

LITTLEFIELD PASSES ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR FOOD INSPECTION

Election Held Saturday To Raise School Tax Carries

Only 274 Votes Cast; 199 For And 75 Against Issue

Raise Is Necessary Due Loss of \$18,000 In State Teachers Aid

In the school election held Saturday for the purpose of voting on the question of raising the school tax from \$1.00 per \$100 valuation to \$1.50, the issue carried by a vote of 199 for and 75 votes against raising the rate. There were only 274 votes cast.

This raise in rate is declared necessary by the Littlefield School Board to offset the loss of about \$18,000 from the State in Teachers' salary aid, which was cut off when Littlefield was found to have as much as 3606 population.

The election was held in the Methodist Church with Jess Elms as County Judge.

Mr. McAllister, who owned and operated a machine shop in Sudan, is reported to have fallen in the yard at his home and died in a few minutes.

Seeks School Superintendency

E. W. "Jack" Jackson has announced his candidacy for the office of County Superintendent of Schools for Lamb County.

Jackson is known throughout the county as 'Jack' or 'Coach'. His home has been in Lamb County for the past seventeen years. He has served twelve of these years as teacher coach, and superintendent in the schools of the County. The first seven years he was teacher and coach at Spade, the next four he was coach at Amherst, and the past year he has been superintendent of schools at Spade. Jackson has been principal and coach three years outside of the County.

He has attended North Texas A. & M., Wayland College and West Texas State, receiving an A. B. degree from Texas Technological College.

His platform advocates this: "I will perform all the duties of the County Superintendent of Lamb County Schools to the best of my ability, and especially do I think it necessary to have an effectual representation of our county and schools at Austin, also a change in the equalization laws so our schools in this part of the state will receive the same assistance as schools in other parts of the state."

"Jackson, from the standpoint of education and practical experience in school work of the county, knows the needs of all the schools within the county and is well qualified to serve you and your schools as your next County Superintendent. He and his friends will appreciate your vote and influence."

Move Rig To New Location West of Discovery Well

Reports indicate that the deep test rig on the Campbell well is being torn down, and will be moved to a new location, four miles northwest. This well is being drilled by the Humble Oil Company. The new location is one mile south and three miles west of Lamb County's first discovery well. This well is making about 70 barrels daily.

Herman Perkins Dies Suddenly

Herman Perkins, about 32, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Perkins of three miles north of Littlefield, died suddenly Monday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock as the result of a heart ailment.

Mr. Perkins dropped on the sidewalk in front of the Birdwell Brothers Firestone Store, Phelps Avenue, and although three local men worked over him trying to revive him, it was of no avail. The Hammons ambulance took him to the Payne-Shotwell Hospital, but he was dead on arrival.

Perkins was born July 19, 1914 at Snyder, Okla.

The family moved to a farm south of Sudan, where they made their home for 14 years. Two years ago they moved to a farm three miles north of Littlefield, where they continue to live.

Perkins farmed with his father previous to entering the service on January 8, 1942. He served fifteen months with the Anti-submarine Patrol off the East Coast, and was discharged on account of disability.

He suffered from leakage of the heart when about 17 years old, but was believed to have fully overcome this ailment. For the last ten days, however, according to his father, he had not felt well and had spent considerable time in bed.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the LFD Church of Christ, with Bro. J. R. Hicks, Minister of the church, officiating. Interment, in charge of Hammons Funeral Home, took place in the Littlefield Cemetery.

Survivors include a little son "Donald Ray," 4 years old; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Perkins of three miles north of town; two brothers, Ray of Kermit, Texas, and Bob, student of Texas University, Austin.

J. C. Penney Business Started In 1902 in Small Store at Kemmerer, Wyoming

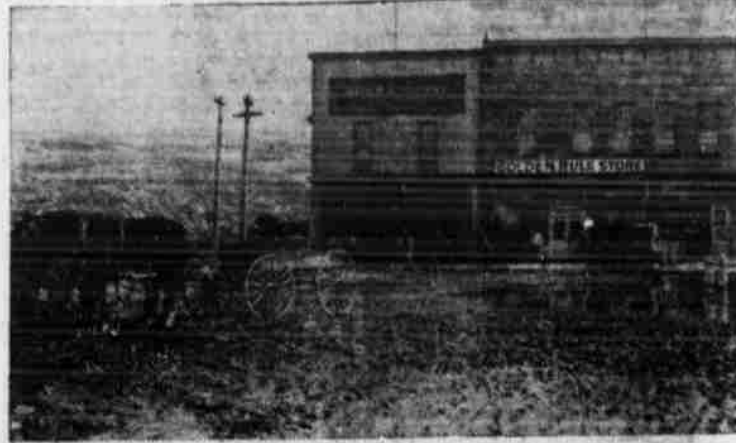

Social Security Official To Be Here June 26th

John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board will be in Littlefield at the U. S. Post Office Wednesday, June 26, at 10:30 a. m. He is in Littlefield one day each month for the purpose of answering any questions people may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who may be entitled to benefits, and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Mr. Palmer stated the law provides that old-age survivors insurance benefits must be given up for any month in which the worker earns more than \$14.99 in covered employment, but benefits can be stopped and resumed as often as the worker moves in and out of covered jobs.

