

**BUSINESS PROPERTY CHANGES MADE ON PHELPS**

**Security State Bank Sells Building, Buys 2 More**

A series of ownership exchanges of major Littlefield business property, announced January 1, will result in future significant changes in the 500 block of Phelps Avenue and ultimately a new, larger building for the Security State Bank. The present location was a part of the property transfers.

The exchanges just completed by the Security State owner consist of two buildings and a vacant lot from 500 Phelps Avenue through 507 Phelps Avenue. It includes the old Walters building at Phelps and Fifth Avenue, an adjoining vacant lot purchased from Mrs. Sarah H. Dugand, adjoining it, the large W. Walker building.

This acquisition gives the bank 125 feet on Phelps Avenue starting at Fifth and Phelps, in the 500 block.

The two buildings involved, Walters and Walker properties, recently were bought by Pat Downs, who operates the Record Center on West Fourth.

Downs obtained the Security State Bank building at 513 Phelps Avenue in transferring the other buildings to the bank, the announcement said.

This building will be remodelled in the future to house Downs' business, on a schedule to match new building plans for Security State.

"We have not yet made firm plans for building," said Jack Wicker, president of the Security State Bank.

"We have reached the point, however, where more room is needed in line with the growth of the bank, and we have moved this far in the direction of larger quarters."

"This re-emphasizes our confidence in the future of Littlefield. We will build a bank home the area will be proud of."

The Walters building was occupied until a year ago by Texas Furniture Warehouse. It is a 25-foot brick structure and was purchased by Downs from Mrs. Ray H. Carey of Abilene.

The Phelps Avenue properties involved run back to XIT Drive, and are 125 feet deep.



**Wildcats Win Over Mules**

The Littlefield Wildcats ended their 1963 basketball campaign on a successful note Tuesday night at the LHS gym, turning back the Muleshoe Mules by a 47-35 score.

In the contest, a New Year's eve affair, gave Littlefield its 5th triumph of the season and left it with a 5-6 mark for the old year.

The Wildcats open the district 1-AAA basketball race at LHS on Jan. 7.

Littlefield led all the way against the Mules, but held only a 7 lead at halftime. The Cats were in front by 29-25 after two periods, then clinched the win with an 18-point output in the third period.

Harry Wood paced the scoring for Littlefield with 10 points in the relatively low-scoring tilt. Paul Roberts and Eldon Sitton were close behind with 9 and 8 points, respectively. Robert Seagraves topped for the Mules with 8 points.

Although both teams had took a break for the Christmas holidays, the contest was not as rough as might be expected.

Muleshoe lost one player via the personal foul route, while Littlefield made it through the game without losing a single player.

Littlefield also chalked up a victory in the preliminary "B" game, capturing a 47-33 decision. Terry Hyatt racked up 18 points to spark the Wildcat junior varsity. Steve Lewis was next, tabbing 7 points before fouling out.

The junior varsity trailing by 10-7 after one quarter but forged ahead by 23-18 at halftime.

**2 Separate Rape Cases Filed Here**

Two county men were charged with rape in separate incidents this week, and both were held in county jail Wednesday on \$5,000 bonds.

William Arthur Johnson, 38-year-old Negro, was arrested Tuesday morning and charged with rape and incest of a 10-year-old stepdaughter. Officers said the man's wife reported the incident.

Daniel Martinez, 20, was charged Sunday with the rape of a 10-year-old Latin American girl. The victim's sister lodged the complaint. Bonds were set on both men in Justice of Peace court Tuesday afternoon.

Johnson was arrested at his home near North Spade Gin in early-morning hours Tuesday. Mrs. Johnson told officers she caught her husband forcing his stepdaughter to have sexual relations. She said that he also forced the girl's sister to act as a "lookout".

Martinez, a native of Karnes City, also worked at a county gin and is a resident of Littlefield. He was charged with the rape of a local girl following a Christmas night dance. The victim's sister reportedly learned of the incident and informed officers Sunday.

The sheriff's office reported two other arrests this week. Bobby Taylor, 28, of Spade was picked up on a Lubbock warrant for violation of the check law. He was released on \$1,500 bond. Deputies apprehended another man on a forgery case, and he was expected to be charged today.

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**4 OF 5 INCUMBENTS WILL SEEK RE-ELECTION**

**County Political Activity Warming Up**

**Batson New Demo Head**

Glenn Batson, longtime Democrat and a member of the party's state executive committee, was selected as chairman of the Lamb County Democratic Party during a meeting of the executive committee Monday.

