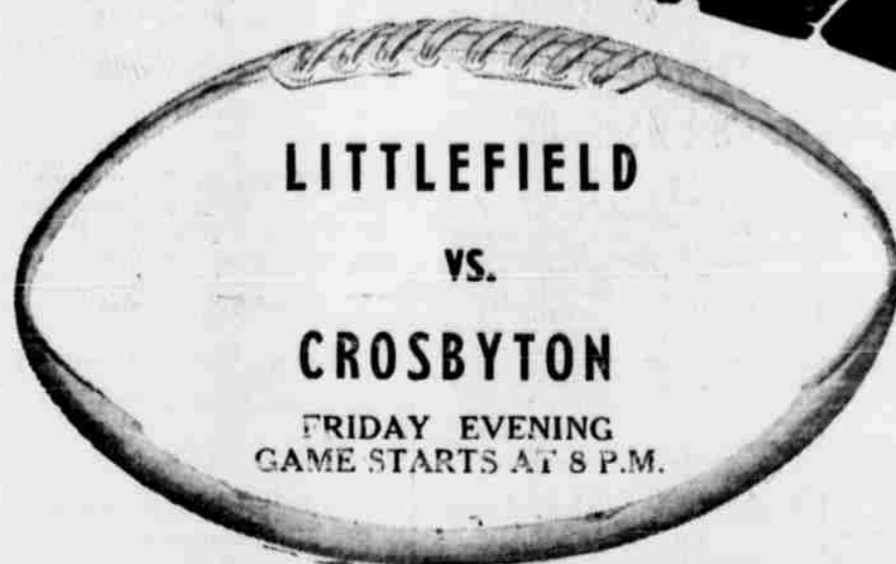

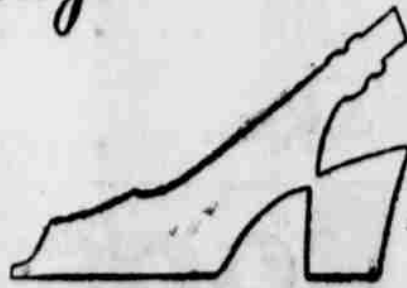
ball games this year.

1. Traffic regulations will be rigidly enforced.
  2. New signs will be provided and installed.
  3. There will be "No Parking" red lines on either side of safety zones.
  4. Parking space will be provided for faculty and workers on North side of Primary Building.
  5. Strict speed limit between two light signals will be observed.
  6. Classroom education in traffic safety will be conducted by teachers, assisted by the committee members.
