One Killed; Five Injured In Car Accident Sunday

Richardo A. Gonzales, 18-year-old Mexican from Laredo, was killed and five other persons injured in an automobile accident four miles East of Littlefield on the Lubbock-Littlefield Highway about 1 o'clock Sunday morning.

The body was transferred to Laredo Sunday by Hammons Funeral Home for burial.

The fatally injured youth had been picking cotton in vicinity of Littlefield.

Five other persons suffered injuries in the accident. All were believed minor except in case of Jack Poer, 30, of Littlefield route 2 who suffered fractures of a leg in two places and entered Payne-Shotwell hospital in Littlefield.

A sedan driven by Lonnie Law-

rence Chamberlain, Jr., 21, of West of Spade, owned by his father, L. L. Chamberlain, Sr. and traveling south-eastward, is reported to have been in collision with the left rear of a car being driven by Hayden Yandell, 22, of three miles south of Yellowhouse Switch, in the same direction. The Chamberlain car went out of control and overturned several times, according to highway patrol.

In the Yandell car were Mrs. Yandell and two nieces, Joyce and Jean Castleman, aged 13 and 11. Yandell's wife was injured slightly, but did not enter a hospital.

In the Chamberlain car, in addition to L. L. Chamberlain, Jr. were Poer and four Mexicans, the fatally injured man and his brother, Juan A. Gonzales, 17, Florencio Vasquez, 18

of Waco, and Vivian Vasquez, of Donna. Three Mexicans were taken to Payne-Shotwell Hospital for treatment.

It was necessary to take several stitches in Vivian Vasquez's leg, and in Florencio Vasquez' head to close the wounds.

It is reported that Chamberlain had picked up the Mexicans to give them a ride to Lubbock.

Chamberlain was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Prentiss Graham, and lodged in Littlefield jail. A charge of negligent homicide was filed against him Monday in District Court. He appeared before Justice of the Peace S. J. Farquhar, and bond set at 1000. Chamberlain was released on making bond.

C. of C. Head Talks on Soil Conservation

Jack Christian, President of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, delivered a splendid address over KVOW Sunday on soil conservation, bringing out the urgent need of soil conservation, and warning regarding the ill practices of the soil.

He reported on the Louis Brumfield lecture at Lubbock recently, which was sponsored by the Second National Bank of Houston in conjunction with the Burlington Railroad. He outlined historical happenings of such countries as Egypt, Greece and Italy as regards their former high productivity, and their recent terrific decline due principally to the fact that the productivity of the soil has been completely exhausted. He pointed out that at one time these countries feed their portion of the world, but today we are forced to feed them.

Mr. Christian in his talk stated that taking a lesson from what has happened to the above countries, it is easily seen that in order to maintain our present high soil production, it is necessary that the soil be given

proper attention, that everyone think in terms of soil conservation and that the soil be kept built up.

According to Mr. Christian shortly after the first of the year the Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a meeting of all Lamb County farmers, at which Conservation experts from the State Dept will be present and present a soil conservation program.

He stated that "if our soil keeps breaking down at present rate without any check or measures taken to insure its permanence, in 20 years time we will be unable to feed ourselves, let alone the rest of the world."

The shooting is said to have been the result of an argument between Handsborough and another negro, who took place about 2 a. m. Sunday at the farm of A. J. Wallace at Bula.

A charge alleging murder was filed against Handsborough by the Sheriff's Department. He appeared before Justice of the Peace S. J. Farquhar Tuesday afternoon, and bond set at \$3000.

The remains of the colored child were taken Sunday morning to a colorist's home at Lubbock for shipment to Blooming Grove, Texas, for burial.