Batson's selection was made unanimous after he polled the most votes over several other nominees. He succeeds the late Pat Boone Sr., who had held the post about seven years prior to his death last October. Jerry Kirby, local attorney, has served as temporary chairman until Monday's election.

Batson is owner of Citadel Finance and has farming interests in the county and area. He is presently serving as a State Democratic committeeman from the 30th senatorial district.

He is also chairman of the convention site subcommittee for the state executive committee. Batson remarked Tuesday after his election, "We shall do everything in our power to help the party carry Lamb County for each and every Democratic nominee."

In another election, the county executive committee named Paul I. Jones as chairman of Precinct 16. Kirby had been chairman of the precinct until moving to another precinct.

In the only other business, the committee passed a resolution

The political pot is simmering at present in Lamb County, but it is expected to start boiling soon with the official filing period opening Jan. 1.

Four of five incumbents whose terms of office come up for election this year have already announced intentions of seeking re-election. One race is assured with an announced challenger for the county sheriff's post.

The five county offices open for election in 1964 are the sheriff, tax assessor-collector, county attorney, and county commissioners of Precincts 1 and 3. The office of district attorney is also due for a voter decision this year.

Sheriff Dick Dyer, Tax Assessor Herbert Dunn and Commissioners J. L. "Roy" Yeager and A. J. Spain have announced their intentions to seek re-election. County Atty. Curtis Wilkinson this week declined to say whether or not he'd be a candidate again.

District Attorney Jack Young of Muleshoe indicated Tuesday that he would soon make a formal announcement for re-election. Young said he had held out on the announcement due to the 30-day mourning period for President Kennedy.

An apparent contest for the sheriff's post developed early in November when Dyer announced for re-election, and W. T. Harlin of Littlefield reported that he would be a candidate for that office. Both will seek office in the Democratic ticket.

Party primaries will be the first elections this year, coming in May. All present county office holders are members of the Democratic Party. In a recent meeting, county Republicans issued an appeal for GOP candidates on the county level.

The county has staggered terms on county officials so that about half of the county officers are elected for 4-year terms each two years.

**PROGRAM CHANGES ANNOUNCED Cotton Acreage Requests Now Being Received Here**

Changes in Texas' Release and Reapportionment program on cotton for 1964 have been announced by the State ASC Committee and could result in Lamb County and the High Plains area getting a larger share of released cotton acreage.

Lamb County got slightly more than 4,300 released acres last year. The 23 counties in the Plains Cotton Growers' territory received 91,684 acres of cotton under this program in 1963.

The Lamb ASC office is presently taking applications from farmers who desire to obtain released acres. Final date for requesting additional acreage or releasing acres, has been set for March 4. It is important that area farmers understand that requests for reapportioned acres must be filed with the county ASC committee before that date.

Farmers must go to the ASC office and fill out an application, or write for an application form. Reapportioning of the acres will take place on March 25 in the area zone.

Christmas Tree sales project, it was announced Wednesday by club President Harold Phillips. The money will be used to further activities of all school bands. Phillips praised band students who aided in the tree sales, and announced it would be an annual project of the club.

Under this program farmers who do not wish to plant all of their allotted cotton acreage can release the unwanted portion to their county ASC committee for reapportionment to farmers who request additional acres. After reapportionment within the county, excess acres are turned to the State committee for distribution within the zone in which the acres were released.

All of the High Plains area is in Zone 2. South and southeast Texas lies in Zone 1. The two zones were slightly rearranged for 1964, with Zone 2 losing 11 counties and adding three others. Angelina, San Augustine and Sabine counties were added to Zone 2. Taken out of Zone 2 and added to Zone 1 were Schleicher, Sutton, Menard, Humble, Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Blanco, Burnet, Williamson and Milam counties.

Other changes in the 1964 program deal with limitations placed on the number of acres a county or individual farm is eligible to receive under the program. Briefly, the limitations state this:

1. No county or individual farm can be given reapportioned acreage that will bring total acres in cotton to more than 50% of the total land in cultivation, nor can a county's base allotment be increased by more than 50%.
2. No farm can receive reapportioned acres unless at least 75% of that farm's effective 1963 cotton allotment was planted or unless failure to plant the allotment can be explained by weather conditions, illness, or other good cause beyond the farmer's control.
3. Farms with less than 15 acres base cotton allotment are limited to a 100% increase or an increase to a total of 15 acres, whichever is greater.
4. Farms with from 15 to 24 acres base allotment are limited to an increase of 100% or an increase to a total of 37-1/2 acres, whichever is greater.
5. Farms with 25 or more acres of base allotment are limited to an increase of 50% of that base allotment.

