Local Directors To Attend Fall Meeting

Jerry Sanders and Charlie Duval, local directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will attend the fall meeting of this regional chamber organization today and tomorrow. Sanders is the district vice-president of the West Texas Chamber and Duval is the director representing Littlefield on the board.

The meeting will be held in Denton with headquarters located at the Holiday Inn.

A special feature of the fall meeting will be the first meeting of two important new committees, the Cultural Affairs Committee and the Women's Activities Committee.

At a special Cultural Achievement Recognition Banquet, Mrs. John Connally will make a special presentation of awards and the principal address will be given by Governor John Connally.

West Texas Chamber President John Ben Sheppard will preside at the business session and indicated that much time would be given to the Agricultural Committee and its activities. President Sheppard has appointed Sanders to serve as the resource representative on this committee which is chaired by Homer Garrison of Plainview.

Because Littlefield has reached its quota of membership in the West Texas Chamber, both Duval and Sanders will attend a special "Quota Busters" breakfast Friday morning.

All of the committees of the organization will hold special sessions at the fall meeting with special emphasis being placed on state and national affairs.

School Board Appoints Text Book Committee

After a dinner at the Crescent House Restaurant, School Board members met Tuesday evening at the Tax Assessor's Office for their monthly meeting.

Mrs. Irene Steffey was employed to replace a teacher that had resigned.

The Board approved Title II of the Elementary Education Act for 1966-67, which is part of a Federal Assistance program and in this instance will grant financial help for the library. Upon Paul Manning's suggestion, a Text Book Selection Committee was established and members of it were approved. Manning also reported on the effect that the new minimum wage law would have on certain employees of the school system and a cafeteria participation report was given.

Les Lichte Is New Owner Of Delinting Plant

Les Lichte, Littlefield seed and delinting man, announced this week that he had purchased the South Plains Seed and Delinting Company in Levelland, and will immediately offer service to the farmers in this area with offices and warehouses in both Littlefield and Levelland.

Local offices are located at 18th and Hall Avenue with warehouse facilities on the Lubbock Highway. Dry acid delinting is featured at the plant, which was built two years ago. Mr. Lichte has been in the delinting business since 1959 and the plant he was associated with L. E. Sullins burned this spring.

Tommy Sisson and H. M. Davila, both employees of the Sullins-Lichte plant, are associated with the new firm and are well experienced in the seed business. Mr. Lichte will continue to live in Littlefield.

Lamb Countians Reject Four Amendments

Lamb Countians approved 12 of the 16 proposed amendments but did reject four of them. Those rejected were the third, the fourth, fifth, and thirteenth. The third amendment concerned withdrawing Arlington State College from the Permanent University Fund. The fourth proposed changing the maximum term of office in conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years. The fifth proposed establishment of a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability, and Death benefits for various officials throughout the State. The thirteenth would have consolidated the functions of government of any county having one