Alvin Webb as Chairman of the Library Committee, recently named by the Chamber of Commerce, and Dr. Ira Woods, Joe Hut-

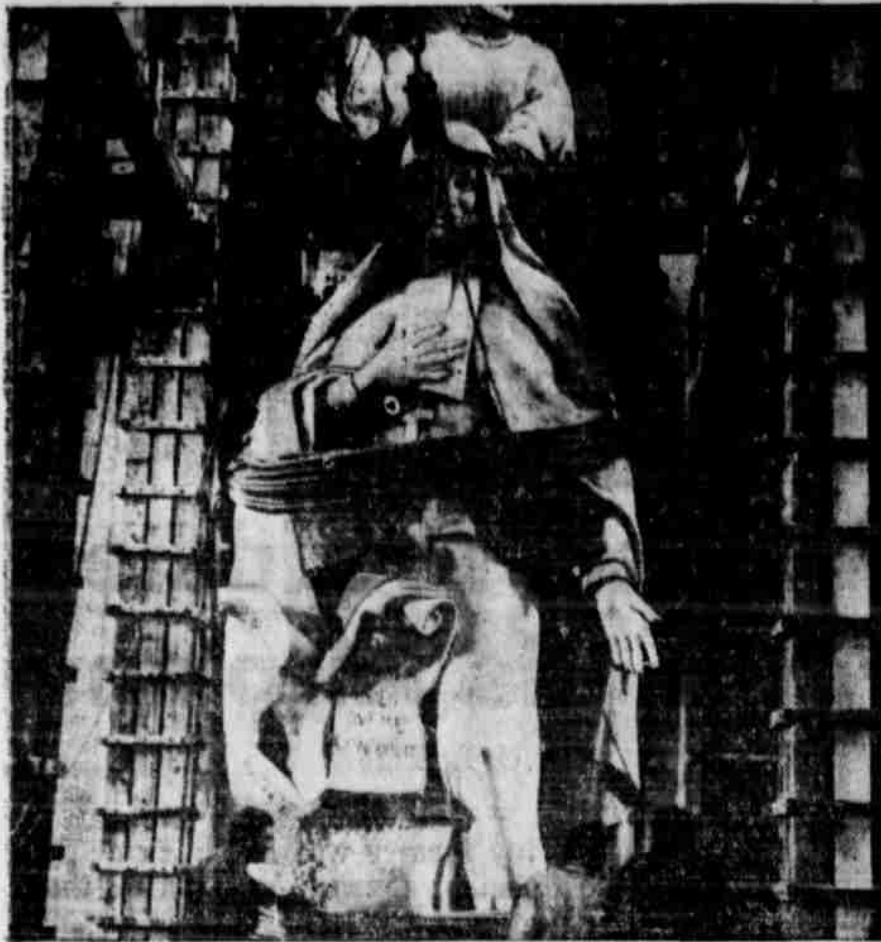
chinson and Charles Signor, this group is working with the Library Committee of the Woman's Club in an endeavor to enlarge the library, and possibly erect a building to house this project.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 103
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF Littlefield, Texas, regulating taxicabs and taxicab transportation, defining terms, creating the office of director of transportation, requiring permits, providing a license for operators, specifying regulations concerning taxicabs, taxicab companies and operators, specifying rates to be charged, requiring performance bond and insurance, providing for inspections, fixing charges, levying a street rental charge, providing for cancellation of permits and licenses, providing a penalty for violations, providing a savings clause and an effective clause.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF LITTLEFIELD, TEXAS: SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS

Unless it shall appear from the context that a different meaning is intended, certain words and terms used in this ordinance are defined and explained as follows:

(a) The term "City" as used herein means the City of Littlefield, Texas, located in Lamb County, Texas.

(b) The term "Commission" as used herein means the City Commission of the City of Littlefield, Texas.

(c) The term "Street" or "Streets" as used herein shall mean and include any street, avenue, boulevard, drive, road, thoroughfare, alley, public way, or highway commonly used for public travel within the corporate limits of the City of Littlefield, Texas.

(d) The term "person" as used herein shall mean and include any person, individual, corporation, partnership, firm, association, society or group of individuals, and shall include the lessees, trustees and receivers of any person, firm, corporation, partnership or association.

(e) The term "Taxicab" as used in this ordinance shall mean and include any automobile, cab, bus or any other motor propelled vehicle or carriage of any nature owned, controlled, managed, possessed or operated by any person or persons within the corporate limits of the City of Littlefield, Texas, not operated or to be operated on fixed routes and fixed schedules, engaged in the business of transporting persons and/or their luggage for compensation or hire over the streets of the City of Littlefield, Texas.

(f) The term "driver" or "Chauffeur" as used herein shall mean and include every person who actually drives or operates a taxicab as herein defined whether as owner or as agent, servant or employee of an owner.