**Council Meets Here Tonight**

The Littlefield City Council will hold its first regular meeting of the new year tonight at city hall.

Main item for discussion, beginning at 7 p.m., will be the recently approved water bond issue. City Engineer Bill McMurrise and bonding agent Joe Smith will be present at the meeting.

Plans will be finalized on the sale of bonds from the two issues. The council will also open bids on two 1/2 ton pickups.

**United Fund Totals \$18,575**

Littlefield's United Fund campaign had reached only 67 percent of its 1964 goal of \$27,321 as residents put up new 1964 calendars Wednesday.

A check with UF secretary Nell Cotter showed donations and pledges totaling \$18,575 Tuesday morning. H. A. Mitchell, UF president, and Chick Conway, campaign chairman, were hopeful that some contributors would donate Tuesday in order to get their contributions counted as 1963 tax deductions.

Officials and leaders of the seven participating agencies in the UF were also watching the figures with anticipation, hoping that a large percent of their budgets would be available this year.

Conway urged those who might have been missed in the campaign to turn in their contributions to Mrs. Cotter at the gum-Hilbun Agency. He noted that some contact cards still out.

## Mrs. Lenton Smith Shares Cake Recipe

Mrs. Lenton Smith kindly consented to share one of her favorite recipes with the readers this week. It is for "White Layer Fruit Cake". At this particular time you may not be especially hungry for fruit cake, but we advise you to save this recipe for future use. It is rather unusual as it is made in layers and has a delicious filling.

