On the 22nd of December the Albus family left to spend Christmas at Rhineland, with the recently widwed mother of Mr. Albus. Mildred became serious shortly after the family reached Rhineland. A physician was summoned, but his efforts to check the range of the dread diswere unavailing. Thursday night the little sufferer was released from pain. Funeral services were held the next day. Interment was made at Rhineland.
