Good Summer Feeding Pays in Winter Eggs

"It pays to feed hens a laying mash right through the summer," says L. R. Price, "even if eggs are cheap." Mr. Price is making a specialty of White Leghorn eggs of the non-fertile variety ,this summer, and making quite a success of it.

"My experience," says "is that eggs may be produced during the summer for a feed cost of from 11 to 13 cents per dozen, but where a balanced ration is abandoned and the fowls left to shift for them selves in an attempt to save a feed bill I have found that the egg production often falls off so much that the cost of producing a dozen eggs is nearly if not quite as high as this, and the birds are left in a bad condition.

"The high cost of not feeding hens in the summer time is felt most in November and December and on into January when eggs are high. A summer starved flock just can't come through with high priced eggs at that

"There are getting to be lots of chickens raised around Littlefield now,"said Mr. Price,"and I would like for the producers to get as much for their products as possible. By careful feeding and careful marketing this can be done."
