Mrs. J. L. Adams of Crosbyton is the nominee for District President. She has served for the past four years as District Vice-President and aide to the President.

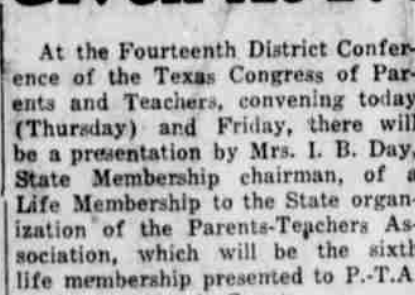
Active In P.-T.A. Work For 20 Years

LANGUAGE IS A COMBAT WEAPON — Knowledge of an enemy's language is important on the battle line, and American soldiers are afforded this additional facility in waging successful warfare.

The Army Education Branch of the Morale Services Division, ASF, has developed a simple method of teaching. Instruction in foreign languages is by listening and imitating. To get authentic pronunciation the Army uses special phonograph recordings made by native speakers. These records teach everyday phrases—how to ask directions, how to order a meal, how to call the doctor, etc., repeating the foreign word or phrase twice. The soldier repeats the foreign phrases aloud after he hears them on the record. Meanwhile he follows with his eye a pocket-size language guide which spells out the foreign word just as it sounds in English.

In this way the soldier after 10 to 12 hours of concentrated "imitating" can learn enough of the language to get along with native people when he arrives overseas. Sometimes language instruction is given on transports where the loud speaker system is hooked up to a record player and the whole ship's company is given lessons in the voyage overseas.

Ability to speak foreign languages increases the efficiency of the soldier in the opinion of officers in the battle zones and gives him more confidence in himself. Knowing the right thing to say at the right time may even save his life.

A release to the Leader has just been received from an Eighth AAF Liberator station, England, and censored April 3, together with a photograph showing Capt. Samuel E. Blessing, pilot of the Liberator, "Little Gramper," with 1st. Lieut. Raymond T. Gallagher, bombardier, after the two had returned from an aerial battle over targets in Europe to their station "somewhere in England."

The release further states: "Lieut. Gallagher today is serving as gunnery officer of a combat wing in England and Captain Blessing is acting as instructor, at his new Liberator station."

"The two men are well qualified for their new posts, having had combat experience in three theatres, the Middle East, Africa and the ETO."

"Lieut. Gallagher, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Gallagher of 1923 Sanderson Ave., Scranton, Pa., holds the Distinguished Flying Cross with Cluster and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Cluster. He was first cited for taking part in the record low level bombing attack on Ploesti on August 1, 1943."

"Native of Scranton, Lieut. Gallagher attended Scranton Central High school and the University of Pennsylvania. He joined the AAF in March, 1942, getting his wings at Roswell Field, N. M., 11 months later. He is married to the former Gertrude Halman of 2123 West 6th St., Santa Anna, California."

"As pilot of "Little Gramper," Captain Blessing has flown on some of the roughest missions which his Liberator group has engaged in for the past eight months. Included among these missions were two daylight bombing attacks on targets over Berlin."

"Captain Blessing, 21 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy F. Blessing of Littlefield, Texas, attended Littlefield High. He joined the AAF, June 14, 1942, getting his wings at Kelly Field on March 20, 1943. The Liberator Pilot has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters. He is married to the former Betty Lorraine Hunsaker of San Jose, California."

The Leader appreciated a letter from Pvt. Jimmie Chapman of the Marines, stationed at San Diego, just received. Pvt. Chapman, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dee Chapman, left here March 13. His letter follows:

"I just wanted to write and tell you how much I miss your paper. I am going to write mother and tell her to take it for me. You don't

know how much a fellow misses his home paper the first time he is away from home. Well, we are training hard. I have three other brothers in the Marines and they are all gone. G. W. and John Henry are in the South Pacific and Loyd is way up in Alaska. Well, I hope you answer my letter.

structor in anti-aircraft of the Coast Artillery at Fort Totten, New York.

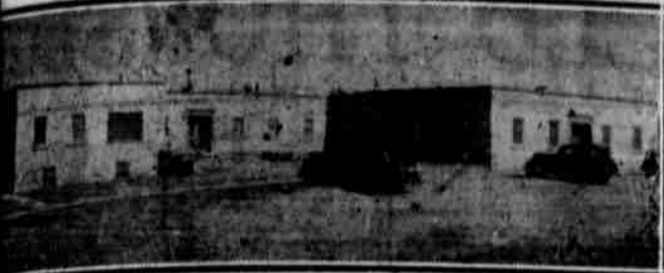

"Grow More In 44" Is Victory Slogan

"Grow More in 44" is the Victory Garden slogan for this year. Here are a few timely pointers from your Assistant County Agent, S. L. Garrison.

