Cotton Vote Slated For December 11

The 1963 Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum will be held December 11, 1962.

Farmers who were engaged in the production of Upland Cotton in 1962 will be eligible to vote in the referendum, Arleast two-thirds of those voting must approve quotas if they are to

If marketing quotas are approved, marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton of producers who do not comply with their acreage allorments and price support to those who do comply will be available at a level within the ange of 65 to 90 percent of parity.

If quotas are not approved, the allotment program will remain in effect with price support at 50 percent of parity available to growers who comple with their allotment, but of ilcoments are not complied with Gone are the Indians and wild- there will be no penalties.






