C Of C Launches Membership Drive

After several months of attention to other phases of Chamber of Commerce activity, the members of the C of C membership drive launched a campaign, Tuesday, to enlist new Chamber members.

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Hammons Open House Marks Remodelling

The construction of additional facilities and remodeling of Hammons Funeral Home has been completed and open house will be observed Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m. All area residents are invited to attend the open house and inspect the new facilities as well as the area that has been redecorated.

Fog Blamed For Second Serious Crash

Three persons lost their lives and a fourth is in critical condition in Littlefield Hospital following a two car collision Tuesday afternoon at the intersection of Highway 54 and the Highway 84 by-pass which had just been opened to traffic the previous day.

The dead were Don H. Brewster, 74, a Littlefield farmer; Chester Gray, 75, and his wife, Edna, 68, of Vernon, Texas, Mrs. Mattie Pritchard, 84, Lubbock, the mother of Mrs. Gray was in critical condition in Littlefield Hospital at press time suffering from severe scalp and face lacerations, two broken arms and multiple internal injuries.

Mrs. Gray was dead on arrival at Medical Arts Hospital and Brewster was also pronounced dead on arrival at Littlefield Hospital. Mr. Gray died approximately 40 minutes after the crash which occurred at 3:57 p.m.

The Brewster car was headed west on Highway 54 and the other car, driven by Mr. Gray was headed south on the by-pass. Brewster was apparently headed home after a trip to Littlefield and the Gray's and Mrs. Pritchard were enroute to Lubbock from Amherst.

The collision occurred in the middle of the intersection on the west lane of the by-pass and the force of the crash threw the Gray car into the bar ditch and into the embankment southwest of the highway. The two vehicles, a 1965 and 1958 Chevrolet were both totally demolished.

The fatalities were the first traffic victims within the city limits since a crash at Sunset and Highway 84 in September, 1963.

The south lane of the Marshall Howard Boulevard had only been opened to traffic Monday and stop signs which had been posted on the new by-pass were only changed the latter part of last week to Highway 54.

Mr. Brewster, who farmed about six miles southwest of Littlefield, had been a resident here since 1938. Survivors include his wife, Annie, of the home; three sons, D.M. and Ted, both of Van Horn, R.L., Petersburg; three daughters, Mrs. Bessie Lee Phillips, Littlefield, Mrs. Iris New, Farmington, N.M., and Mrs. Gladys Terry, Midland, 28 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be at the Hammons Chapel at 10:30 a.m. today with burial in Memorial Park. Pallbearers will be Hollis Townsend, Clifton Perry, Clarence Montgomery, Elwin and Weldon Gilley and C. Vanstien.

In the second serious accident in as many days, Tim Tapley of Amherst, a Junior at Littlefield High School, and Billy Wayne Ramsey, of Plainview, were hospitalized with injuries received when the 1962 Ford, driven by Tapley, and a 1959 Dodge truck tractor driven by Ramsey, collided five miles north of the city on Highway 385, in a heavy fog.

The accident which sent the vehicles involved about 300 feet from the point of impact, occurred about 8:30 a.m., in a heavy fog that made visibility difficult, and driving hazardous. According to investigating officer, Bill Angel, of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Tapley auto was going south on 385, and the truck, belonging to J.D. Kennington of Lubbock, but driven by Ramsey was going north on the same highway.

According to Tapley, who was enroute to school at the time of the accident, he was attempting to pass another car, and because of the denseness of the fog, could not see the approaching truck, until it was too late to avoid the collision.

The condition of Tapley was listed as good, by an official of Littlefield Hospital, where he was taken with severe cuts on both legs, and several deep cuts about the face and head.

Ramsey was listed in good condition at Medical Arts Hospital, where he was admitted with possible internal injuries and serious cuts about the face and head. The force of the impact caused the truck to leave the paved surface of the Highway, overturning about three times before finally coming to rest 165 feet north of the impact point.

Wildcats Gird For Tigers

Their spirits boosted by last week's romp over the Levelland Lobos, the Littlefield Wildcat are now girding for the pending battle with the surprising Snyder Tigers, who last week smashed the Brownfield Cubs 47-21.

The 'Cats of Coach John Howle still can share in a 3-AAA title; but to do so they must win the remaining two games, and have indicated they will take first things first, meaning the Tigers are the prime concern at the moment. After their performance last week the 'Cats will be hard pressed to improve, but indications are they will use the same type of attack that unleashed the explosive running power of Larry Schovajsa, who had an outstanding night against the Lobos.