When the tomato plants get two to three inches high in the seed bed or in the frame garden, take them out and re-set them in a box. Fill the box with equal parts of fertilizer and good soil, wetting the soil and fertilizer as it is mixed. Wet the seed bed thoroughly before removing the plants and be especially careful not to injure the plants when removing them from the bed.

A box 18 to 30 inches is large enough for approximately 50 plants. Firm the soil by light tamping, and set the plants three to four inches apart. Then set the box in the shade in the open. Water every other day. Leave in this box until the plants are six to eight inches high, then set in the garden. To prevent the plants from wilting, take an old knife and cut the soil around the plants and leave as much of the soil as possible with the plants.

To give them extra vigor, mix one-fourth pound of Vigoro or 5-10-5 fertilizer in a gallon of water and pour around each plant. Water every two days until the tomatoes get a good start.

If early and choice tomatoes are desired they may be pruned when the plants are 10 to 12 inches high.

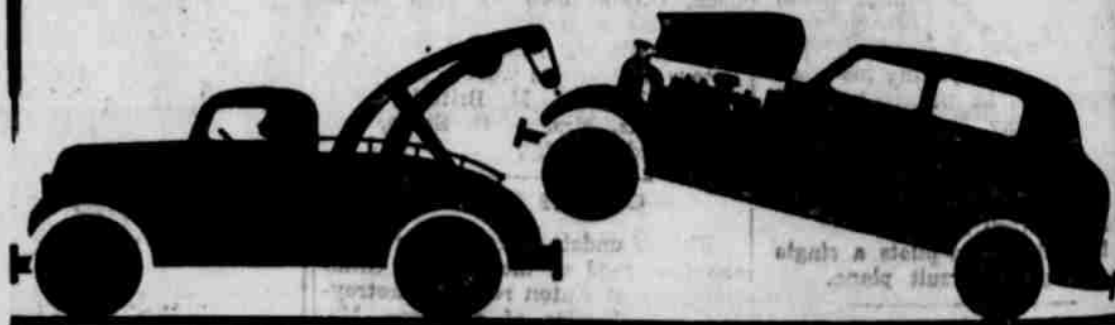

H. CUNNINGHAM INSTRUMENTAL ORGANIZING SEED GROWERS ASSN.

Large 1944 Acreage Will Be Handled by Mechanical Cotton Harvester

The Cotton Harvester is here, so W. H. Cunningham, local seed grower who has been watching the advent of these machines for the past 15 years. Last year Mr. Cunningham purchased a 2000 mechanical Cotton Harvester, harvested about 200 acres of cotton with this machine. While not a perfect machine, it will do the factory claims for it, or more.

Mr. Cunningham thinks that a large acreage of the 1944 cotton will be harvested with cotton harvesting machines. Some of the established farm machinery manufacturing companies now have cotton harvesters or cotton combines for the market. In fact, Mr. Cunningham says that the manufacturers will have a good workable harvester before the cotton is harvested with a good combine type. But, says he, we will soon have such a cotton available to all growers. Mr. Cunningham has been working on an early maturing, storm resistant type of cotton for a number of years, which is a great step toward mechanical harvesting. Says he, we got the grain combine, then we made the grain suitable for the combine, and we can do the same with cotton.

New Pure Seed Grower Organization Formed In 1924

Certification began in 1924 with 18 cotton seed firms licensed. The Seed Law was amended to include grain sorghums. Three firms were State inspected and Certified that year. In 1930 seven seed firms met all the requirements and were licensed to grow and sell Certified Seed.

H. Cunningham, one of our county seed growers, was one of seven, and today he is the one of that first seven that is licensed to grow and sell Certified Seed. Mr. Cunningham was producing Pure Seed in Lamb County before the State Seed Law was amended

The State Certified Seed Growers Association was organized in 1931, when there were only seven licensed growers of Grain Sorghum Seed in Texas. W. H. Cunningham, then of Haskell County, called the growers together, and they organized their first seed marketing association. In 1937 the name was changed to Texas Certified Seed Growers Association.

The present officers of the Association are as follows: W. H. Cunningham of Littlefield, president; Howard McCauley, Lubbock, vice-president; Aubrey Edwards, Shallowater, secretary-treasurer.

Association headquarters are in Lubbock, where they have their own warehouse and state office.

In addition to being president of the Texas Certified Seed Growers Association, Mr. Cunningham is also vice-president of the Texas Seed Breeders Association, which association is composed of Cotton Seed Breeders, Hybrid Corn Breeders, and small grains, as well as the grain sorghum group. This is the parent association of all Seed Breeders in Texas. Mr. Ferris Watson of Garland is president; W. H. Cunningham, vice-president; Dr. E. P. Humbert, head of the Department of Genetic, Texas A. & M. College, is secretary-treasurer.