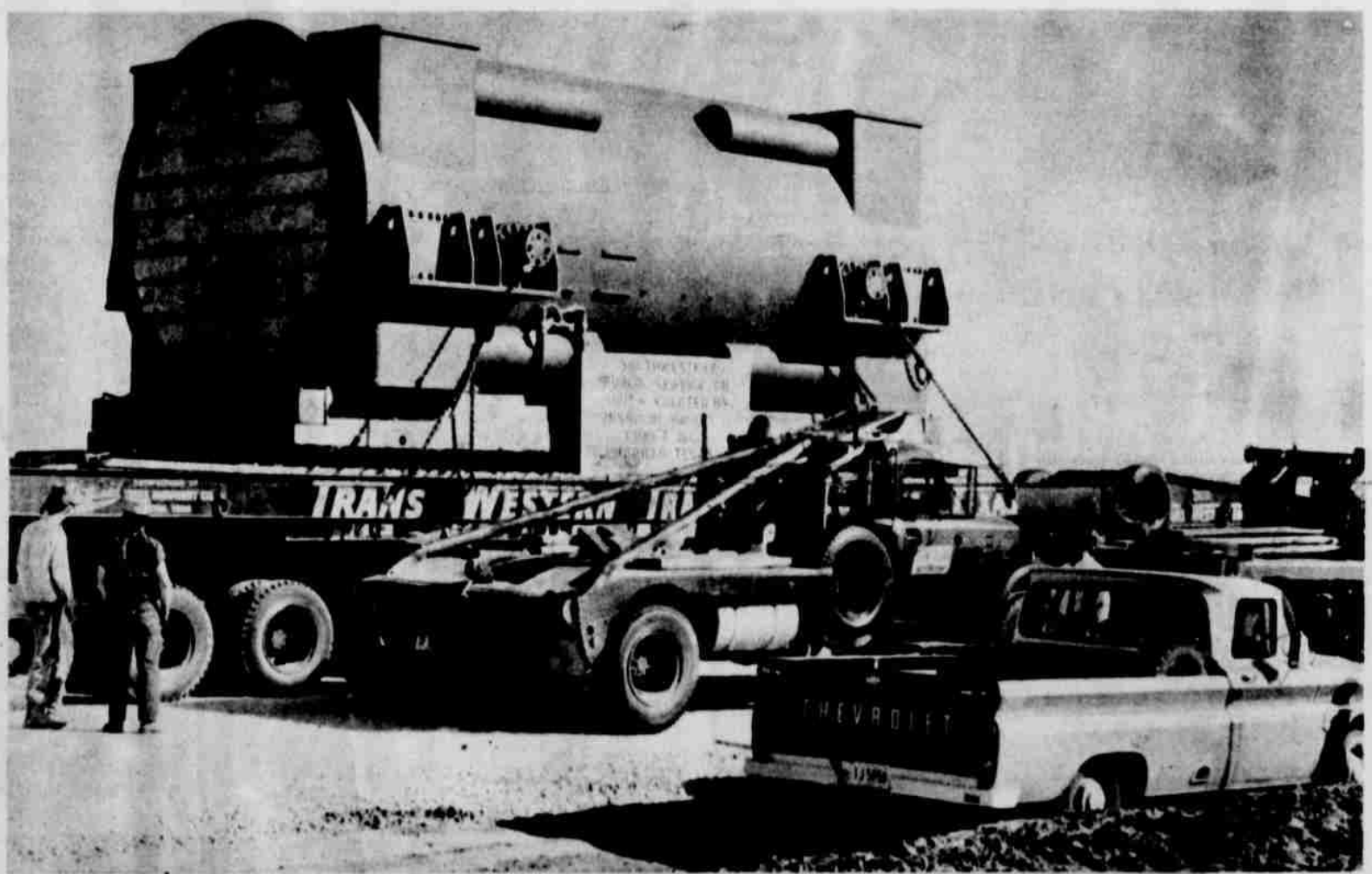

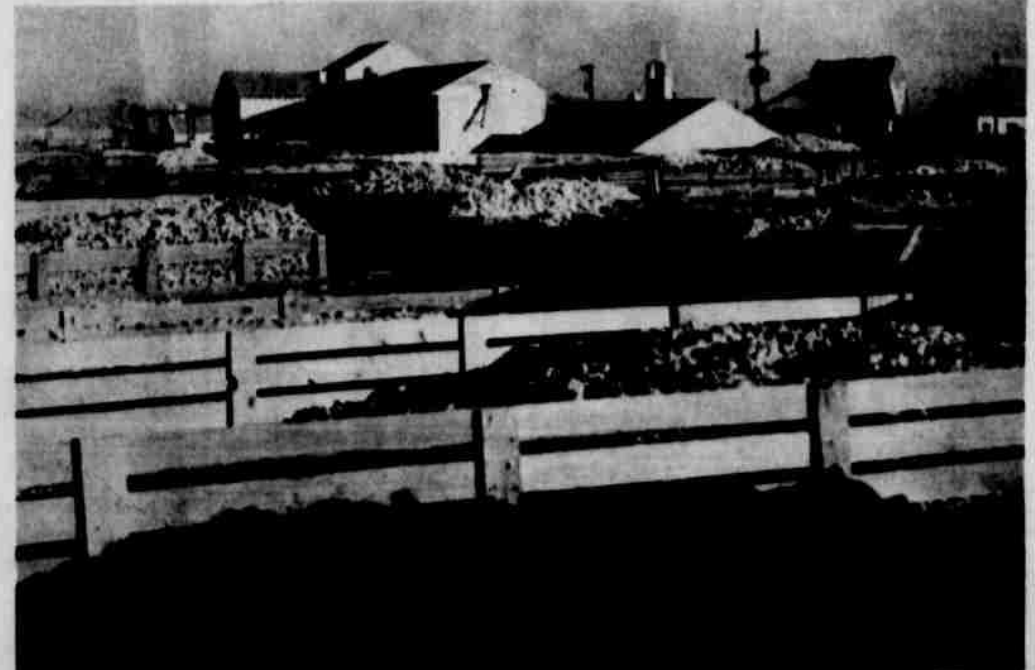

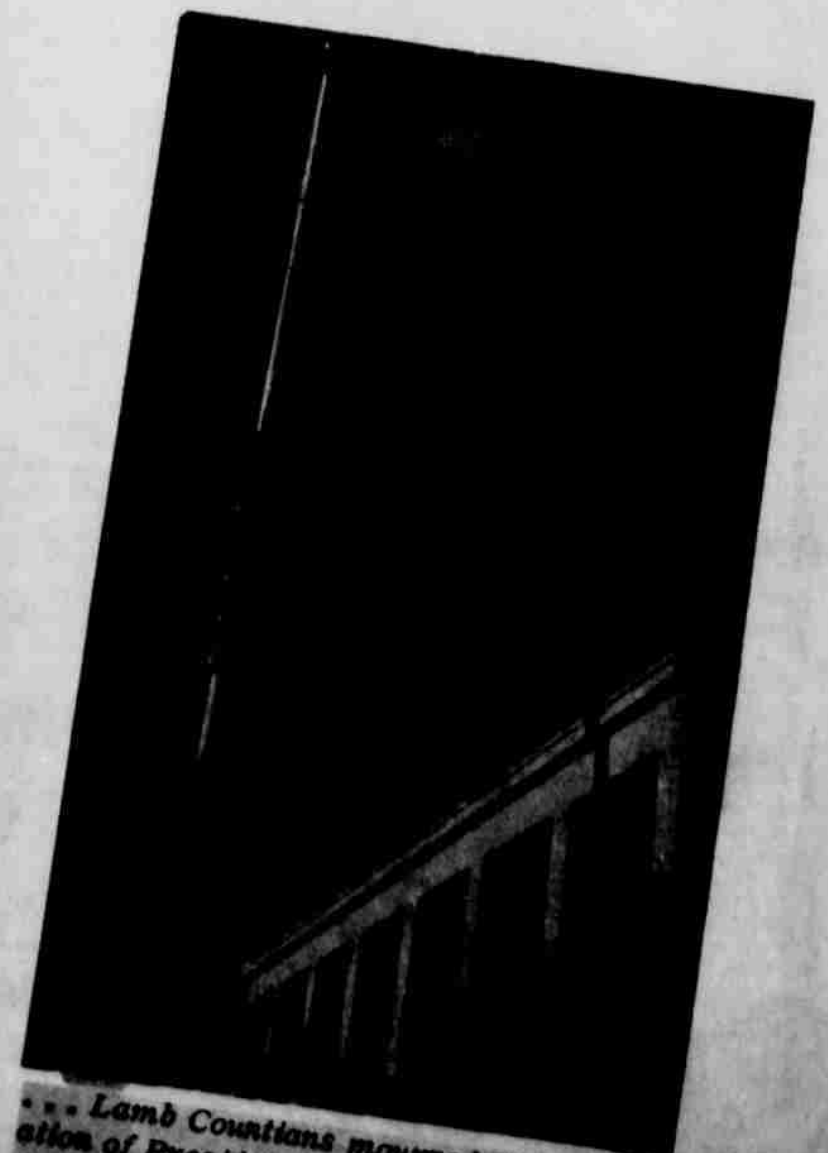

The boys' consolation finale is scheduled at 6:20 and the championship match at 9 p.m. Saturday.

