Eight Gilts To Be In Essay Contest

Must Have Maximum Of 500 Words And Be With County Agent By June 1

Eight Pure-Bred Registered Duroc Gilts will be given to the 4-H and FFA boys of Lamb County again this year. Four of the gilts will be given to 4-H Club boys and four to FFA members, according to S. L. Garrison, Assistant County Agent.

In order to qualify for one of these gilts, the boys shall write and submit an essay entitled "Advantages of the Cow-Hog-Hen Plan of Farming." The essay to have a maximum of 500 words. The contest is open to all 4-H or FFA boys. All essays from 4-H Club boys must be in the hands of the County Agent by June 1, 1948, and must be written on notebook paper and in the

boy's own handwriting. Each essay must be accompanied with an agreement blank, signed by the contestant's parent or guardian, which will include agreement to feed, care for, and breed the gilt properly, and to give back the top gilt from the first litter the following year, on or after 10 weeks old. This makes it possible to carry on an endless pig club chain year after

There'll be a touch of Texas in his walk when Sgt. Al Schmid, the hero of Guadalcanal, gets back to Philadelphia.

The 22-year-old Marine, whose appearance in the Lone Star State put Texans to storming the war bond counters, expressed a desire for only one souvenir of his trip outside of the bond record set up. He'd sure like to have a pair of cowboy boots.

Frank Scofield, State War Bond Administer, understood Schmid's hankering. Himself an old ranch hand, Scofield didn't wear any other kind of footwear for a quarter of a century of his life.

And so Texas' No. 1 Bond Man mentioned the hero's request to Charles Page, Austin architect, and the fighting leatherneck found himself corralled in a boot shop. His regulation shoes were unceremoniously jerked off and a pair of ornately decorated boots were on his feet before Schmid could

say "Guadalcanal."
"Just wait till the gang in Philly sees 'em!" Schmid chuckled.

The "gang" he travels with now are invalid servicemen in the Navy hospital where Smidt is under treatment for the wounds he received in the bloody Battle of Tenaru River. He got permission from medical officers to make the trip to Texas, and the message he brought was this:

"Those boys over there, they can really fight. If they give out of ammunition, they'll throw rocks. If they give out of rocks, they'll use their bare hands. So you just keep on buying war bonds and pretty soon we'll have 'em under control."

"Gee, it was great to be in Texas and meet all the fine folks," Schmid went on. "It was wonderful of Mrs. Clara Driscoll to go to all the expense of sponsoring my trip down here to help out in the big bond drive."

Though he wears the Navy Cross and the Purple Heart on his blouse, Schmid is just a likeable, friendly kid with a great feeling for life. Around him, strangers instantly responded to his natural, lovable qualities and are soon calling him by his nickname-Smitty.

He hopes to regain his lost vision. Beyond a mention of that hope, he doesn't comment on the situation.

Schmid was placed aboard a destroyer and evacuated from the island after the Tenaru battle. As a matter of fact, he was more dead than alive when he was put on the destroyer, and he could dimly hear a voice saying, "No need to take this one below deck. He's dead."

Schmid couldn't see, he couldn't speak, he couldn't move anything but his right hand. But he got busy, wiggling that, and a surprised voice exclaimed, "Say! He's not dead-yet."

Scofield is serving as Collector of Internal Revenue for the First Texas District in addition to his work as war bond man. Indefatigable, he has traveled thousands of miles and has made thousands of speeches to interest more Texans more deeply in this home-front battle.

But Scofield somehow finds time to devote some attention to his native love for the country. He is a breeder of fine cattle, has been a judge at livestock exhibits throughout the nation and in some foreign countries and oversees the ranching activities on his country place near Austin.

State-Wide AAA **Meeting Called**

Groundwork for next year's AAA farm program will be laid at College Station May 21-22 under the direction of Texas agricultural leaders, George Slaughter, chairman, state AAA committee, has announced.

Representatives at the conference, which is being sponsored by the State AAA Committee, composed of 12 farmers representing the major types of agriculture throughout the state, will make suggestions as to how the farm program should be operated in Texas during 1944.

Out-of-state agricultural leaders who will attend the two-day meeting and assist in formulating plans include C. D. Walker, Assistant Director, Southern Division, AAA, and J. B. Daniels, Chief, Program Development Section, AAA. Both are from Washington, D. C. A representative from the Program Opera-tions Section, Jackson, Miss., also is expected to attend.

Plans for drafting the 1944 program got underway in Texas three weeks ago when county AAA committeemen and administrative officers in a series of district meetings voiced their opinions and studied questions covering all phases of the new program. Using the 1943 AAA program as a guide, they were asked whether the standards now used in approving practices are sat-isfactory or whether they should be changed during 1944.

The recommendations from these meetings will be the guide for drafting the 1944 program plans at the conference, Slaughter said.



FREIGHT RATES REDUCED

More than \$350,000,000 will be saved annually by a reduction in railroad rates that goes into effect May 15. In most cases the saving: will be reflected automatically in reduced prices through the operation of existing maximum price regulations. Added to current actions to roll back the cost of living, these freight reductions will contribute substantially to the prevention of inflation.

TWINE AND ROPE FOR '43 HARVEST

Farmers can expect reasonable supplies of hayrope, binder twine, and other cordage for harvesting their 1943 crops. However, farmers are warned to buy only what they actually need and to conserve supplies now on hand. Many substitute materials are being used and supplies will require more careful handling than in the past.

GAS FOR FURLOUGHS

Members of the armed forces on leave or furlough for three days or more may get a special gasoline ration (up to five gallons) for personal errands when other means of transportation are not available. The ration is obtained by presenting pass, leave, or furlough papers to a rationing board.

HEARINGS ON GAS RATIONS

New rules permit local war price; and rationing boards to conduct hearings to revoke gasoline rations if-(1) the motorist is charged with speeding (driving over 35 miles an hour); (2) the motorist is charged with abuse of his tires; (3) an ap-plicant for a new gasoline ration is believed to have committed a previous violation; (4) a ration holder charged with a violation demands return of his book before a written notice of hearing can be sent him.

SAVE TYPEWRITER RIBBON SPOOLS

Saving typewriter ribbon spools will postpone the day when ribbons must be wound on wooden "carriers" says WPB. All materials for ribbon spools are scarce and substitutes for steel-such as paperhave not proved satisfactory. Typists are asked to turn in a used spool when buying a new typewritter rib-

WAR ALARM CLOCKS AT \$1.65

The new war alarm clock will be sold for not more than \$1.65 exclusive of tax. WPB is allocating materials for 1,700,000 of these clocks to case a national shortage.

ACTION TAKEN TO HALT BUTTER SPOILAGE

Texas and Louisiana district OPA offices have been authorized to reduce the point values of some grades of country butter where slow movement during flush milk production seasons threatens waste or spoilage. Temporary ration point reductions may be authorized for farmers who produce 10 pounds of butter or less per week. The farmer must apply to his local board if he wishes to reduce point values. Retail stores must secure the same authorization.