(g) The term "Terminal" as used herein shall mean and include the depot or place at which place taxicabs shall be stationed, and at which place telephone calls and requests for taxicab service shall be made, and from which place a dispatcher shall control the movements of taxicabs, and shall embrace and include the area on which the depot is located and all driveways and parking space used for taxicabs.

(h) The term "Sub-terminal" as used herein shall mean and include any place, other than a terminal, where drivers or chauffeurs shall receive calls from a dispatcher and shall include all areas used by taxicabs while waiting for passengers.

(i) The term "Taxicab Company" as used herein shall mean and include any and every person, individual, firm, partnership, corporation, association or group of persons, or their lessees, trustees or receivers, owning, controlling, possessing, managing or operating any taxicab or taxicabs as defined herein.

(j) The term "Permit" shall mean and apply to the authorization granted to a taxicab company permitting it to operate a particular taxicab.

(k) The term "Director" shall mean and refer to the director of transportation of the City appointed by the City Commission.

(l) The term "Applicant" shall mean and refer to any person who has made application for a permit to operate a taxicab or taxicabs in the City of Littlefield, Texas.

(m) Pronouns of masculine gender shall include feminine gender.

SECTION 2. DIRECTOR OF TRANSPORTATION

The Commission is hereby authorized to appoint a person as Director of Transportation, who shall, with assistance of the members of the police force of the City, enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and any amendments hereof, and any ordinance hereafter written with respect to regulating transportation of passengers for hire in the City. The Director shall furnish the Commission with any information concerning taxicab companies, drivers and chauffeurs, when called for by the Commission or when, in the opinion of the director, such information should be furnished to the Commission. The Director of Transportation may be the City Marshal, Chief of Police, any member of the police force, any other employee of the City, or any other person the Commission may appoint as director.

SECTION 3. PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY AND PERMITS

(a) All taxicab companies, as herein defined, and all persons operating one or more taxicabs in the City are declared to be common carriers for hire and subject to regulation by the Commission of the City; and it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or taxicab company to operate a taxicab or taxicabs over any street of the City, except in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance.

(b) On and after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person or taxicab company to operate a taxicab within the corporate limits of the City

without the Commission first finds that the public convenience and necessity require the operation of such taxicab or taxicabs, and without there being first issued by the Commission to such person or taxicab company a certificate of public convenience and necessity and a permit. The finding of existence of public convenience and necessity for additional taxicab or taxicabs within the City shall not authorize a person or taxicab company to operate a taxicab or taxicabs within the City unless such person or taxicab company shall first be issued and delivered by the Commission a permit to do so.

(c) No certificate of public convenience and necessity or permit shall be issued until the Commission has first found that existing transportation facilities on the streets of the City do not provide adequate and sufficient transportation service to the public.

(d) No permit shall be issued to a person or taxicab company until the Commission has first found that such person or taxicab company is capable and qualified to furnish adequate transportation service, and that such person or taxicab company meets the other requirements and provisions of this ordinance, and that such person or taxicab company will obey and comply with the provisions hereof and all other ordinances of the City and the laws of the State of Texas, and no permit will be issued until bond and insurance have been furnished and approved as hereinafter provided.

(e) No permit will be issued except upon application and hearing as herein provided.

SECTION 4. APPLICATION FOR CERTIFICATE AND PERMIT

Any person or taxicab company desiring to operate a taxicab or taxicabs in the City shall file with the City Secretary an application for certificate of public convenience and necessity and a permit. Such application shall be in writing, signed and sworn to by the applicant or by proper officer of applicant. The application shall contain and set forth the following information and facts: (1) The name and address of applicant, (2) Whether applicant is an individual, partnership, corporation or other organization and nature thereof, (3) The names and addresses of all partners, members, stockholders, directors and officers, if any, (4) The financial condition of applicant and the description and condition of all physical properties proposed to be used in operating a taxicab business in the City (5) A statement in detail of the inadequacies of existing taxicab facilities and service in the City, and all facts upon which the application is based, (6) Names of places where applicant has resided the last five years, (7) Applicant's experience, if any, in taxicab business, (8) A statement that applicant or any partner, member or officer of applicant is not under indictment or charge of nature of felony or crime involving moral turpitude, (9) A statement that applicant or any partner, member, director or officer has never been convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude (10) A statement that applicant or any partner, member, director or officer of applicant has never sold, possessed for sale or transported for sale intoxicating liquor of any nature, (11) A statement that applicant will not possess for sale or transport intoxicating liquor at any terminal or sub-terminal, or in any taxicab, and will not sell or permit to be sold any intoxicating liquor at any terminal, sub-terminal or in any taxicab, and will not transport or permit to be transported any intoxicating liquor in any taxicab, (12) The locations and facilities of terminal and sub-terminals and number of taxicabs that are proposed to be used by applicant, (13) A statement that applicant will obey and comply with this ordinance, and with all other ordinances of the City and the laws of Texas in force in said City and (14) Such other information, statements and declarations as the Commission or director may require.