million, two hundred thousand inhabitants. 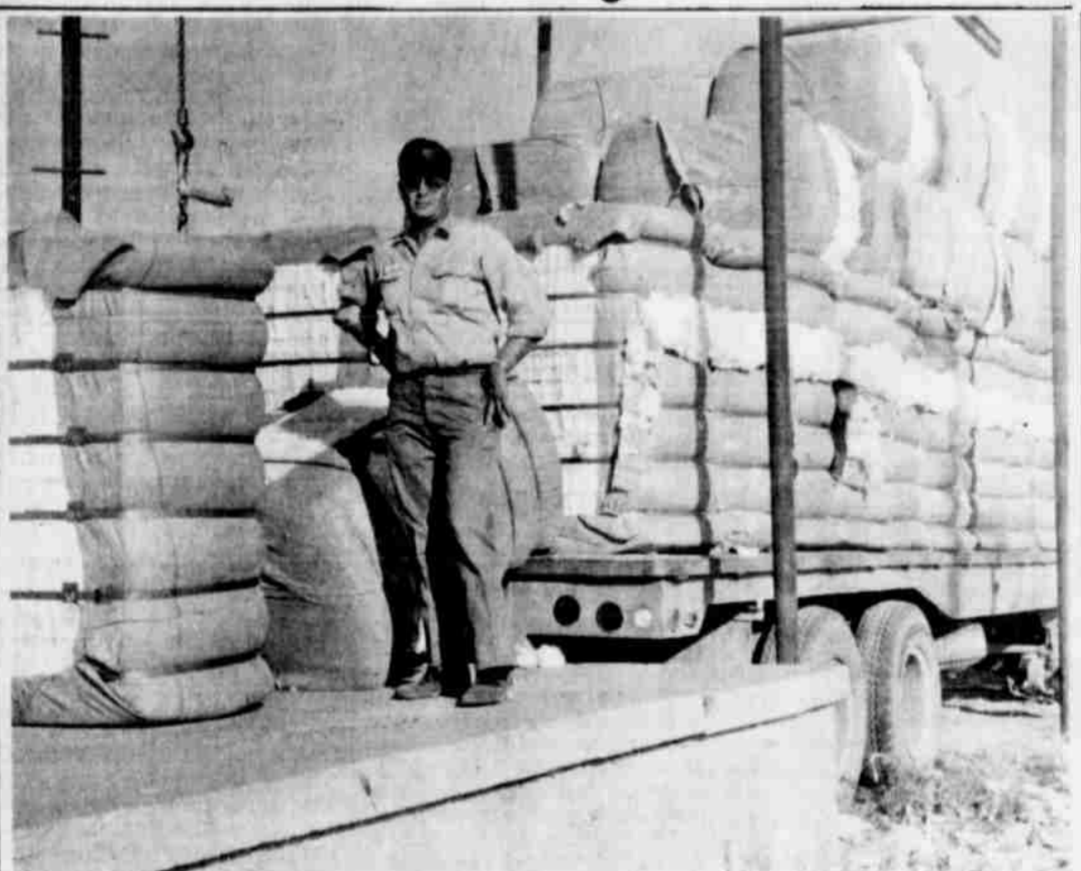

Wildcats Face Levelland Lobos Friday Night

Nobody, but nobody, could beat Littlefield that year. In fact, it had been years since the Wildcats had been defeated in football. The team had strung together a consecutive winning streak of 22 games, which is indeed phenomenal in high school football.

In 1950, the Wildcats had practically pulverized every opponent that came along. They were averaging 36.6 points per game. The teams they faced could only come up with an average of 12.1 points per game. Littlefield was riding high. Surely nobody could stop them. Or so it was thought.

Then the roof caved in. The bubble burst. The mountain was moved. The string was broken. It was broken mercilessly.

And who did it? Perhaps you've guessed by now. Yes, that old arch rival, Levelland, took advantage of fumbles and interceptions and thoroughly trounced Littlefield 26-14, almost as badly as they had been taking care of their own opposition. Levelland gained less yards. They made less first downs. But they came out on top of a lopsided score.

The situation in 1966 is somewhat similar for Littlefield. The Cats are in a winning year. They broke the back last week of the leading contender, Lamesa. They trained hard and played

well to do it. And who comes up on the agenda, but the Levelland Lobos! Week after week, the Lobos are getting better. They have been gearing for Littlefield like we geared for Lamesa last week. They lost by only one point, last week, to Lakeview. They wouldn't care if they lost all their games if they could only beat Littlefield.

their den Friday night. They want that trophy back that stands in the trophy case at Littlefield High School. The trophy shows a symbol of the Cats and the Lobos and one or the other is always in a trap.

Last year, the Cats won 25-6 so the Lobos are in the trap. They intend to change that if they can.

They'll send a sharp passer and quarterback into the game, Jerry Penner, who will keep the Cat's defense guessing. They have three players from last year with gridiron experi-

ence in the persons of Dale Williamson, 185 pound tackle and backs, Ronny Fite and Mike Pynes. Two big fullbacks, Mike Stevens and Gaylen Seagler, will alternate at that post and 185-pounder, Doug Russell will give plenty of trouble at the guard spot.

How easy it would be for the Wildcats to relax for this one. But, they still have to win. They'll have to fight hard to get on top. The defense will have to be alert. Tim Tapley will have to use all the skill at his command in callings plays because the Lobos have been scouting us carefully all year.

There can be no coasting now for the minute we do, the upset-minded Lobos will gobble us up. They're in the trap now. Let's keep them there!

Tickets Ready For Lobo Game

960 tickets have been secured for the Littlefield-Levelland football game Friday night. They are on sale at Britain's Pharmacy and will be there until sometime after dinner on Friday.

They consist of reserved seats on the east side of Lobo Stadium and cost \$1.50 for adults and \$.50 for students.

Comparatively light voting in Lamb County seemed to be reflected throughout the state in last Tuesday's General Election. There were exceptions in some areas where interest had been stimulated in local races. It seemed that the old principle of "No hot governor's race-no voter turnout" applied in this case.

