ACCIDENT HOSPITALIZES TWO...A Saturday afternoon, car-truck accident 2 miles west of Spade, sent Mrs. Eva Mae Cox and her 4 year old son, Roy Dale, to Littlefield Hospital with multiple injuries. The accident between the Cox vehicle, a 1964 Chevrolet, and a 1957 Chevrolet

flat bed truck driven by Robert Pitman of Littlefield, resulted in minor damage to the truck, and totally demolished the sedan. Officials at Littlefield Hospital said Tuesday morning that Mrs. Cox and her son were in satisfactory condition.

Highway 54 Accident Hospitalizes Two, Totals 1964 Automobile

A car-truck crash at 4:30 Saturday afternoon 2 miles west of Spade on FM 54 sent two Alamogordo residents to Littlefield Hospital, and totally demolished a 1964 Chevrolet sedan. Injured in the accident were Mrs. Eva Mae Cox, 20, of Route 2, Abernathy, driver of the Chevrolet, and her 4 year old son, Roy Dale, Tammy Cox, 2, also a passenger in the car was examined and released.

In attempting to re-construct the cause of the crash, Highway Patrolmen said it appeared that the truck was attempting to make a right turn, off the highway, onto an intersecting dirt road, at the time of the accident.

Following the impact the Chevrolet traveled an estimated 60 feet while the truck was knocked off the highway, and into a ditch some 100 feet from the point of impact.

Parsons said charges in the accident were pending.

Officials at Littlefield Hospital reported the condition of both Mrs. Cox and her son as satisfactory and said Mrs. Cox received severe chest and internal injuries, while the son is suffering from numerous internal injuries, as well as cuts and bruises.

The accident, said the DPS, was the first serious one on county roads in two weeks, as drivers of the area continue to maintain an excellent safety record, with only one fatal accident recorded this year. Property damage from accidents continue to remain low and injuries few.

Hammons said, "I believe that Medicare is a good way to prepay hospital and doctor bills as they come up."

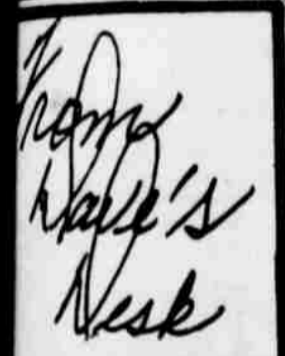
Hammons said it took only a short time for him to be enrolled in the health insurance program because he had all necessary documents and papers compiled upon first contact with the Social Security Administration.

BCD, To Launch Clean-Up Campaign June 20

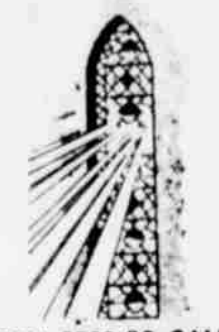

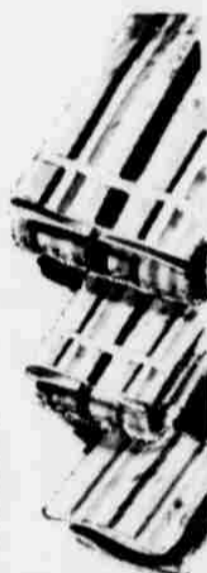

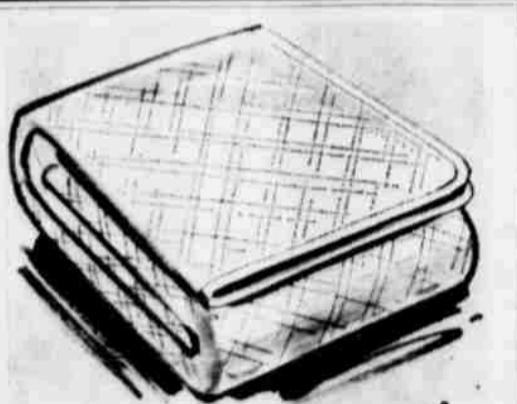