To prevent confusion and misunderstanding, the following cautions

are issued:

1. Increased benefits, once a claim is filed, can result only from additional work in covered employment. Generally this additional employment must be at pay equal to or above the past average monthly wage.
2. Benefits will be recalculated only upon request. It is important, therefore, that the beneficiary get in touch with the local Social Security Board field office whenever he quits working in covered employment or, even though he is still working, whenever his total pay begins to go down as a result of reduced working hours, lower pay rate, lost time, or for any other reason.

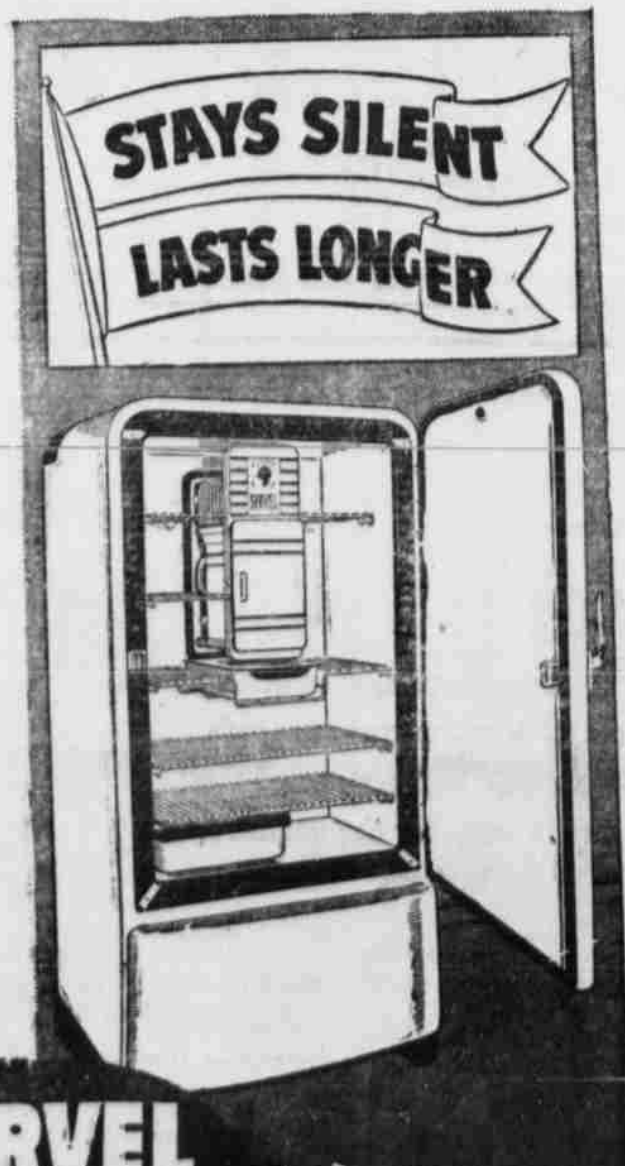

Investigation Is Urged

Claiming representation for "thousands of petitioners and adherents in twenty states," the Fight for Freedom of Enterprise, Inc., with headquarters in San Antonio has requested the Congress to consider what FFE called the "strike conspiracy" in the nation.

In a telegrapher message addressed to the President of the United States the speaker of the House of Representatives, the president of the Senate and Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel (D., Tex.), Fight for Free Enterprise charged that a "strike conspiracy, set in motion after V-J day and which has grown in intensity and power until it now approaches complete business stoppage and sadly affects every man, woman and child in the United States is now in progress today."

The organization, headed by William Walker of San Antonio, asserted that although the members of Congress were sent to Washington by the people "John L. Lewis and Sidney Hillman are in control of every phase of business activity."

It further charged that "Communist conspirators who are promoting the strike activity have moved into the halls of Congress with threats to purge and with the power to intimidate even the highest official in Washington."

The message also alleged that the entire strike picture is "a premeditated movement intended to lead to the overthrow of our constitutional government and the setting up here of the Union of Soviet Socialistic Republics."

Restrictions Cause Slump In Building

Government restrictions were reported Friday by "Texas Contractor" trade publication, to have caused a \$10,000,000 slump in home building contracts for May.

"Governmental controls giving priority to veteran housing and limiting all other types of housing and construction were undoubtedly responsible for the tremendous decrease in Texas construction awards for May," the publication said.