There were estimates of the probable turnout from authorities that ranged from a low of 1.5 million to a high of 2.1 million. At the last unofficial count, it looked like 1.3 million Texans cast their ballots.

This light turnout, as was predicted, seemed to hurt some democratic candidates. However, there were some who claimed that a heavy turnout would represent a protest vote and this would help republican candidates.

In Lamb County, a total of 3,662 voters went to the polls which was a drop from 6,452 in the presidential election year of 1964 and a drop from 4,450 in the last off-year election in 1962.

Percentage wise, the picture did not look so bad in the county. There are 4,963 eligible voters in the county plus the over-60 years of age exemptions. So the percentage of votes cast was somewhat in excess of 70%.

In the two hotly contested races, one was extra close while the other showed a clear majority for a candidate.

Dee Miller of Amarillo barely edged his republican opponent, Bob Price of Pampa, in the Lamb County balloting in the 18th District Congressional race. The vote was Miller - 1,766 and Price - 1,762. However, Price more than offset Miller's strength in the southern part of the district by soundly trouncing his Democratic opponent in Miller's home area of Amarillo and winning the northern panhandle. By winning this race, Price became one of two republican congressmen elected from Texas.

In the United States Senate race, incumbent John Tower outdistanced his Democratic opponent Waggoner Carr rather handsily in Lamb County as he did throughout the state. The Lamb County vote was Tower - 1,898 and Carr - 1,569.

In all the other statewide races, substantial margins were given to the Democratic nominees by Lamb County voters.

The Constitutional Amendments, which drew little interest, are reported on in another story in this edition.

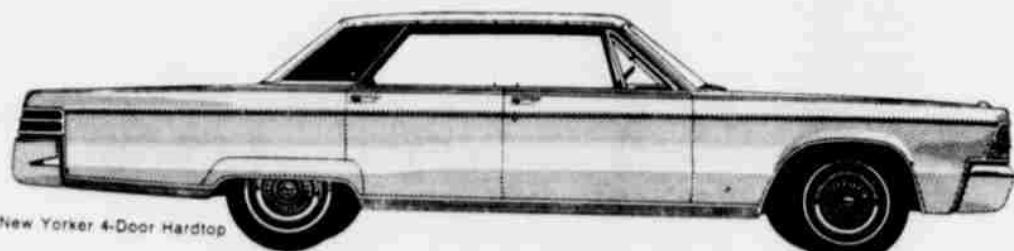

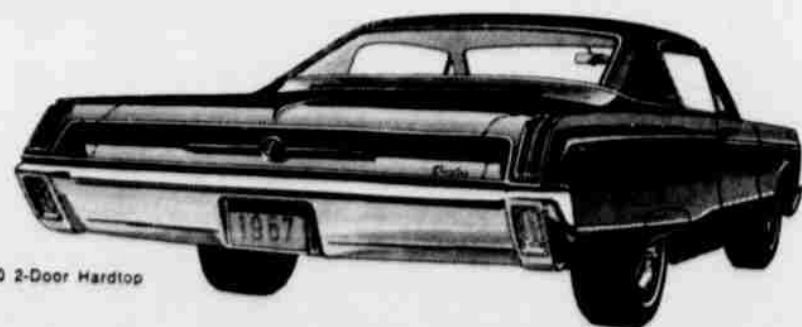
His works have received ribbons in the South Plains Fair the last two years. He won a red and blue ribbon this year.

LEMON RUM CAKE

- 1 box lemon velvet cake mix
 - 1 box lemon jello (added to dry mix)
 - 3/4 cup rum
 - 3/4 cup wesson oil
 - 6 eggs
- Beat 2 minutes, mix and bake in tube pan 350 degrees for one hour.

GLAZE

- Mix 2 cups powdered sugar (1/2 box), 1/2 cup orange juice to juice of one lemon. Pour over cake while cake is hot - let cool in pan. Good for deep freeze.

KENTUCKY PRUNE CAKE

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup cooked, cut prunes
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- pinch salt

Mix sugar, oils and eggs, add sifted ingredients alternating with milk. Add vanilla, nuts, and prunes. Bake at 300 degrees until sides shrink from pan and top springs back when pressed.

BUTTERMILK ICING

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1/4 cup buttermilk
 - 1/4 teaspoon soda
 - 1 tablespoon white syrup
 - 1/4 stick butter
- Cook all together to soft ball stage and pour over hot cake. Loaf or layer. Good for deep freeze.

