Death Hits Family Twice In Same Day. Death dealt two blows to the family of Mrs. J. O. May of Sudan last Sunday when her son, Merle May, 47, Amherst, died suddenly while on a trip to Carlsbad, N. M., with his wife and her brother, Dr. Marvin Stout, died in Oklahoma City, Okla. Services for her son were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the Amherst Methodist Church with the Rev. E. R. McGregor, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Elmer Crabtree, Plainview, and the Rev. Leroy Baker, Sunray, former pastors. He apparently suffered a heart attack and died at 6 a.m. Survivors besides his wife and mother are seven brothers, Ralph May, Ray May, Bernice May, Marvin May, and Harold May. (See DEATHS on Page 4)

Anton Youth Injured In Lubbock Accident. Millburn Keener, 18-year-old Anton youth, remains in poor condition in a Lubbock hospital from injuries he received in a head-on collision which killed two persons Sunday evening. Keener, a Texas Tech student is showing a slight improvement since being taken to the hospital after the accident. The accident occurred at 10:35 p.m. Sunday a half mile outside the Lubbock city limits on Highway 84. Killed in the accident were two passengers in the other car involved in the wreck. Driver of the other auto was Francisco Perez of Lubbock. His wife and 11-month-old daughter were killed in the mishap. Perez was also injured. Investigating officers said Keener was heading toward Lubbock and Perez was leaving the city. They continued that both cars apparently were over the center stripe when the collision occurred. Both vehicles were demolished. Funeral services for the two killed in the accident were held Wednesday afternoon in Lubbock.

## Tennis Tourney Play Begins Saturday Here

Lamb County's first tennis tournament comes to life at 7 a.m. Saturday morning with over 50 players participating. The tournament will be played on the Crescent Park and Baptist Church courts on Saturday and the Crescent Court will be used for the final matches beginning at 1 p.m. Sunday. The tournament is sponsored by the Sudan Beacon News, The Littlefield Press and The Olton Enterprise. The complete tournament schedule is printed on another page of this edition. All players are urged to check the chart in order to know at what time they are to play. Spectator seats will be provided at both courts, players are asked to furnish the tennis balls they'll be using. All entrance fees must be paid before play.

Winners of each match will be determined on a basis of winning two out of three sets. At 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon a special exhibition match will be played by Sue Lynch of Sudan and Jean Craig of Dumas. Trophies will be awarded to all first place winners in both singles and doubles. Four entries are necessary for any division to be played.

Where you live had a lot to do with whether or not you received rain Sunday and Tuesday. Parts of the county received a generous rainfall late Sunday afternoon, while others received none. Tuesday evening, a light thundershower hit the northwest and north parts of the city of Littlefield, but only a few scattered drops fell in the south and east portions. The rain gauge at Paymaster Oil Mill in Littlefield recorded only enough moisture to settle part of the dust accumulated in the bottom of the gauge. On the other hand a narrow strip between Bull Lake and Amherst received rain measuring from 1.25 to 2 inches Sunday evening. The rain came from the southwest to the northeast and was accompanied by a generous amount of hail. Charles Jones, who lives northeast of Bull Lake, reported 1.25 inches of rain Sunday. He said the rain was preceded by a hard hail. After the hail storm passed, the rain came in sheets. He said he was told that some farms north of his received two inches of rain Sunday afternoon. The storm apparently continued on to Amherst where about .75 of an inch was reported. Some small hail was also said to have fallen in the area. Rain clouds have formed throughout the county Sunday, Monday and Tuesday afternoon as residents looked hopefully for moisture. A sand storm hit the Littlefield area about 6:30 p.m. Tuesday.

## Rep Results Final, Runoff Is Necessary

Bill Millen of Muleshoe has given his personal influence and support to Lamb County's Bill Clayton who will be seeking the Democratic nomination for State Representative for the 91st district in a run-off election Saturday, June 2. Clayton will be in the runoff with Bascom Nelson of Dimmitt. Millen and Clayton visited the Littlefield Press late Tuesday afternoon and Millen pledged his best efforts and encouragement to Clayton. Millen said that he felt that Clayton was the best qualified to represent the people in Austin and said that their conservative views were similar. The winner of the Democratic nomination in June will face J. Frank Ford, Republican from Hereford, in the November general election. Ford is running under a conservative label also. Clayton led the voting in last Saturday's primary with 4423 votes. Nelson received 3083 and Millen 2536. Lamb County gave Clayton almost half of his vote with a count of 2097. Smith of Littlefield was charged with violation of the check law and no action had been taken late Tuesday.

