

### Poll Taxes Paid in County Total 5486

The total poll taxes paid in the county for 1946 are reported at 5,486.

The total votes cast in the June, 1937, county seat election were 3314 as follows: Olton, 509; Earth, 151; Spade, 148; Sunnydale, 177; Sudan, 258; Pleasant Valley, 38; Amherst, 289; Fieldton, 122; Sod House, 47; Littlefield, 1377; Pep, 66; Hart Camp 93; and Spring Lake, 79.

### Seeks Re-Election As Co. School Supt.

J. Ernest Jones, who is seeking re-election to the office of County Superintendent of Lamb County Schools, makes his formal announcement as follows:

**To The People of Lamb County:** "I recently authorized the papers of Lamb County to announce to you my candidacy for re-election to the office of Lamb County Superintendent of Schools. It has been a great pleasure to serve you during this first term, and I appreciate the wonderful cooperation by the members of the County School Board, the Local School Boards and officials, and the people of Lamb County.

"I also wish to compliment the people of this county on your good schools, for they are far above the average of the schools in Texas. We have the schools of Lamb County so arranged that every white child in this county has the privilege of finishing high school in a fully accredited twelve-grade school system. While in Austin recently at the School Administrators Conference, I heard us reported as one of the fifteen counties of Texas that has all schools accredited. We can all be justly proud of that fact. We also have three nice schools operating for colored children in Lamb County this year. We have eight schools in Lamb County operating federal aided lunch rooms, that serve nourishing hot lunches to the children at a very reasonable price. We have 63 buses operating in Lamb County transporting all country children to school. We expect to collect over \$50,000 bus aid in Lamb County for this year. I realize that all of our schools have suffered some during the last few years with the shortage of teachers and many other problems that we would not have in normal times, but we have carried on the best we could and did not have any of our schools to close during the war. It is reported that over 500 schools had to close in Texas part of the time during the war. Due to the facts just mentioned and many others too numerous

## Frank Cummings Makes His Formal Announcement

Frank Cummings, who has previously announced he would be a candidate for re-election to the office of Tax Assessor-Collector, is now making his formal announcement as follows:

**To the Citizens and Voters of Lamb County, Texas:**

"When I first came before the voters and my friends of Lamb County, I asked for, and was elected to, a smaller office (district clerk). I made no secret of the fact that some day I wanted to be Tax Assessor-Collector, but at that time I felt that I was far from being qualified to take over the biggest job in Lamb County, the Tax Assessor-Collector's office, with a tax roll of several million dollars valuation as the only experience I had had at that time was working for Roy Gilbert while he was Tax Assessor-Collector as extra help (PART TIME) in the office and assessing. Also before that I had been manager and bookkeeper of a store and had kept books for two different firms which I fully realized did not qualify me to compile the Tax Rolls, make weekly remittances or to make monthly, quarterly, or annual reports, to say nothing of the delinquent tax rolls and the redemptions.

"Also knowing that Lamb County had never elected a man as tax assessor-collector who had not (1) either held another county office, (2) had worked for several years in this office or (3) was tax assessor before the two offices were combined, and being only 35 years of age, I felt also that I was really too young and that a few more years and some more experience would better qualify me to take over an office that

## Plan to Organize Veterans Vocational School Here

### Meeting Is Called For Friday Night to Make Plans

### Discharged Service Men Are Urged to Attend Session

As announced by J. Ernest Jones, County School Superintendent, the Lamb County School Board is contemplating organizing a vocational school in Lamb County for returned veterans who are employed in this county, and unable to attend college.

Veterans attending this school could draw \$65.00, if single, and \$90.00 if married, per month, which is allowed under the G. I. Bill of Rights for education.

According to Mr. Jones, this school can be organized if the demand is great enough, and the classes would be at night.

