No. 1 Jackson Is County's First **Producing Well**

Other Locations Made, And Several Wildcats To Be Drilled

All indications point to an oil field in Lamb county. The Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Jackson, located 31/2 miles northeast of Anton, and about 15 miles east of Littlefield, Lamb county, is reported producing from the lower Permian lime. Rumors indicate that it is expected to produce between 800 and 1200

However, in an interview with J. P. Jackson, driller, Wednesday, he stated that this well would make at least 500 barrels and possibly more. He also added: "We are going to have a nice field out there, and within six months there will likely be 50 wells drilling out there. We have two 500 barrel tanks on the location, and will start building them today or tomorrow. We will still swab into the slush pit until the tanks are ready. We are acidizing today with 10,000 gallons."

This well is located approximately 30 miles north of the nearest production in the Slaughter pool of Hockley county.

That zone had been treated with 5000 gallons of acid. The operator had good shows of oil and gas in swabbing down to 4000 feet from the surface after the treatment, and after reaching that level swabbed into pits at the rate of five to six barrels of oil per hour. The well was shut in for five hours and the hole filled up and "sloshed" top of





Changes Announced In Classification

The past few weeks have shown a number of changes in classification procedure for Selective Service. The Lamb County Board is urging all registrants to acquaint themselves with these regulations in order that it be possible for the board to classify correctly men under their juris-

All men in classes II-A, II-A-F, II-B, II-B-F, II-C and 11-C-F are classified for a six months period only. At the end of each six months these deferred classifications are reconsidered, and it is necessary that new information, consisting of correctly executed forms, be filed by each individual. The date of expiration of the classification is listed on cards mailed to registrants at the time of classification, and forms should be filed five or six days before such expiration date, with the Local Board.

The forms necessary to this procedure are available at any Draft Board office, and the Lamb County their iles up to date. The practice of sending notices to individuals every six months is to be stopped due to lack of time of the office staff.

The new regulations require all men who have reached their 38th birthdate to be classified in Class IV-A, while heretofore only men who had reached their 45th birthdate were in this class. Until it is necessary to start drafting men who have passed 38, the Class IV-A will not be re-opened.

Six teachers were re-employed. "One or two" more teachers still are needed, according to Harold Clements, board member. However, substitute teachers are filling in, he



LAMB COUNTY CLUB BOYS HAVE RECORD ENROLLMENT

The 4-H Club boys of Lamb county with an enrollment of 391, are exhibiting, on the home front, some of the same qualities of their older brothers on the battle fronts in the various theatres of war. Namely, an all out effort in what they undertake to do.

Among the 391 boys enrolled in 4-H work, many of whom have just begun and have not as yet selected all the projects they will have this year, there are 88 pig for pork production demonstrations; 74 calf for beef production demonstrations; 64 gilts and sows for pig production demonstrations; 49 poultry demonstations; 47 cow for milk demonstrations; 37 heifers for milk cow production demonstrations; 18 grain sorghum production demonstrations; 12 cotton demonstrations; 18 victory gardens; 4 rabbit for meat production demonstrations; and 1 each of goats for milk, turkeys for meat, and lamb for mutton production demonstrations.

While some of the older "leaders of tomorrow" have several demonstrations, some of the younger boys have only one small project. But then, Rome was not built in a day. Although meat, milk and egg production has been emphasized during the past months, we cannot afford to overlook the importance of the cotton projects to aid in the fiber battle or the grain sorghum projects which are also, indirectly, producing food for our fighters and the overrun countries that have been our raithful allien.

Just recently some of our local boys have, through cooperation with Sears, Roebuck and Company's Cow-Sow-Hen Continuation program, won honors coveted by hundreds of South Plains 4-H Club boys.

O. D. Martin, Jr., of Route 1 Sudan, won first prize at the F.F.A .-4-H Club District Sears Boar Show which was held at the Livestock Judging Pavilion of Texas Tech college of Lubbock, October 14, and for the efforts put forth in caring for, fitting and showing the animal was awarded a registered Jersey

John Henry Powell of Star Route 1, Littlefield, who ran a close second in the District F.F.A. and 4-H Club Sears Gilt Show which was held at the same time and for that honor won a registered Jersey heifer plus one hundred and twenty-five baby chicks, of the breed of his choice, for having been first in this county and thereby being eligible to show at the District Show at Lub-