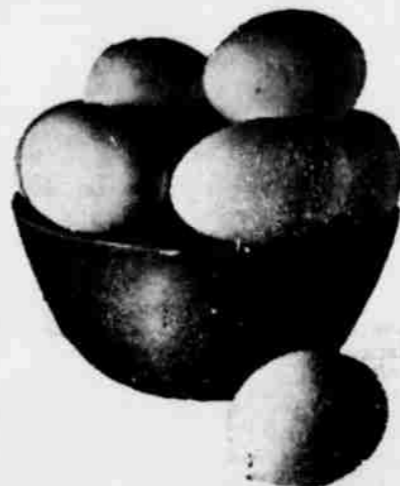

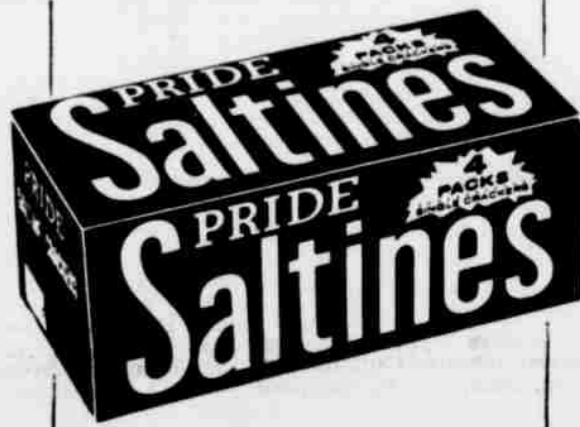

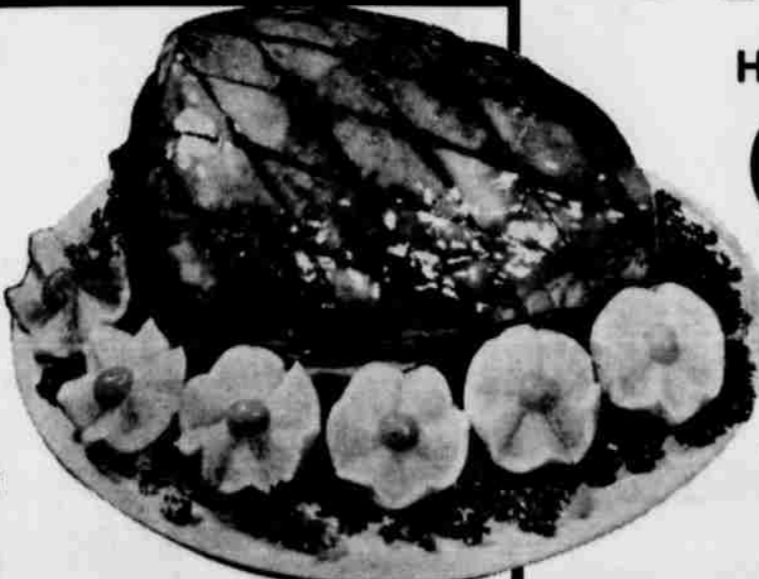

Milburn Starnes Services Slated

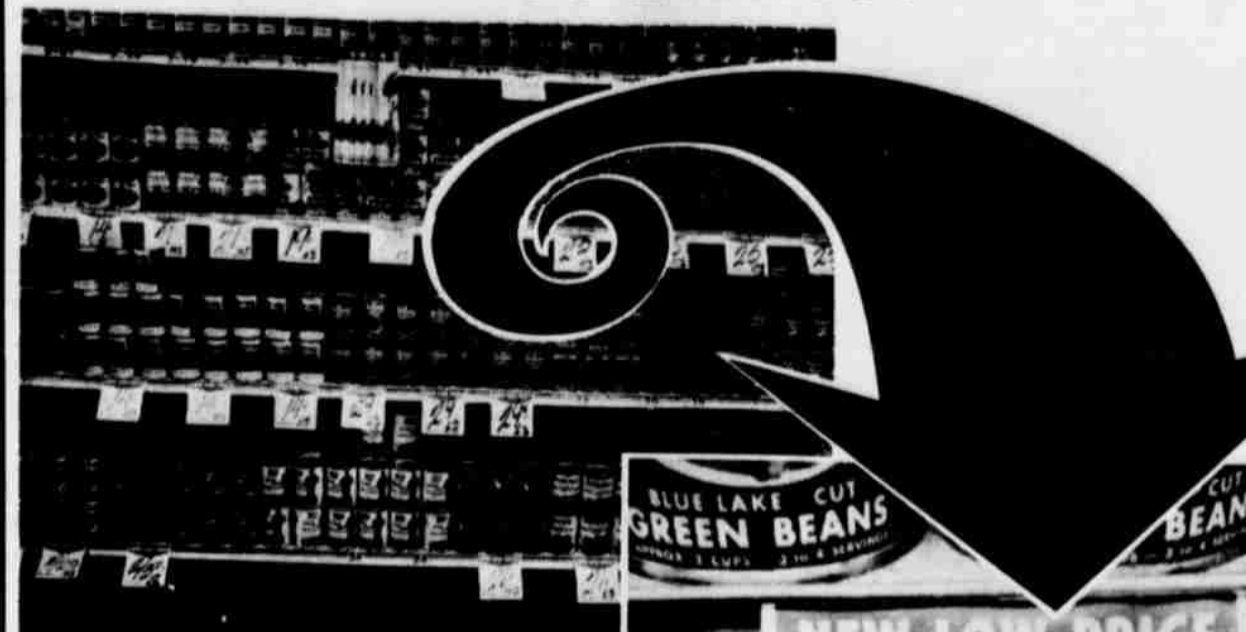

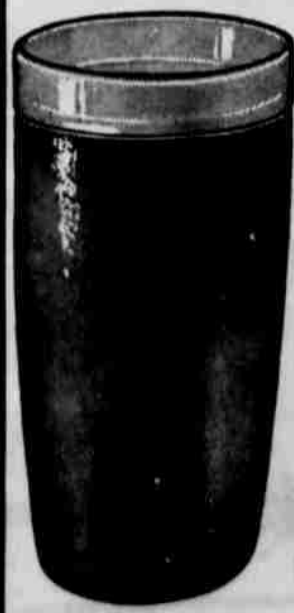

Harvey Read Election Returns In Advance

Americans voted "against" last Tuesday.

Except for a couple of gubernatorial races where personalities dominated issues, Americans voted "against," I saw it coming. Recently, I had conducted a survey of my own in a dozen states. When I had fielded questions from school-age and adult audiences, I asked a turn at bat for myself. Selecting members of the audience at random, I asked such questions as:

What would you do about Vietnam?

What would you do about foreign aid, domestic welfare?

What would you do about increasing crime?

What would you do with the children of unwed mothers?

Then, when the designee had expressed himself or herself, I would ask for a show of hands, for or against.

It was obvious from these intellectual jam sessions that you were angry.

So Tuesday, in the American tradition, at the ballot box, you rebelled.

Read the rest of this, please, even if it begins to sound like Wednesday-morning quarterbacking.

In advance, I knew that three issues preoccupied potential voters: Vietnam, government spending and crime. Under

"crime," is included a resentment of violent demonstrations. I knew that if the Vietnam war as we have been fighting it were put to a vote, it would be buried under an avalanche of protest. Only in Dearborn, Michigan was the issue on the ballot, and there voters had to choose between continuing as is -- and getting out.