It placed the amount of residential contracts total for May at \$6,801,600; non-residential at \$8,647,645; engineering at \$9,058,208.

The contrast was more noticeable because of an April all-time high in residential contracts amounting to \$16,842,200.

A Houston chemical plant contract for \$6,000,000 was reported to be the May leader. Total awards for the month were \$24,507,843 on 1,368 projects.

feriority is concealed, (e) if it contains any added poisonous or other added deleterious ingredients which may render such article injurious to the health, or (f) if it consists in whole or in part of any filthy, decomposed, putrid, or contaminated animal or vegetable substance unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is the product of a diseased animal, or of one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.

Section 5: The term "filthy" as used in this ordinance shall mean and be deemed to apply to food not securely protected from flies, other insects, dust, dirt, and all foreign or injurious contaminations.

Section 6: There is hereby created the office of Food Inspector for the City of Littlefield, Texas. The Food Inspector shall be appointed by the governing authorities of the City with the advice of the city health officer. It shall be the duty of the Food Inspector and he shall have authority to at any time examine and inspect food of any nature manufactured, prepared, possessed with intent to sell, offered or exposed for sale, or sold and exchanged by any person, firm or corporation within the City of Littlefield, Texas.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 88

An ordinance of the City of Littlefield, Texas, making it unlawful to manufacture, possess, sell or exchange adulterated food; defining the term "food"; defining the term "filthy"; creating the office of Food Inspector; providing for the appointment of a Food Inspector; stating the duties of the Food Inspector; providing that it shall be unlawful for any person, to slaughter any animal for food purposes without first having the same inspected by the Food Inspector; providing for fees to be paid the Food Inspector; providing that it shall be unlawful to resist the Food Inspector; providing that any adulterated food may be seized and destroyed; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Littlefield, Texas, that:

Section 1: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to manufacture or prepare for sale, have in his possession with intent to sell, offer or expose for sale or exchange, or sell, exchange or deliver, in the City of Littlefield, Texas, any article of food which is adulterated within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 2: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person firm or corporation to manufacture or prepare any adulterated article of food for shipment or delivery for sale, exchange, or human consumption, into the City of Littlefield, Texas whether such articles of food are manufactured or prepared within said city or outside the limits of said City.

Section 3: The term "food" as used in this ordinance means and shall include meat, vegetables, fruits, grain, cereals, milk, and other articles intended for human consumption or used by man for food, drink, flavoring, or confectionery, whether simple, mixed or compounded.

Section 4: For the purposes of this ordinance an article of food shall be deemed to be "adulterated," (a) if any substance has been mixed with it so as to reduce or injuriously affect its quality or strength, (b) if any substance has been substituted in whole or in part for the article, (c) if the article be below that of standard quality, quantity, strength or purity represented to the purchaser or consumer, (d) if it be mixed colored, powdered, coated or stained in a manner whereby damage or in-

purposes without first having the same inspected for disease or defects before slaughtering by the Food Inspector of said city. If the Food Inspector finds any cattle, hogs, sheep, goats or other livestock to be diseased, defective or in any manner unfit for human consumption, he shall notify the owner or slaughterer of any disease, defect, or unfitness and shall instruct such owner or slaughterer not to slaughter such animal or animals for food, and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to slaughter any cattle, hogs, sheep, goats or other livestock for food purposes for consumption in Littlefield after the same has been found by the Food Inspector to be diseased, defective or unfit for food purposes.

Section 8: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation whether such person, firm or corporation is located within or without the city limits of the City of Littlefield to resist or otherwise interfere with the Food Inspector in the performance of his duties. A certificate executed by the City Secretary of said City under the seal of said City, in the possession of such Food Inspector shall be sufficient authority for the Food Inspector to act in any of the capacities above mentioned, and such certificate shall be deemed conclusive evidence that the person bearing the same is the Food Inspector of said City.

Section 9: If any article of food is found by the Food Inspector to be adulterated or unfit for use as food as provided in this ordinance, the Food Inspector shall be authorized and it shall be his duty, on instructions from the governing authorities of the City, to seize, take possession of and remove such adulterated food from any store, slaughter house, market or other place where the same may be located, and to destroy such adulterated food.

Section 10: The Food Inspector shall be authorized to collect from the owner or possessor of any livestock intended to be slaughtered for food purposes the following fees for inspection, to-wit: \$1.00 per head for each head of cattle, and 50c per head for each head of hogs, sheep, goats or other livestock. It shall be the duty of such owner, possessor or slaughterer to pay such fees to the Food Inspector before the inspection of the animal and such sum or sums are hereby assessed. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to refuse to pay the Inspector the fees herein fixed, and the refusal to pay such fees shall be considered resisting the Food Inspector and interfering with the duties of the Food Inspector.