A meeting is being called for next Friday night at 8 o'clock in the Littlefield High School Auditorium for the purpose of discussing the proposition, and drawing up a petition asking for the school. It is required that this petition be signed by 40 veterans. All discharged veterans of Lamb County are urged to attend, and the public is cordially invited.

## Dr. Chas. Allan Clark to Visit Littlefield

Dr. Charles Allen Clark, of Korea, will be a visitor in Littlefield on Thursday next, speaking at 11 a. m. at the local High School, and at 12:15 he will be guest speaker of the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon meeting.

At 4:15 p. m. Thursday he will speak to the children at the First Presbyterian Church, at which time he will show curios from Korea. Dr. Clark has with him movies, which he will show in connection with his address Thursday evening, which will be given at the First Presbyterian Church at 7:30 o'clock. Everyone is invited to hear him.

The Rev. Clark went to Korea in 1902, and has returned to the United States only five times, this last time by invitation--of Tojo. He was under arrest three and a half months just before leaving Korea, and escaped a three-year penitentiary term in a Japanese jail only by a miracle.

Since the Russo-Japanese war in 1904 brought Korea into the limelight, Dr. Clark has seen the old Korea practically disappear, with the advent of automobiles, radio, airplanes and Olympic winners. With his wife, who has shared all of his evangelistic work, Dr. Clark passed through two wars and many months of guerilla warfare. He was once captured by bandits. Twice he was stoned and twice he had adventures with tigers, once with Korean mobs who killed 104 Chinese in two nights in his town.

Dr. Clark had a part in founding over 100 churches, sold hundreds of

thousands of Christian books and built houses in the days when they had to make their own brick, tile and lime in kilns, and cut their lumber by hand. As professor in the Theological Seminary for 38 years, he taught students theology and its practical application. Every student spent a given amount of time each week in direct evangelism in the street chapels, on the streets, in house preaching, in factories, and in stores. He was personally pastor of 53 churches; 46 in the country and 7 in the suburbs of Pyongyang City. Dr. Clark has produced 36 books in the Korean language and six in English. He has seen the Presbyterian Church in Korea grow to 4,000 congregations with more than 400,000 members.

A native of Minnesota, Dr. Clark attended the University of Minnesota and graduated from Macalaster College and from Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Chicago. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago in 1929. While in Littlefield he will be the house guest of Dr. and Mrs. A. B. Haynes.

Today your telephone is so commonplace that you probably don't know a person who is without one in his home. But your telephone of tomorrow will be an instrument of new wonders — with unlimited scope and many new uses. However, don't expect to call your local office and have any of these new gadgets installed immediately, because these possibilities will be provided only as fast as the public is willing to pay for them.

Some of the more dramatic innovations in your telephone service of the postwar period are likely to be among the following: a telephone that will answer itself when you are not at home or in your office, record the message and repeat it to you on your return; telephone service in moving vehicles such as taxis and automobiles through a radio exchange that will connect you with any number you wish to call; a pocket radio pick-up that will inform

you when your phone at home or in the office is ringing so that you can call in from wherever you are and get your message.

Everyone, of course, has read of the "walkie-talkie" and its tremendous utility in military operations. For peacetime use this compact instrument can be carried about by farmers, engineers, and others who must work far afield and keep them in constant contact with home or headquarters. Imagination can run riot with the possibilities for these telephonic devices, but tomorrow will bring even more important improvements.

Add to all this a score or more of "little conveniences" in your telephoning such as completely automatic service, volume-controlled phones for the hard-of-hearing, automatically ventilated telephone booths along with the possibility of television attachments—and you'll readily see how your telephone of today will become a miracle of tomorrow.—Exchange