Nationally, frustrated, exasperated voters had only one way to vote "no" and that was to protest the status quo. And that is why we will see so many new faces in Washington in January. Unlike the Dearborn ballot, I had asked three questions:

Should we keep doing what we are doing?

Should we get out?

Should we fight however necessary to win quickly?

I found opinion almost equally divided between getting out and getting it over with. Only an insignificant fraction of our population approved the gradual escalation, the timid approach, the continuing footsoldier sacrifice.

I mention this today not just to say, "I told you so."

I mention it because our enemies must not misinterpret your reaction.

Moscow and Peking might deduce from last Tuesday's overthrow of several Johnson party liners that Americans are willing to forfeit all foreign obligations.

America was, is, and remains prepared to assist nations which are willing to do their own fighting.

But the "voter rebellion" was more than anything a revulsion against pussyfooting. Americans consider fighting communism in Asia and tolerating it in Cuba hypocritical.

They, in the unterrified, un-intimidated nine-tenths of this country that's still country, figure wars are to be avoided or to be won; anything in between is unworthy, unwise and un-American.

The above words were written at my own risk one week week prior to election day and were in the hands of your editor last Monday.

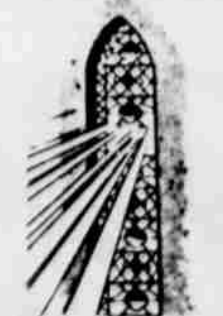