Licensed Growers Increasing Acreage

There were 26 firms or individuals licensed to produce Certified seed in 1943, with a total acreage of 4745 acres for Certification. In 1944 several new growers may be added, and the total contemplated acreage will be about 10,480 acres, or more than 100 per cent increase. The State and Federal Department of Agriculture have asked for an increase in Pure Seed, therefore, most every licensed grower is increasing his acreage. Mr. W. H. Cunningham of near Littlefield is among the largest growers in Texas. Lamb County also has other large growers.

All essays must be in the hands of the assistant county agent by May 15, and must be written on notebook paper, typed or in ink, and must contain name, address and name of club.

Each essay must be accompanied with an agreement blank, signed by the contestant, which will include agreement to feed, care for, and breed the pigs under the direction of the county agent, and to return to him the choicest gilt from the first litter on or after ten weeks of age.

The boy who receives the boar will be required to give free service to all Sears gilts in the county awarded this year for the first litter of pigs.

All pigs will be delivered to the winners of essay on a date to be set and announced later.

Around October 1, 1944, the gilts will be showed and judged for best development as breeding stock. At that time Sears Roebuck Foundation will award 125 high quality baby chicks for first place and 100 each for the next four places.

The prize gilt and the boar will go to the district show where dairy heifers will be awarded as prizes.

Jimmie Zed Robinson Arrives Home Tuesday

Jimmie Zed Robinson, P. of the U. S. Navy, who arrived home Tuesday on a 15 day leave after having been overseas a year and a half, made the trip by plane from North Africa to Putexent River, Maryland, in one day. He states, however, that they gained six hours on the trip. He had to lay over in Washington a day and a half, and leaving Washington by plane at 12:30 a. m. Tuesday he arrived in Amarillo by plane at 2 p. m. in the afternoon.

Jimmie Zed, for his tender age of 18 years, has been some distance since he left Littlefield. He leads a band of entertainers, which he calls the "Smokey Mountain Ridge Runners" and he and his band have entertained troops from Dakar, South Africa, to Casablanca, North Africa, and on to Algiers, Tunis, Bizerte, Tripoli, Alexander and Cairo, also Naples, Italy, Salerno, Gibraltar, and into the interior of North Africa to

Marrakech, Meknes, Fez, etc. He and his band traveled two months with Humphrey Bogart in North Africa, entertaining the service men as they went. Jimmie Zed is also the featherweight champion boxer for North Africa for this year. In his absence "Rum" Morgan, CM 1-C, is in charge of his band.

Jimmie Zed came home in response to a cablegram received to the effect that his grandfather was seriously ill. He did not receive the later cable sent notifying him of his grandfather's death.

Jimmie Zed was in the original group who made the invasion of Africa in November 8, 1942. He received a wound on his head, and was sent to the Naval hospital at Norfolk, Va., where he spent two weeks, returning to Casablanca April 14, 1943.

Sgt. O. K. Yantis of an Engineering Corps in the Air Forces, and brother-in-law of Jimmie Zed, arrived home from Puerto Rico April 18. He will report back to El Paso for reassignment on May 15.

Plans are underway by the Robinson and Blessing families to have a reunion. Capt. Samuel Blessing is expected home anytime, and Geraldine Robinson of the Waves, specialist gunner, third class, sister of Jimmie Zed and Mrs. O. K. Yantis, Jr., stationed at San Diego, was contacted by phone Tuesday evening, and it is hoped she will be able to secure a leave to come home to visit with her brother and other relatives.

FIRE CAUSES WOMAN SEVERE SHOCK; TEXACO LOADING DOCK, TIRES BURN

A blaze which might have been most serious occurred at the local Texaco wholesale Thursday about 10:30 a. m.

Reports indicate that gas was being unloaded from a large transport truck into an underground tank, when the electric pump closeby caught fire, spreading and causing one compartment of the tank on the six wheel transport truck to explode, destroying four truck tires, and also burning down the loading dock.

W. F. Jarnagin, who was putting fuel in the fuel tank of the Texaco delivery truck at the time the pump caught fire, was treated at the Littlefield Hospital for burns on his left hand and face.

The fire went so close to the Gulf wholesale office and warehouse, as to crack the glass in the office window, and to cause such nervous

shock to Mrs. Grissom who was there alone at the time, and who telephoned the local fire department, as to cause her confinement in the Littlefield hospital the balance of the day and Friday. Mr. Grissom was out of town at the time.

The blaze was also close to the overhead tank containing about 35,000 gallons of gasoline, and had it exploded, it would have been much more serious causing loss of life, and considerable property in that area. The Gulf wholesale, being housed in a galvanized building, no doubt saved it from the blaze.

The Littlefield Fire Department were summoned to the scene, and are reported to have done valiant work in preventing the blaze from spreading. Those on the scene at the time greatly commend this body for their splendid work done.