The demonstration put on by the Wildcats last week was the result of only one week of drills in which the scrappy 'Cats developed several new plays and polished their offensive blocking.

After finding themselves, the Wildcats plan to use the same type of attack against the invading Tigers who have had only 40 points scored against them in district wars. The Tigers have managed a total of 60 points against their foes, picking up 47 of them last week.

Matching records the Tigers have tied Sweetwater 0-0, beaten Levelland 14-12, and Brownfield 47-21, while dropping a game to Lamesa. The 'Cats fell to Sweetwater and Lamesa, but trounced San Angelo and Levelland for a 2-2 record.

This show is sponsored by the American Kormorner Tumbler Club and will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday. Judging will begin at noon Friday. Dale Kirk of Midland will be the judge. All birds will be marked Saturday as trophy or ribbon winners.

Five trophies are being offered by the local club, with more than \$150 in cash paid to the exhibitors. Unusual prizes being offered include one for the bird shipped the greatest distance, the exhibitor traveling the most miles and the person with the most display points.

Entries have been received thus far from Michigan, Colorado, California, New Mexico, Kansas and Wisconsin.

Next Year Cotton Allotment Cut

Lamar Aten, Lamb County Office manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service announced Wednesday that the cotton allotment for Lamb County for 1966 has been reduced.

The allotment, which has been increasing steadily the past years, has been reduced by 634 acres leaving a total allotment for the county for 1966 of 185,268 acres.

The reduction was caused by the revoking of a policy by the Federal Government under which the State Committee was able to transfer a cotton allotment from a county where less than 90 per cent of the allotment was planted to another county where more than 90 per cent was planted.

Aten stated that the ASCS office would determine the acreage cut for farmers in Lamb County on a formula based on the farmers original allotment last December and that it would be done on a percentage basis with approximately a .2 to .3 cut would be the most suffered by any one farmer.

The acreage cut will be on permanent acreage and Aten stated that the acreage cut was in all probability based on a five year average. Many counties suffered a much larger reduction. (See ACREAGE, Page 11)

longtime member of the Littlefield Rotary Club.

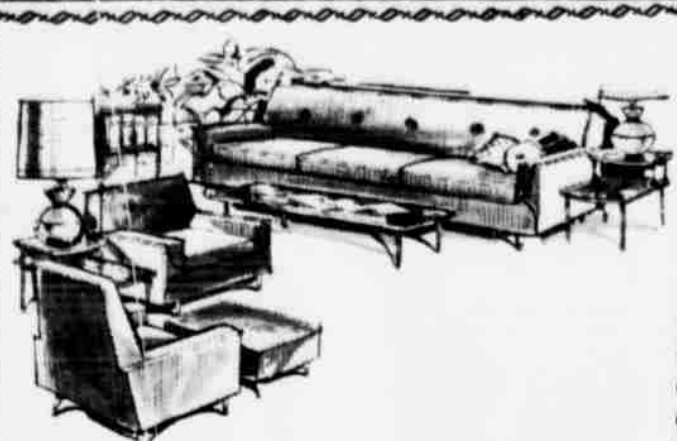
Hammons was born in Belcherville, Montague County. His wife was born in Indian Territory in Oklahoma.