SECTION 5. HEARING ON APPLICATION

(a) Upon the filing of said application the Commission shall fix a time and place for hearing in the City. Reasonable notice of the hearing shall be given to applicant and all other taxicab companies in the City, before date of hearing, by telephone or mail or in person, and by posting notice at and in front of the City Hall.

(b) Any person interested in an application and any resident of the City may appear in person or by attorney and present such evidence and argument in favor of or against granting the application as the Commission may deem pertinent, and the Commission may make such investigation as it desires. The hearing may be continued from time to time without further notice as the Commission may decide.

(c) Within a reasonable time after the hearing is finally closed, the Commission will either grant or refuse the application for permit. No permit will be issued until the applicant shall have furnished bond and insurance approved by the Commission as herein provided. A permit, when issued, shall be good for the remainder of the calendar year, unless revoked and cancelled, and if the holder desires to continue operation, the permit may be renewed on the first day of January of the succeeding year.

(d) No permit shall be transferred except on approval of the transferee by the Commission.

(e) A permit may be issued for one or more taxicabs as the Commission may determine.

SECTION 6. BOND AND INSURANCE

(a) Before any permit to operate a taxicab or taxicabs shall become effective, and before any permit will be issued, the applicant will furnish to the City a good and sufficient performance bond in the sum of \$1000 signed by applicant and solvent and adequate sureties, to be approved by

the City Attorney as to form and contents and by the Commission as to sufficiency, performable and payable at Littlefield, in Lamb County, Texas, conditioned (1) that applicant shall well and truly pay to the City all amounts due or to become due to the City by applicant under this ordinance, or by contract, including all taxes, assessments and charges, as well as any fines that may be imposed upon applicant, (2) that applicant will comply with and obey the provisions of this and other ordinances of the City and the laws of Texas in force in the City, and (3) that applicant will perform all the duties of taxicab company or operator under the terms of this ordinance.

(b) Before any permit shall become effective, and before any permit shall be issued, the applicant shall procure and furnish to the City a policy of insurance issued by a reliable insurance company, to be approved as to form and contents by the City Attorney and as to sufficiency and reliability by the Commission, covering public liability and property damage in standard amounts and under standard provisions, on each and every taxicab operated by the applicant, with minimum amounts of liability as follows: \$10,000.00 for any single personal injury of one person, \$20,000.00 for personal injuries in any one single accident, and \$5,000.00 property damage in any single accident, such policy to cover injuries and damages to passengers in taxicabs as well as others.

(c) The Commission may for cause require the making of a new performance bond or the procuring of a new insurance policy, on reasonable notice.

SECTION 7. TERMINALS AND SUB-TERMINALS

The Commission shall approve all terminals and sub-terminals as to location and manner of use, and no terminal not thus approved shall be used. No change of terminal or sub-terminal shall be made without approval of the Commission.

SECTION 8. DRIVERS AND CHAUFFEURS

(a) No person, driver or chauffeur shall be permitted to drive or operate a taxicab in the City unless he shall have a Chauffeur's license issued by the State of Texas and also a license issued by the City. No such license shall be issued by the City until such person, driver or chauffeur shall furnish to the City in an application in writing under oath the following information: (1) His name and address, (2) Statement of his experience, (3) Date and number of State license, (4) A statement that he has never been convicted of a felony or of a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, (4) That he does not use intoxicants, and (5) Such other information as the Commission may desire. Such applicant for chauffeur's license shall furnish his photograph of full face view, 2 inches by 2 inches, in size, and a complete set of finger prints of both hands made in presence of a City police officer. He shall further present a certificate of a physician residing in the City certifying that he has no communicable disease and that he has no mental or physical defect that would impair his efficiency as such operator. The Commission shall make such investigation as it may desire and either grant or refuse a license.

