Milner previously was a manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and an assistant manager of the San Angelo Board of City Development and Chamber of Commerce. Milner will speak on Indus-

trial Sites and Buildings in a 2:20 session, and at 4:10 he will offer suggestions as to how to promote Littlefield industrially. After the opening remarks this morning, Harry W. Clark will present valuable suggestions on organizing for industrial

development. Clark believes that before a community can expand industrially, it has to know what it has now and how it can organize efficiently for further expansion and development.
