



Any eligible voter that is now living in Lamb County but expects to be out of the county on election day, Saturday, May 7 may vote by absentee ballot by going to the clerk's office, and filling out a ballot.

In the case of a person who is ill or disabled and cannotget to the polls and wants to vote by mail must apply for an absentee ballot then in addition to filling out the absentee ballot must have the signature of a physician stating that the person will be unable to appear at the polls on election

day. The deadline for persons to vote by absentee ballot by a vote by absentee ballot by a personal appearance at the County Clerks office is May 3 at 5 p.m.

To vote by mail the applica-tion for the absentee ballot must reach the county clerk four days prior to the election and the filled in ballot along with the necessary affidavits and poll tax receipt or voter registration certificate if applicable must be received in the County Clerk's office by 1 p.m. on election day and must be postmarked not later than midnight the day preceeding the election.



It was pointed out by C.B. Spencer, agricultural representative for the Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association, that seed with 80 per cent germination often give only 40 per cent emergence under the adverse conditions found on the Plains. And this is true even of seed bearing certified, registered, or select tags.

Dr. Bob Berry pointed out that certified seed must be produced from plants that are typical of the variety and must be free of weed seeds. And, by law, an inspector must certify that the seed are not carrying disease organisms which he is the necessary precautions capable of detecting. He said should be taken to preserve these guarantees put the certif-ied seed far above the average oughout the growing season. ied seed far above the average oughout the growing season, farmer-grown seed. In 1964 the certified seed produced an average of 116 pounds of lint cotton per acre more than farmer-grown seed. Re-sults from the 1965 tests were not so spectacular, but there was still an average difference of 36 pounds lint per acre --

far more than enough to justify the cost of pure seed. There are not. of course, enough certified seed available to plant the entire High Plains crop. And Dr. Ray points out that since it is necessary for some farmers to save their own seed, extreme care should be taken to preserve seed quality and purity. First, he says, farmers planning to save their own seed should have a seed plot planted with the best and latest release of their preferred variety each year. Then,