(b) Any chauffeur's license issued by the City may be revoked by the Commission for cause, and causes therefor shall include (1) Violation of an ordinance of the City, (2) Violation of any law of Texas in force in the City, (3) Conviction of a felony or of any misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, (4) mental or physical defects, (5) Having any communicable disease, (6) Immoral conduct, (7) Drinking of intoxicants while on duty or within a six hour period before going on duty, (8) Transporting, selling or possessing whiskey or other intoxicants in a taxicab or at terminal or sub-terminal.

SECTION 9. INSPECTION

All terminals, sub-terminals, taxicabs, and other properties and facilities of any taxicab company, may be inspected at any time by the director or under his instructions, and upon inspection the taxicab company shall correct any defects found.

SECTION 10. RATES AND FARES

The following fares are fixed and shall be charged for transporting passengers and luggage:

(a) A fare of twenty-five cents (25c) from each passenger for the first six (6) City blocks or fraction thereof; a fare of thirty-five cents (35c) for each passenger for transporting over six (6) City blocks and not in excess of fifteen (15) City blocks; and a fare of fifty cents (50c) from each passenger for transporting in excess of fifteen (15) City blocks.

(b) For each minute of waiting time five cents (5c).

(c) No charge shall be made for transporting luggage except when in excess of two (2) pieces of luggage are transported, in which event ten cents (10c) will be charged for transporting luggage.

SECTION 11. STREET RENTAL CHARGE

(a) There is hereby levied and assessed against, and there shall be collected from each person and taxicab company operating one or more taxicabs within the city limits of the City a street rental charge of 2 per cent of the gross receipts for the operating of each and every taxicab and motor vehicle transporting passengers for hire in the city limits of the City. Said rental charge of 2 per cent of the gross receipts shall be based upon and measured by the total fares collected and other income derived from the operation of taxicab service.

(b) Said street rental charge shall be payable monthly on the 5th day of each month for the preceding calendar month, and it shall be payable at the office of the City Secretary of the City.

(c) Each taxicab company shall

keep accurate books and records at all times reflecting truly all receipts by it on each taxicab, which books and records shall be available and open for inspection at all times by the Commission, City Secretary, Auditor or other authorized agent of the City. And on the 5th day of each month there shall be submitted by the person or taxicab company thus paying an accurate report under oath of all fares and other receipts for such preceding month.

SECTION 12. RULES AND REGULATIONS

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or cause or permit to be operated any taxicab found unfit or defective by the director, until made fit and defects corrected.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person, driver or chauffeur to drink whiskey or other intoxicants while on duty driving or operating any taxicab or within a six hour period prior to going on duty.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person, taxicab company, or any member or officer of any taxicab company, or any driver or chauffeur, to sell or possess any whiskey or other intoxicant in, at or near any terminal or sub-terminal, or at, in or near any taxicab.

(d) It shall be unlawful for any person, driver or chauffeur, to transport or cause or permit to be transported, any whiskey or other intoxicant in a taxicab.

(e) It shall be unlawful for any person or any taxicab company, its drivers, chauffeurs, agents, servants or employees to demand or receive any charge or fare in excess of or less than the amount of charges and fares fixed by this ordinance.

SECTION 13. CANCELLATION OF PERMITS

(a) Any permit issued to any taxicab company may be revoked and cancelled by the Commission for causes, including the following causes: (1) Failure to provide adequate and continuous and unbroken insurance as provided for herein, (2) Any violation of any provision of this ordinance, (3) Violation of any traffic regulations of the City or of the State of Texas, (4) Violation of any law of Texas amounting to a felony or amounting to a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, (5) Permitting the use of a taxicab in violation of any City ordinance or any law of the State of Texas either by driver or chauffeur or passenger thereof.

(b) Before any permit is revoked a hearing shall be had before the Commission under the rules hereinabove fixed for hearings on applications for permits.

