Shots Down Jap Aircraft Over Japan

VII FIGHTER COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, IWO JIMA — Second Lieutenant Henry E. of Lubbock, Texas, a VII Fighter Command P-51 pilot, shot down one and possibly two Japanese aircraft over the Japanese Empire May 29, while escorting XXI Bomber Command Superfortresses on a Yokohama strike, was told immediately after he landed.

He was making his fifth mission to the home islands of Japan when one of eight enemy fighters attempted to attack the B-29's remaining from their target. Lieutenant Koke, with his wingman, made a pass at an Oscar, a single enemy fighter.

"I saw hits in his cockpit," Lieutenant Koke said, "and then he spun in."

Lieutenant Koke flew on out over Yokohama and over the water, where more Nipponese sneaked in and the flight.

We scissored back and forth and he evasive action, I managed to get one in my sights," he said. "I was firing from a stalled position so I didn't see him after I got into a spin. But before I fell, I observed hits on his cockpit engine."

A soldier since Nov. 18, 1942, he has been overseas with the Air Service Command for 19 months. Before entering the service he was employed by an oil company in Lubbock, Texas.

Cpl. Travis A. Kornegay, 22, of Littlefield, son of Mrs. P. I. Trammell and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Hatcher of near Littlefield arrived in the States in February last, and has since that time been a patient in a hospital at Camp Pickett, Va. He arrived in Littlefield Friday, after being overseas six months.

Cpl. Kornegay has been action in Belgium, and Germany, and was wounded in the breakthrough of the Germans. He lost two fingers on his left hand; suffered a bullet wound in the middle finger of the right hand, and a shrapnel wound in left shoulder.

Cpl. Kornegay was with the 78th Division of the Infantry and with the First Army. He had lived with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Hatcher, for 17 years, and with them here four years before leaving for the service.

Cpl. Kornegay has a wife and young daughter in Camden, N. J.

Awarded Infantry Combat Badge

Oversubscribes In Individual Bonds \$11,162

Overall Quota Will Be Met When Bonds Processed Through Federal Reserve

"When all bonds have been processed through the Federal Reserve Bank, Lamb County will again have exceeded their overall quota, by at least \$15,000," said C. O. Stone, County Chairman of Seventh War Loan Drive, Wednesday.

Lamb County's quota is \$725,000, with E. Bond quota of \$330,000.00. As of Tuesday, June 19, there have been processed through the Federal Reserve Bank \$303,312.50 in E-Bonds, which are the smaller individual bonds. All bonds processed through the Federal Reserve as of that totalled \$525,700.00.

Mr. Stone, however, reports that tabulations over the County from the various issuing agencies show a total of \$341,162.50 in E-Bonds purchased, indicating that Lamb County has over-subscribed in E-Bonds purchased, in the amount of \$11,162.50.

Mr. Stone also added that from unofficial figures on all bonds purchased it would indicate that when all bonds are processed through the Federal Reserve bank, it will show Lamb County has exceeded its overall quota approximately \$15,000.

"Lamb County citizens have done a wonderful job in buying E-Bonds", stated Mr. Stone, adding—"It was through their purchases that it was made possible to reach our quota within the time allotted to the drive."

Official rates will be reported in next week's Leader.

Veterans May Redeem Them At Local Postoffice

Amount Due On Each Bond \$63.50 Including Interest

All Adjusted Service Bonds, issued to veterans of World War I, matured on June 15, 1945, and no interest is accruing after that date. The amount due on each bond is \$63.50, which includes \$50.00 principal and \$13.50 interest. A veteran holding Adjusted Service Bonds may take them to any post office for redemption.

On proper identification, the post office will accept the bonds, issue a receipt, and forward them to the Federal Reserve Bank for payment. The registered owner of the bonds will receive a check from the bank by mail.

Veterans may present their bonds directly to any Federal Reserve bank or branch or to the U. S. Treasurer, Washington, D. C. for payment.

Due to recent inquiries and because of the recent maturity date of the above Adjusted Service Bonds, the above explanation pertaining to said bonds speaks for itself.

Lamb County Oil News

Hunt Oil Company No. 1 Foust, east central Lamb county wild cat, in section 43, block B-1, R. M. Thompson survey, 11 miles east of Littlefield, had progressed under 6,004 feet, in gray dolomite, of the lower Permian, and was drilling ahead. Some sources indicate that they believe this well is running lower structurally than the two producers in the Anton field, about six miles to the south, but that condition does not cause those operators to be discouraged regarding possibilities of the project possibly producing oil.