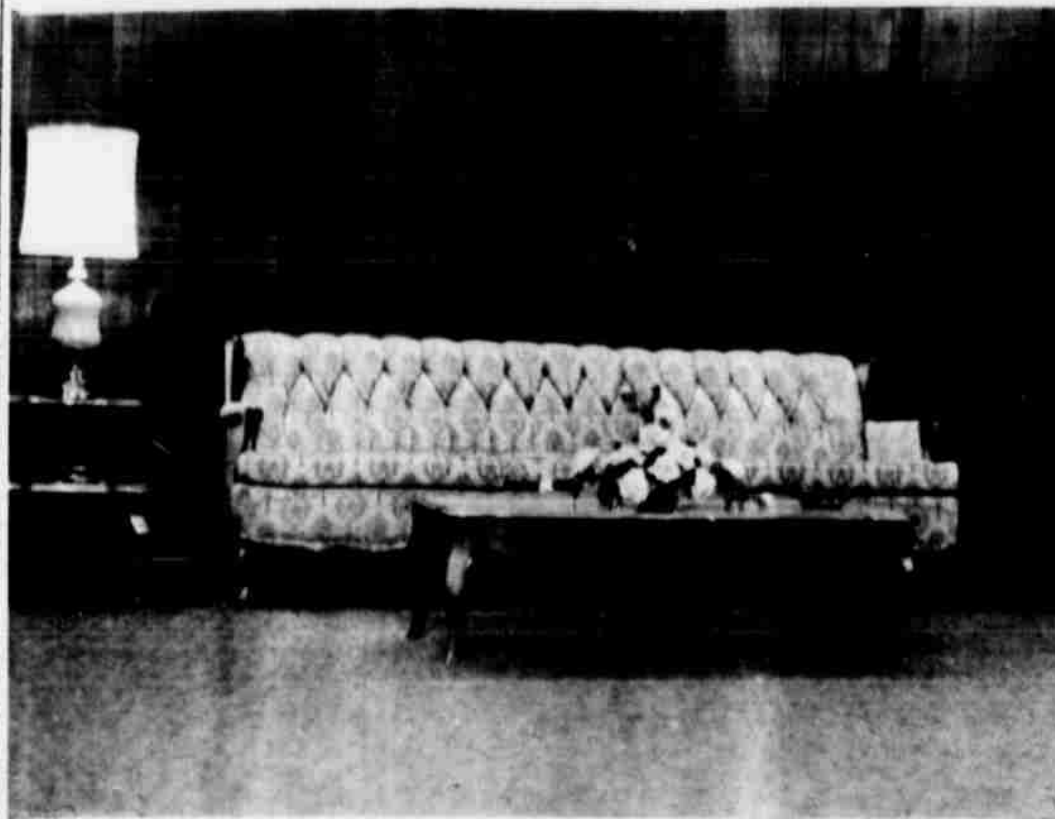

the organization of new societies to stimulate interest in preserving Texas heritage.