SECTION 14. PENALTY

Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100) Dollars.

SECTION 15. SAVING CLAUSE

If any section, sub-section, paragraph, clause, sentence, phrase or word of any part of this ordinance shall for any reason be held unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions shall not be affected thereby, and such is the intent of the Commission in passing and adopting and of the Mayor in approving this ordinance.

SECTION 16. EFFECTIVE DATE

The laws in force authorize the City to regulate taxicabs, levy charges as herein levied, and to put into effect the provisions hereof, and traffic conditions in the City and the public welfare create a necessity that this ordinance be in effect at an early date, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after the first day of January, 1948, after publication as required by law, and said date is fixed as the effective date of this ordinance, and it is so ordained.

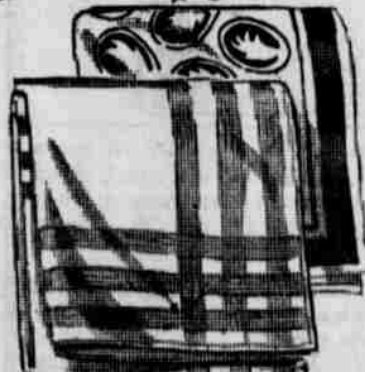

A fine program of fun and frolic has been arranged, such as a Fishing Pond, Balloons, pop corn, fortune telling, and many other features.

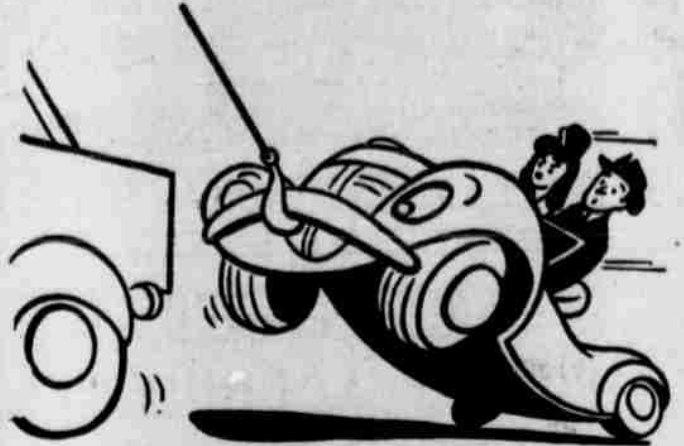

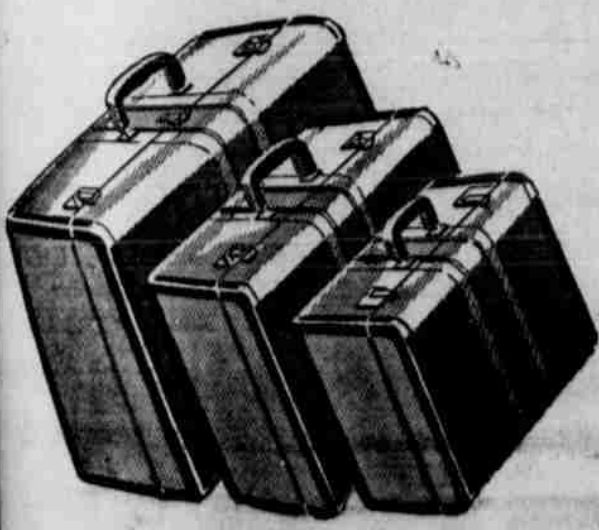

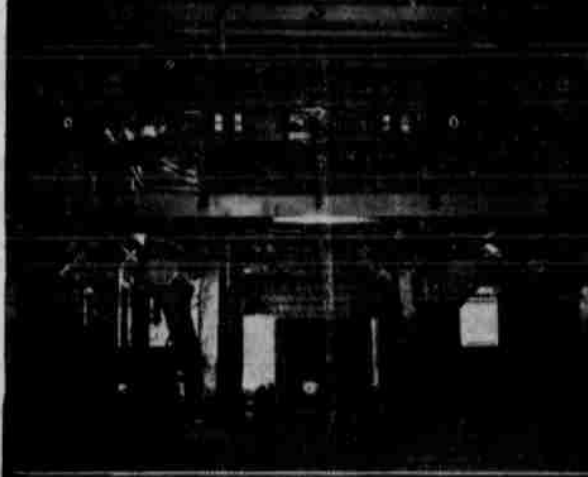
In the Pictures

Urged Not To Go To San Antonio On Receipt of Message

Next of kin of the war dead were urged today not to go to San Antonio advising them that the remains have returned to the United States.