There is a granite ridge that comes comparatively close to the surface, for granite, in that area. Some geologists say the wells so far completed in the Anton pool are on top of the granite ridge, and they are putting the Hunt exploration on a flank—and that might be the case, and that might make the No. 1 Foust a better prospect for production. The only way the theory can be proven or disproven is by drilling.

Humble Oil & Refining company No. 1 Bagwell, south-central Lamb exploration, in labor 25, league 673, State Capital school land survey, three and one-half miles southwest of Littlefield, had reached 6,650 feet, in dolomite, and was going ahead.

Humble No. 1 Leftwich, an outpost to the producers in the Anton field, had progressed under 6,270 feet in dolomite, drilling with cable tools.

Humble No. 1-B Leftwich, another Anton field extension effort, had reached 2,386 feet in anhydrite and shale, after setting 9 5-8 inch casing at 1,641 feet, with 1,000 sacks of cement.

Sgt. Cluck was in the same Tank Division as Sgt. Manuel, and was wounded in Germany. He has been in a Santa Barbara hospital for the past two months.

Sgt. Cluck said that the last time he saw Sgt. Manuel was when the medics were carrying him (Cluck) back of the lines after he had been wounded, and that when he saw Sgt. Manuel he said "Give the Germans hell. I'm going back to Texas." He said Sgt. Manuel was sitting out in front of his tank with both tracks shot off by the Germans. He said—"Go ahead, I'll see you later. We will get them."

Sgt. Kenneth Manuel was wounded April 12 in the right arm and is in a hospital at Oxford, England. He has been awarded the Purple Heart and a Bronze Star. A Red Cross worker does all the writing to Sgt. Manuel's parents. However, they received a letter recently, in which he said they had taken the cast off from his wrist down on his right arm, and that he hoped the next letter would be written by himself.

Sgt. Manuel's entire arm from his shoulder down has been in a cast.

Joe T. Aven Enroute Home From Okinawa

Joe T. Aven, Jr. of the Navy arrived in San Francisco Friday from Okinawa Island, and is expected home over the week end to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe T. Aven, Sr., and his wife, now living at McKinney, Texas, formerly of this city.

Boy Scouts and Victory Gardens

Backing up President Truman's appeal for more gardens, the nation's Boy Scouts are embarked in a program to raise a half million gardens this summer. As the war is now centered in the Pacific, home front attention is centered on the growing food crisis here and abroad.

The Boy Scouts of America with its membership of 1,916,637 boys and leaders, are furnishing a substantial part of the additional manpower needed by farmers and commercial producers. Last year more than 300,000 Boy Scouts worked on farms, and several hundred thousand Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts had their own gardens. Many groups of Scouts went out from towns and cities on "day hauls" to work on farms, returning at night.

The National Victory Garden Institute has obtained General MacArthur's interest and is offering on his behalf a General MacArthur Medal to those Scouts who do an outstanding job with their individual gardens. Those winning this honor will need to successfully cultivate, care for, harvest and put to good use a reasonable variety of products from gardens at least 400 square feet in size.

The 400 square foot requirement was arrived at on the basis that it represents a big enough job to warrant special recognition and that it is a large enough garden to be a major factor in the Food for Freedom program. Each garden will be inspected by a competent adult and the awards will be made not for "best" gardens but on the basis of meeting the high standards. The medal is for individual Scout gardens only. However, Scouts in a Troop or Patrol working together in a common garden plot will be eligible for the Green Thumb Certificate, which may be presented to all Scouts who produce food this year.

It Is Big Business

Milk cow population has shown an uninterrupted growth in the United States for many years except for the period right after the droughts of 1934 and 1936, when feed shortages necessitated heavy slaughters. In 1938 there were 24,466,000 milk cows on American farms. On January 1, 1945, the milk cow population had reached an all time high of 27,785,000.

Among the states of the Union, Wisconsin leads with over two and one-half million dairy cows. Other states in order are Minnesota, Texas, Iowa, New York, Illinois, Ohio, Missouri and Michigan, each boasting over a million dairy cows. The total volume of milk production, however, is more important. On this score, Wisconsin again leads with over twelve and a half billion pounds of milk a year.

"The value of milk cows alone on American farms is over \$2,800,000,000," states E. M. Harmon, Director of Public Relations, National Dairy Council. When the value of heifers being saved for milk production is added, the total for all cows and heifers kept for milk production in the United States is in excess of three and one-half billion dollars. This is the amount that American farmers have invested in cows and heifers kept for milk production.

A common recommendation is that the investment for buildings on the dairy farms should be about the same as that for the dairy animals themselves. When the value of pastures, crop lands, silos, fencing, milk houses, machinery and equipment is added, it is apparent that the job of producing milk alone is one of the greatest industries.