Section 11: Whoever shall do any act or thing prohibited, or neglect or refuse to do any act or thing enjoined by this ordinance, or whoever shall in anyway violate any provision of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not less than Twenty-five Dollars and not more than One Hundred Dollars. It shall not be necessary to allege or prove that the act or omission was knowingly done or omitted.

Section 12: If any food is found to be adulterated, the same may be

condemned, confiscated, and destroyed by the governing authorities of the City, or by suit of the City filed in a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 13: If any section, paragraph, provision, sentence, phrase or word of this ordinance is or shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any remaining portion of this ordinance.

Section 14: The fact that there is not in force in the City of Littlefield an ordinance protecting the people of the City against adulterated food, and the further fact that it is important and the duty of the governing authorities of the City to promote health and to protect the people against disease and sickness, create an emergency and public necessity, requiring this ordinance to be passed on first reading, and to be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage and publication according to law, and it is hereby so ordained.

PASSED, ADOPTED AND APPROVED by the City Commission of the City of Littlefield, Texas, in session duly held, this the 14 day of June, 1946.

mation.

Q What are the requirements for
a pension payable to World War II
veterans for service-connected dis-
abilities?

A Pension may be paid for dis-
ability incurred in, or aggravated by,
active service in World War II, in
line of duty, according to the de-
gree of disability shown. Pension is
not payable if the disability is the
result of the veteran's own willful
misconduct. The veteran must have
a discharge under conditions other
than dishonorable.

Q Can an honorable discharged
member of the Women's Army Corps
obtain hospital treatment in a Vet-
eran's hospital?

A Yes, former female members
of the armed forces are entitled to
the same treatment as male war
veterans.

Q Under what conditions may
National Service Life insurance pre-
miums be waived by the government
on account of total disability.

A All National Service life in-
surance policies contain a provision
for the waiver of payment of premiums
upon application by the insured, dur-
ing the continuous total disability of
the insured which continues or has
continued for 6 or more consecutive
months, provided such disability
commenced subsequent to the date
of his application for insurance,
while the insurance was in force
under premium-paying conditions
and prior to the insured's sixtieth
birthday.

Nation-Wide Bond Sale June 6-July 4

The Treasury is in receipt of the
following letter from the Treasury
Department, Washington, in connec-
tion with the request by this depart-
ment that the public buy war bonds
in a nation-wide campaign, between
June 6 and July 4, as follows—

"In a nation-wide campaign, June
6 (D day) through July 14, it is our
aim to bring forcibly to public at-
tention the wisdom of putting away
every possible dollar in U. S. Sav-
ings Bonds. This is not to be another
bond drive but a publicity peak in
the continuing peacetime promotion.

"Unless strikes further disrupt the
economy Americans should have ab-
out \$22 billion more in 1946 income
than they can spend on consumer
goods and services available at leg-
itimate prices. For the good of us
all this surplus should go into a non-
inflationary channels. So far in 1946,
the public has invested nearly 3.5
billion in Savings Bonds over \$2 of
it in E bonds. That is good, but, ag-
ainst the present inflationary trend,
it is not enough.

"Selling these bonds has not in-
creased the public debt; it has kept
the debt so spread that individuals
draw interest upon as much as poss-
ible of it. By June 15, the Treasury
will have reduced the debt by more
than \$10 billion from its peak in Feb-
ruary using surplus cash to retire se-
curities held by banks. This too, re-
duces the inflationary potential,
since banks can create credit against
their government security holdings.

Vinson's Appointment 5th In Importance In Year And A Half

Fred M. Vinson will step into his
fifth important government job in a
year and a half when the Senate
confirms his appointment as chief
justice.

Before the string of appointments
began, Vinson was a member of the
House for Kentucky for 15 years and
a judge for six.

He was born Jan. 22 1896, in the
residential quarters of the Louisa,
Ky., jail. His father was the jailer.
He received a diploma from an East-
ern Kentucky normal school in 1906,
a B. A. degree from Centre College
in 1909 and a law degree in 1911.

Vinson was Louisa's city attorney
from 1913 to 1921 and his district's
commonwealth attorney for the next
two years. In 1923 he was elected to
Congress, where he became promi-
nent as a tax expert of the House
ways and means committee. He left
Congress in 1933 to become Asso-
ciate Justice of the U. S. Court of
appeals for the District of Columbia.

Then came his run of presidential
appointments to positions of great
responsibility.

May 28, 1943, director of economic
stabilization.

March 8 1945, federal loan admin-
istrator.

April 4, 1945 director of war mobi-
lization and reconversion.

July 23, 1945, secretary of the
Treasury.

June 6, 1946, chief justice of the
United States.