"When the ship reaches the port of entry telegrams are sent to the next of kin advising them of the return of the remains," Lt. Col. S. H. Partridge, Chief of the American Graves Registration Division at Fort Sam Houston, said. "The purpose of this telegram is to give the families ample time for funeral arrangements, to contact other relatives, and to give us a check on whether the next of kin will be available to receive the remains."

The remains do not reach the distribution center until 10 days or so after the ship arrives in port. It requires two to three weeks, after arrival at the distribution center, before deliveries can begin. Next of kin have come to San Antonio from considerable distance upon receipt of the initial telegram. Such a trip only adds to the expense and worry as there is nothing we can do for them.

Telegrams announcing the actual date of shipment are sent to the next kin or funeral directors four days before the remains are shipped from the distribution center.

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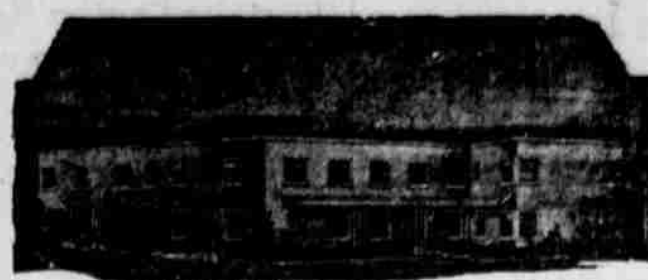

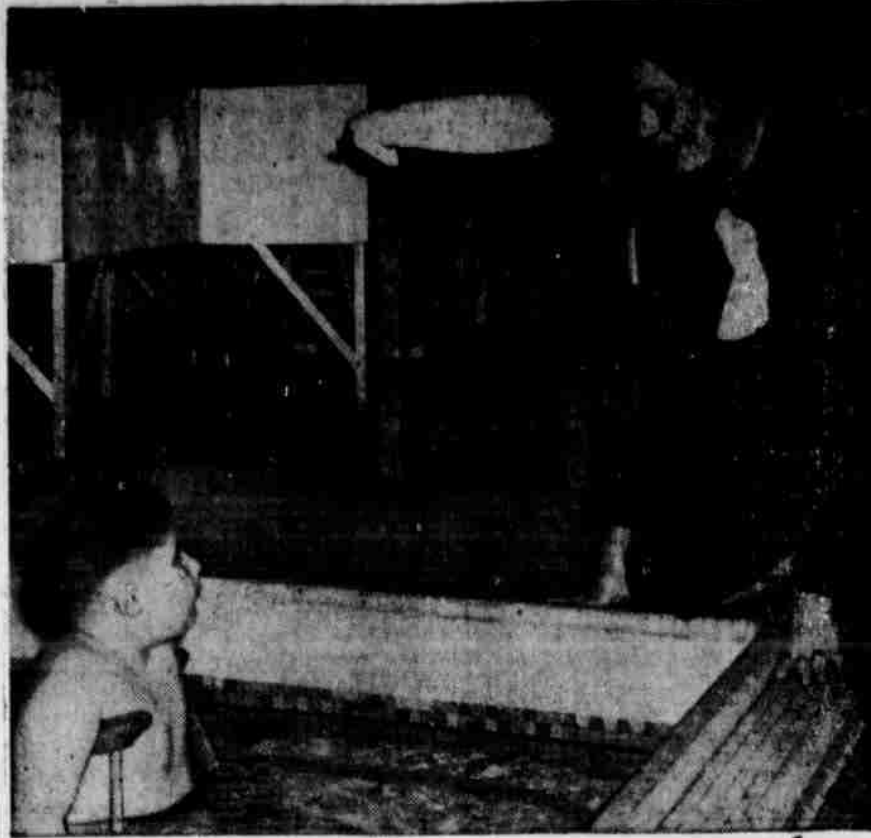
Composer-Director of Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band