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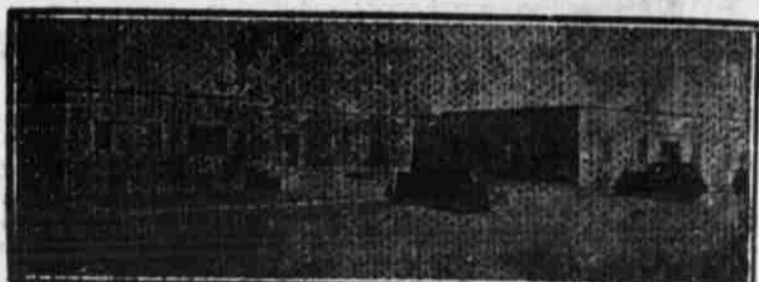

Tax Quiz

- 1. If I am required at this time to make a Declaration of Estimated Tax for 1945 (or amended declaration), when must it be filed? January 15, 1946. The tax due at this time must be paid in full. 2. Where do I file? At the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue in your district. In this district, address your declaration to "Collector of Internal Revenue, Dallas 1, Texas. 3. Do I also have to file an income tax return by March 15? If you file your regular 1945 return on Form 1040 by January 15, 1946, it will serve both as a declaration and as a return, and no further filing on your 1945 taxes will be necessary. However, if you file a declaration (Form 1040-ES), you must also file your regular return not later than March 15, 1946. 4. Do I have to file an estimate for the new year, 1946? For 1946, the rules will be the same as last year. You will have to file a 1946 Declaration if you are single and expect wages subject to withholding to exceed \$5,000, plus \$500 for every exemption your own and if you are married and expect wages to withholding to exceed \$10,000 plus \$500 for each exemption except your own and your wife or if you expect more than \$100 of other income not subject to withholding, (assuming your overall income is \$500 or more for

single person \$1,000 or more for man and wife). This applies only to residents of community property states. 5. When do I file my 1946 estimate? March 15, 1946, if you are not a farmer; January 15, 1947, if you are a farmer. But do not confuse these dates with the deadline this January 15 for completing your

1945 estimates. 6. Suppose I don't want to change my 1945 estimate, but have an installment left to pay. When is it due? Also January 15, 1946. In this case, too, if you file your annual return by January 15, 1946, you may pay the amount called for by the return instead of the installment.

ORDER OF THE COUNTY JUDGE OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, FOR A COUNTY SEAT ELECTION TO BE HELD IN LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS

WHEREAS, on the 17th day of January, 1946, there was presented to me, L. B. Holt, as County Judge of Lamb County, Texas, a petition signed by Mrs. Lorene Hulse and 405 others, stating that it is desirable to remove the County Seat of Lamb County, Texas, from Olton, Texas, to Littlefield, Texas...

WHEREAS, it appears and I find that said petition is signed by the requisite number of free-holders and qualified voters of Lamb County, Texas, who are resident citizens of said County, and that the petition is in due form; and

WHEREAS, the law of this State provides that when such petition is presented the County Judge of the County to whom the petition is presented shall make a written order upon the minutes of Commissioners' Court of such County for the holding of such election; and

WHEREAS, after said petition was presented to me, and on the same day, to-wit, on the 17th day of January, 1946, another petition signed by Marvin Wagner and 486 others was presented to me, in which petition it is requested that I as County Judge of Lamb County in ordering an election for the removal of the County Seat of Lamb County, Texas, to place the name of Amherst, Texas, on the ballot to be used in said election so that in voting at said election the voters could vote for removal of the County Seat from Olton, Texas to Amherst, Texas as they so desire and it appears to me that both said petitions should be granted.

THEREFORE, I, L. B. Holt, in my capacity as County Judge of Lamb County, Texas, do hereby grant said petitions and do hereby order that an election be held in the various voting precincts of Lamb County, Texas, on Saturday, the 9th day of March, 1946, for the purpose of determining, and at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Lamb County, Texas, the question of whether or not the County Seat of Lamb County, Texas, shall be removed from Olton, Texas, to Littlefield, Texas, or to Amherst, Texas.

