



#### Strawberries, Corn Fresh For Christmas

It will be possible for the George Harmon family to have fresh strawberries and fresh corn at Christmas as they have these foods and others stored in the freezer locker plant in their community. Mrs. Harmon has put up one gallon of strawberries, 16 quarts corn, 12 quarts green beans, 16 quarts peaches, besides fryers, beef and pork.

Strawberries and other fruits are easy to prepare as after they are washed and packed in containers, a cold syrup is poured over them and then the containers are sealed. Vegetables require blanching to stop the action of enzymes which will affect the flavor and appear-

ance. Tables for blanching and preparation may be obtained at the home demonstration agent's office or at the locker plants. All foods should go into sharp freeze immediately after pre-

paration. If more than 15 minutes is required to bring the foods after the preparation to the plant, preparation should be done at the plant. This will insure the best flavor possible.

Frozen foods will provide vari-ety in the diet and will help make a balanced diet possible all year. Vitamins B and C are kept in the foods by this method. This is so easy to use, and these foods are so good that Mrs. Harmon has said she