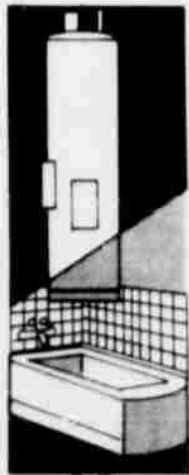

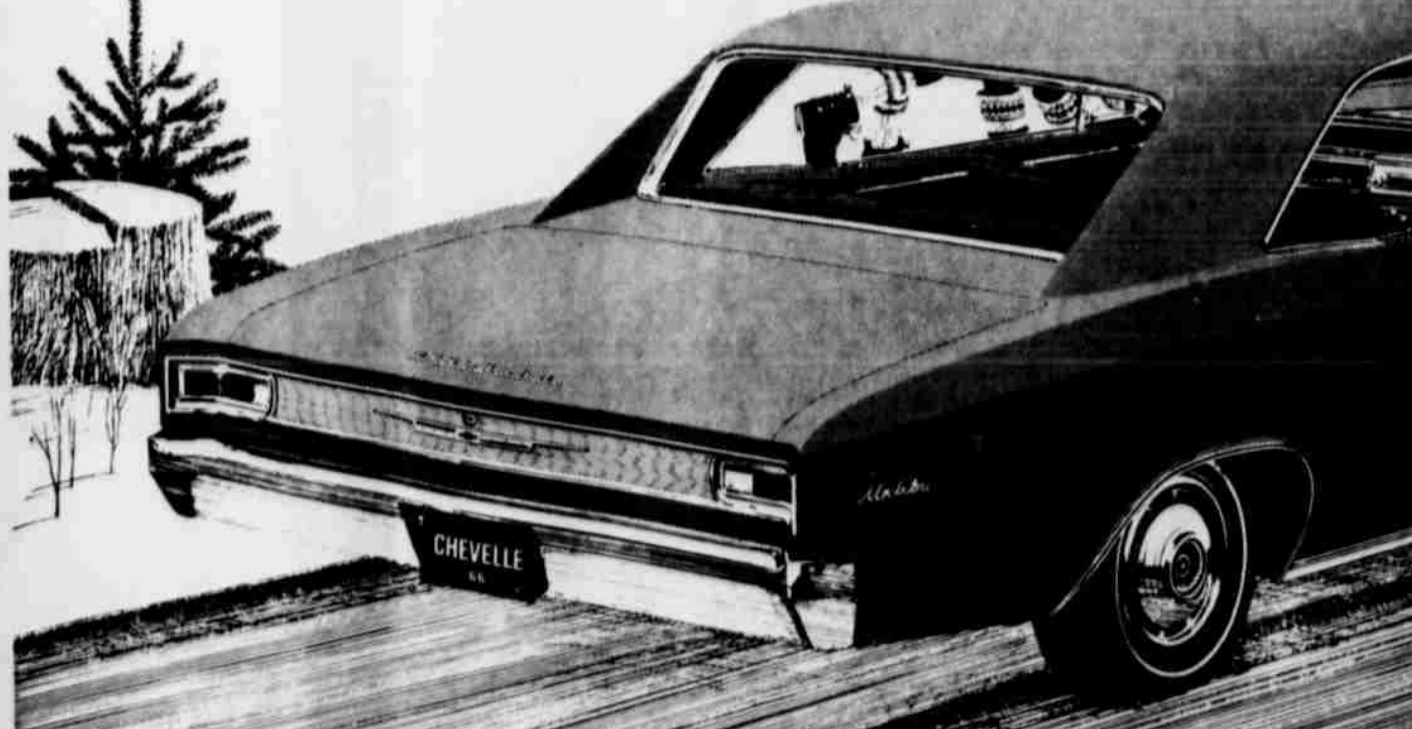
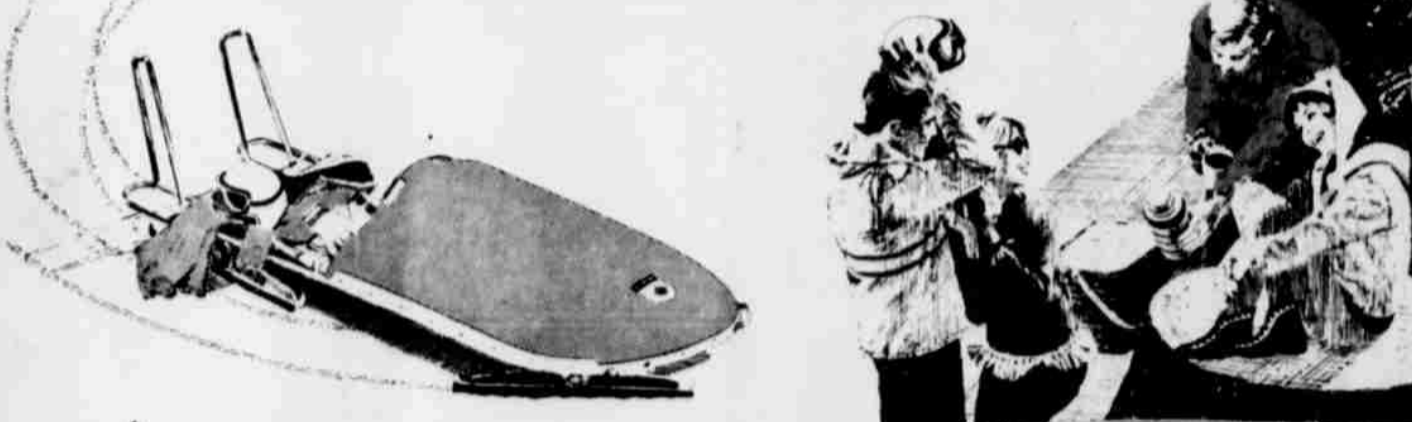

The public is invited to attend the services and hear him speak.

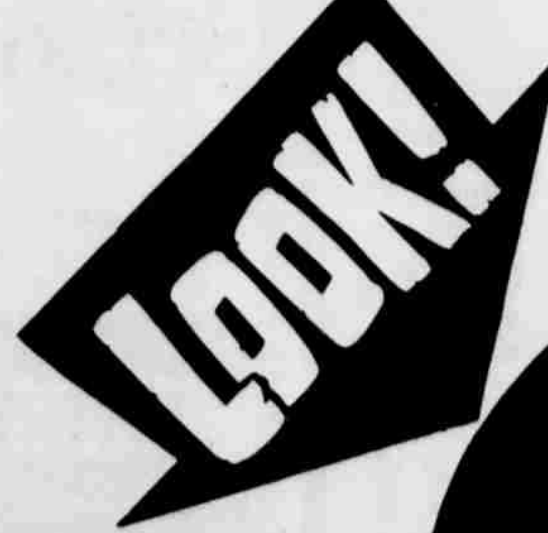