In Voting Precinct No. 1 the said election shall be held in the Court House of Lamb County, Texas, in Olton, Texas, and W. A. Schreiber and Trest Sides are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 2 the said election shall be held at the Methodist Church in Earth, Texas, and Guy Kelly and L. Z. Anglin are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 3 the said election shall be held at Spade School House, and Harry Woody and H. N. Bennett are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 4 the said election shall be held at Sunnydale Community House, and P. S. Hanks and Lyle Brandon are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 5 the said election shall be held at the City Hall in Sudan, Texas, and Clyde Robertson and Ed Love are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 6 the said election shall be held at Pleasant Valley School House, and W. A. Stevens and J. R. Moore are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 7 the said election shall be held at J. E. Harvey's Residence, and J. E. Harvey and Joe West are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 8 the said election shall be held at American Legion Hall, Amherst, Texas, and Bob Crawford and W. F. Rowland are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 9 the said election shall be held at the School House in Fieldton, Texas, and Charley Jarman and Marvin Qualls are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 10 the said election shall be held at Sod House, and John Nix and Horace Melton are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 11 the said election shall be held at Robert Sullivan's Residence, and Austin Wiggins and T. N. Palvado are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 12 the said election shall be held at the Methodist Church in Littlefield, Texas, and R. W. Badger and Arthur Jones are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 13 the said election shall be held at John Powell's Residence, and John Powell and H. G. Boyles are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 14 the said election shall be held at Hart's Camp School House, and C. P. Montgomery and Lewis Ball are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 15 the said election shall be held at the Office of Co-op Gin in Springlake, Texas, and O. W. Daniels and Bob Chitwood are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

In Voting Precinct No. 16 the said election shall be held at the School House in Littlefield, Texas, Primary Building, and L. C. Hewitt and Bob Lewis are hereby appointed judges of said election in said precinct.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 5, of Title 33 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, and amendments thereof, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and shall be conducted as near as may be in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State of Texas; and all persons who are qualified voters under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas shall be entitled to vote at said election.

"FOR REMOVAL TO AMHERST, TEXAS"

Should the voter be in favor of the County Seat remaining at Olton, Texas, he or she shall write or cause to be written or printed on his or her ballot the words:

"FOR REMAINING AT OLTON, TEXAS"

Should the voter be in favor of removing the County Seat to some other place than Littlefield, Texas or Amherst, Texas, he or she shall write or cause to be written or printed on his or her ballot the words:

"FOR REMOVAL TO \_\_\_\_\_"

and the voter shall insert the name of the place to which he or she desires the County Seat to be removed.

A copy of this order certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper notice of said election. And Thirty (30) days notice of the time and places of holding said election shall be given by posting true and correct copies of this order in one public place within each voting precinct in said County, and by publication thereof in the English Language in four (4) weekly issues of a newspaper regularly published in each of the towns of Littlefield, Amherst and Olton in Lamb County, Texas, and the date of first publication of said notice in each newspaper shall be thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election. The Sheriff of Lamb County, Texas, or his deputy, shall post said notices and cause the same to be published.

It is further ordered that this order shall be spread and recorded upon the Minutes of the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas.

#### CITY DELIVERY EXPECTED

As announced by Postmaster W. D. Storey, rural routes 1 and 2 will leave the postoffice at 9.30 each morning, instead of 10.15 a. m., which means that mail will be delivered 45 minutes earlier each day. Extensions on length of the routes will cause them to get back into the

office later in the afternoon.

Postmaster Storey stated that this was in keeping with the possible City Delivery Service also, since City Delivery service will likely go into effect April 1.

#### LAMB COUNTY REA GETS \$50,000 LOAN

As the result of an application made by the Lamb County Electric Cooperative for an allotment from the Government to build an additional 270 miles of REA Lines, a \$50,000 loan was approved Monday.

In an interview with O. K. Woodall, manager of the Lamb County Cooperative Tuesday, he stated that this "was only a drop in the bucket" compared with what was needed to complete such a project here.

