

But investigations reveal that the same checks bearing spurious endorsements have been cleared through Texas banks to Austin for payments. ed by the government and returned to the banks sending them in.

Bill is handled by the Veterans Administration and that he had been informed that the 50 cases had been turned over to the chief attorneys of the regional VA offices. 