With South Plains Men In the Armed Forces

T-Sgt. E. E. Carter, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Carter of six miles southeast of Littlefield, who has been in the service 3½ years, saw service in North Africa, Sicily, Italy and France; took part in the Normandy invasion; and has since seen service in Austria and Germany.

In a recent interesting letter to his parents, T-Sgt. Carter wrote the following, which may be of interest to his many friends here:

Germany,
20 May, 1945

Dear Folks:

I will try and write you a few lines today. I want you to know that I got the package today and was glad to get it. I had a big dinner tonight—steak and French fried potatoes and gravy. Therefore, I didn't open the chicken today but will probably tomorrow if they don't have anything good at the kitchen.

I don't think I will ever gripe about what they charge to do my shirts and pants any more as I have been doing mine here of late. I have done all my washing and it is a job, too. I started to iron it but it run into too much work so I just put it away folded nicely. We are very close to the showers and I go very nearly every day and take a bath as there have been times that I did not have time to do the sort of thing. It has not been so bad here of late as we are living pretty good and it has not been the way that it was in Italy. This is a very pretty country in every way that you can think of. The mountains are very close and you can see the snow on them. The gardens are putting out and the people are working in them every day like nothing had ever happened over here.

There is a nice stream close to us and I have been trying to get down there to do a little fishing but just have not found time as yet.

We are about 35 miles from Munich and I never have been there and hope that I don't have to go there for anything. I would like to get out of this place as soon as I can,

not that I want to go to the other war, which I don't think that I will, but who knows when I will get to go home. Some of the boys are leaving but as yet I have no idea when I will get to come home. I'd like to come home and see everyone and then come back over here to occupy until they get ready to let me out of this thing. Some of the boys think that we will get out of the army when we get to the States but I don't believe that we will. Over here you can do more like you want to and there are not as much bull going on in the camps as there are over there. The reason is that we are used to our officers and they know what we have gone through and are not as tough on us as they will be in the States. The radio keeps talking about over 85 points getting out and I have more than that.

I had a letter from Bill the other day and he said that there had been some talk about them getting out after they had been overseas 2 years but didn't know any thing definite about it at all. I don't think they will get to come home in the near future but he was not in as much danger as I was. If he stays there in his outfit he can stay his two years and not hurt anything. He wrote me about getting close enough to hear our guns go off and he did not understand how we were able to stand all the noise. I told him if that was all the things that we had to think about it was a cinch to get used to that, if you are ever under the enemy's fire our guns sound good.

Oh, I forgot to tell you, they took the censorship off our mail today and we can tell anything we want to tell, if you want to know any thing just drop me a line and I will be very glad to try and answer it if I know the answer.

This thing wound up in the funniest way that I ever saw anything. After we crossed the Rhine it was no trouble at all to get them. However, we had no part of the Rhine River crossing and I am very glad of that. We have been very lucky in missing some of the bad things of this war. One thing, we were not in on the Rapido river in Italy. We were very close to the river and when the others crossed we were to take off but instead we sit there for a day or so before they could get other plans for us. When we did it was hard but you never heard anything about it at the time and it would not do any good to tell you about it in a letter. Our Battalion has been the luckiest one in all this whole thing about casualties. We have had many but not as many as some of the others have.

This paper is some that I have picked up on my travels over this country and it is the best that I have seen over here. This type-writer is one that the German Army had and I took it over when I got to it. It is a real good one and it is just like ours except the "y" and "z" are changed but to a man that can type as good as I can it don't make any difference. I have found several things that I can use in my line of work and I have not failed to take them from the German Army. I have several paper cutters and paper punches, scissors and pencils, and mimeo-

All the time that we have been in combat they give us all the cigarettes that we could smoke and I sure do think that it helps a lot. Now that we are out of combat we may have to start buying them but I don't mind a bit. We are supposed to get a pack a day and that is enough to get by on as there are a few of the boys that don't smoke and that is enough to carry anybody that smokes more than that a day. We get a bar of chocolate candy every day which we do not like any more as it is tropical hershey. Then we have a weekly canteen that we pay for but it is not very much—about 5 cents a week, and in that we get some good candy and peanuts and I sure do like them. Coca Cola I have gotten used to doing without so long that I don't want them any more, all though when I was in England I drank several because I had not been used to them. I did not want them particularly but it was the idea that I could get them. The thing I miss more than anything is not being able to get something to eat at night like I could when I was in the States. We usually save our

packages for that and they will tide us over I guess until we can do better.

Well, it is nearly twelve o'clock so I think I will go to bed. It will seem funny to write a letter and seal it up and not have to bother some one to censor it for you. Write when you can.