In a newspaper release Tuesday Congressman Mahon predicted the legislation increasing lending powers of the Rural Electrification Administration, \$100,000,000 for the current fiscal year would be approved by mid March. The Texas state that virtually all of the current \$60,000,000 which Congress authorized the REA to lend in the 12 month period ending June 30 has been exhausted; that no more money would be available in 21 states in the current fiscal year unless the additional authorization approved.

Cong. Mahon also added that the \$50,000 loan approved Lamb County is one of the last to be granted in Texas from currently authorized funds adding, however, that Texas will be allocated \$5,000,000 from the additional \$100,000,000.

Mr. Warren has been a resident of Lamb County for the past 8 years. Wes (Pop) Bell is connected with this station.

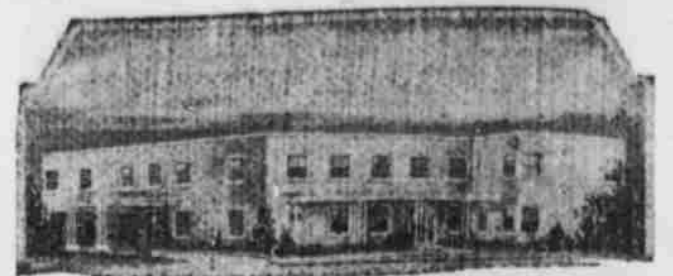

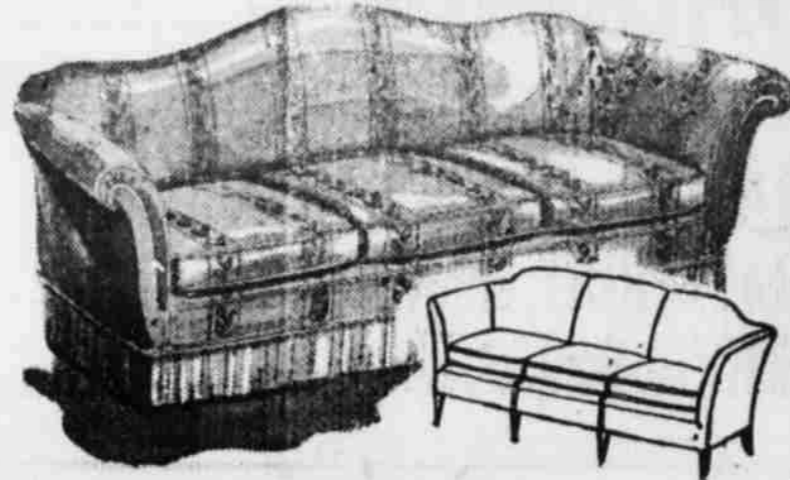

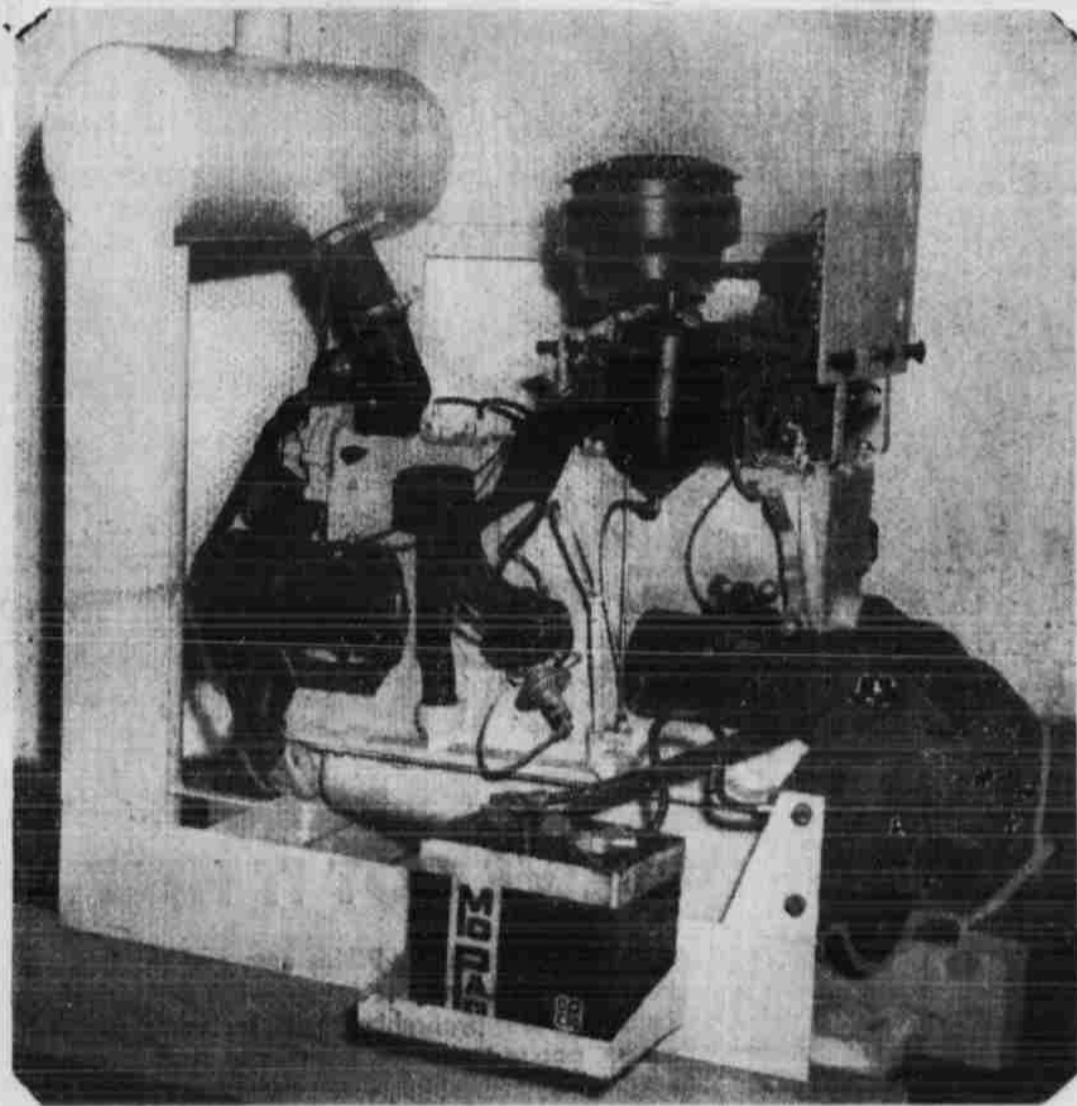

kept the abstract books to every persons ranch, farm or city lot also the records to all personal property. Ask any person who has had experience in this office about the importance of keeping Form 18 up to date, the insolvent and the D. T. R. all in a neat systematic order. Knowing that the taxpayers would have suffered I could not have accepted this office at that time had it been offered me free for the taking. And as set out above, I ran for District Clerk.

"While I was district clerk I made a close study of taxation and the tax collector's office, read laws pertaining to taxes or any book along that line; carefully went over reports, distribution of the funds, until I knew that if elected as tax assessor-collector I could handle any and every phase of the work to where it would not be an embarrassment and detriment to Lamb County, my bondsmen and myself. During the three years I have served you as tax-

assessor-collector I have set up a system that I am very proud of and have received many nice compliments from the State auditors and will take pleasure in showing my books and records to any citizen of Lamb County at any time.

"During the three years I have served you as tax assessor-collector the tax rolls have grown from \$8,900,464.00 to \$9,261,300.00. These figures in no way include money received from the sale of car and truck tags, which is no small matter, since there are around 5000 vehicles registered per year.