## Baner Wreck Destroys New Automobile

Extensive damage resulted from a car - pickup accident at Baner late Sunday afternoon, according to Joaquin Jackson, highway patrolman who investigated the wreck. A car driven by L. O. Wiseman of Sudan was travelling northeast toward Littlefield when the pickup driven by Joe Mears of Levelland pulled out from a dirt road and into the side of the auto. The entire left side of Wiseman's new auto was demolished and only minor damage was done to the right front fender of the pickup. The point of collision was on Wiseman's side of the road almost in the center of the intersection of the highway and the dirt road. After impact, the Wiseman auto was knocked to the right up a slight embankment, almost turning over, back down the embankment and coming to rest heading east just off the highway. The Mears pickup stopped almost at the point of impact on the highway. None of the occupants were injured. Mears was brought to the county jail following the collision where he was charged with DWI.

chairman, introduced the judges. Mrs. Kelly, in the morning session, spoke on arrangements. She stated that in modern arrangements line, mass and line-mass are used. For these arrangements flowers are either vivid in color or neutral. As a rule they have height, width and very little depth, with a definite pattern. The container is an important part of an arrangement and often a base is necessary for completion. She displayed several bases she had improvised from parts of old automobile chassis, and oftentimes they are made from junk. Several of the members had arrangements on display that received favorable criticism.

After the lunch hour, Mrs. Meador discussed horticulture. She said, "Growing and arranging flowers can be fun. Basic horticulture, preparation and care will win blue ribbons. There are 215 days growing time in our West Texas area. Soil is definitely the basic consideration and proper organic content and proper watering are necessary. West Texas is fortunate in having a good topsoil, but any soil benefits from added humus. Pruning must be done at the proper time." In discussing the lasting qualities of our flowers she said they are affected by the methods of cultivation. They must be put in water as soon as possible after cutting and the foliage and container used, absolutely clean.

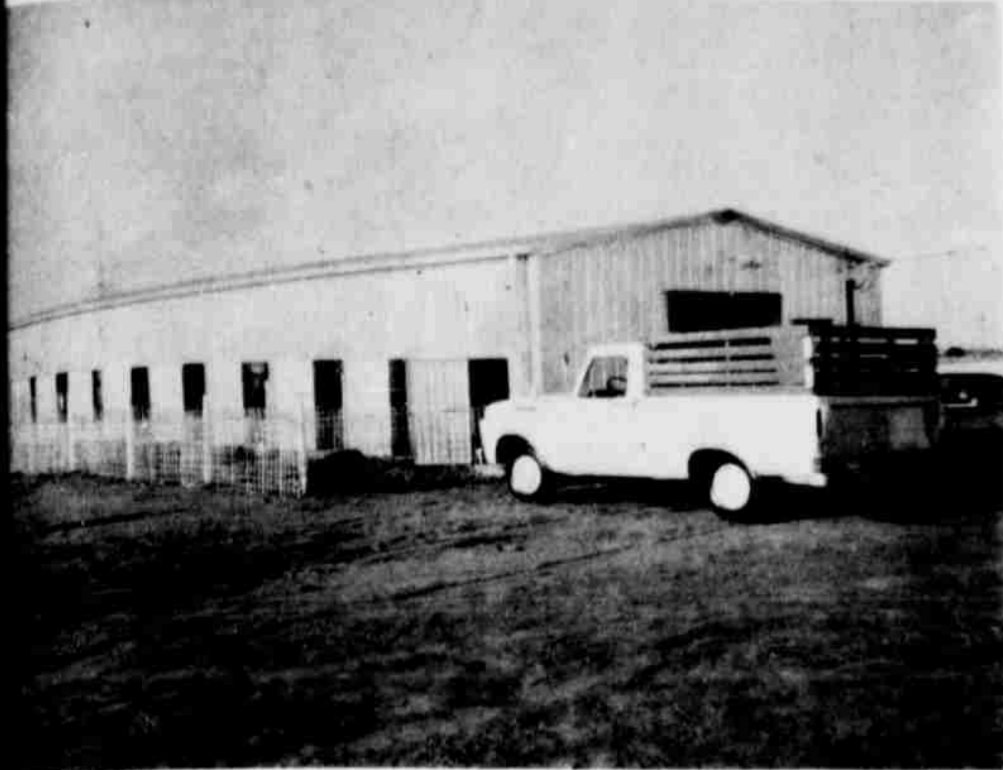

NEW LIVESTOCK BARN — Pictured above is the new livestock barn just completed at Sudan. The Sudan Young Farmers conducted a drive to raise money to build this barn. Over \$5,000.00 was raised. This barn will house the Supervised Projects of the town boys taking Vocational Agriculture. In the spring the barn will be a place for a local fat stock show. There are 15 pens inside with corresponding pens outside and a door connecting the two. There are present five pens designed for calves and the remainder for hogs. All of the hog pens will have automatic waterers in them. All of the fences are made from army - surplus landing mats. At the present time there are four gilts, one sow, six pigs, four calves and one barrow housed in the barn. Inside the barn is a feed room which has individual feed bins for each boy to keep feed and supplies.