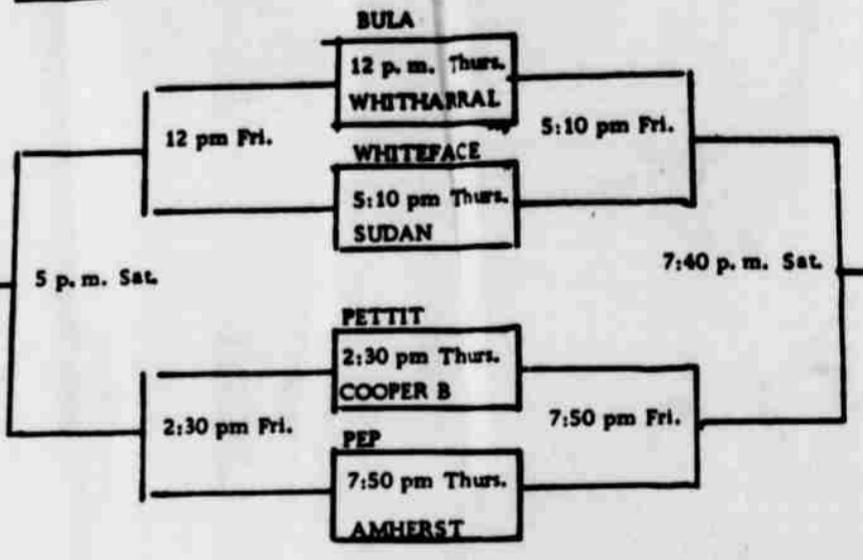

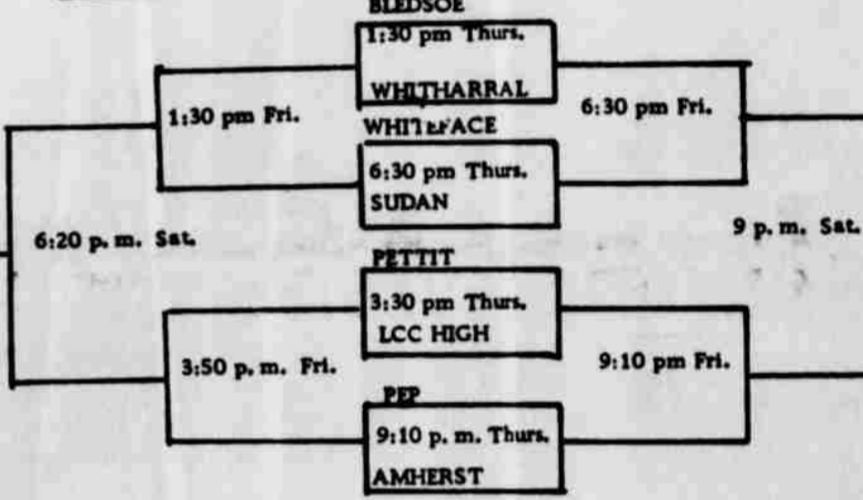

## Accent on Health

- J. E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

AUSTIN--"Have a heart" is a familiar slang expression, but scores of people would be to do just that--have a hole unimpaired heart. The one you were born with is the only heart you'll ever have at least until medical science crosses further frontiers and can transplant a human heart, much as is done with an eye. True, certain types of repair work is possible today, but it is a costly, tedious process. Rightly termed a "vital organ," your heart is a muscle-perated blood pump. It starts beating before you are born and continues an estimated 70 years--at an average of 70 to 80 beats a minute--without so much as a coffee break. Heart diseases rank first in head of cancer as cause of death. Cancer and cardiovascular diseases together account for over 60 percent of the deaths in Texas. About 30 percent are attributed to heart diseases. The term "heart disease" actually covers a broad range of heart and blood vessel diseases. They are linked together because sooner or later they impair heart functioning ability. Most common among car-

diovascular ailments is coronary heart disease, a condition precipitating heart attacks. It is a condition of the arteries, affecting mainly middle-aged men. Another well known cardiovascular condition is high blood pressure, i. e. hypertension. Over a long period of time, increased blood pressure can cause the heart to overwork and to lose efficiency. Rheumatic heart disease strikes another note of familiarity in the line-up of cardiovascular ailments. The chain of events leading to rheumatic heart disease has been discovered within the last few years, and with the advent of penicillin it can be proved an important disease preventive. Research efforts for heart restoration and rehabilitation methods continue, but definite preventive measures are already known. Eat a moderate, balanced diet; take adequate regular exercise; try to cope realistically with daily living under as little stress as possible. Follow these admonitions, and who knows--maybe your heart will tick for 70 years or more.

# Southwestern Plans Largest Year's Investment In 1964

Southwestern Public Service Company's plans for 1964 call for the largest one year investment in new facilities in its history, it has been announced by A. R. Watson, president and general manager of the electric light and power company.

Watson revealed today that the company has investment plans for new equipment and construction of \$30,222,000 for this year.

"The 1964 improvement and construction budget is nearly 31% higher than our record years for construction, which were 1953 and 1963, and is evidence of our continuing confidence in the growth of this region", Watson said in his announcement.

The major item in the company's 1964 construction program will be an accelerated schedule of work on the second unit of Cunningham Station, located west of Hobbs, New Mexico. Originally scheduled for completion in 1966, the continued growth of the area has resulted in this timetable on this 210,000 kilowatt unit being advanced a full year, and it is now scheduled to be in service in mid-1965.

Still another major generating plant addition is the 4th turbo-generator at Plant X, in Lamb County. This 210,000 kilowatt unit, the largest single machine ever installed on Southwestern-

system, will go into service in mid-1964.

"With our present generating capability being a little over one million kilowatts, and additions which total 420,000 kilowatts being planned for the next two years, it is apparent that we see our biggest period of growth still ahead of us. This, of course, means that this area must also be looking forward to its greatest growth period, because we install new facilities only because we see they will be needed, and we must be ready in advance of the hour of need", Watson pointed out.

Directly related to the construction of the generation fac-

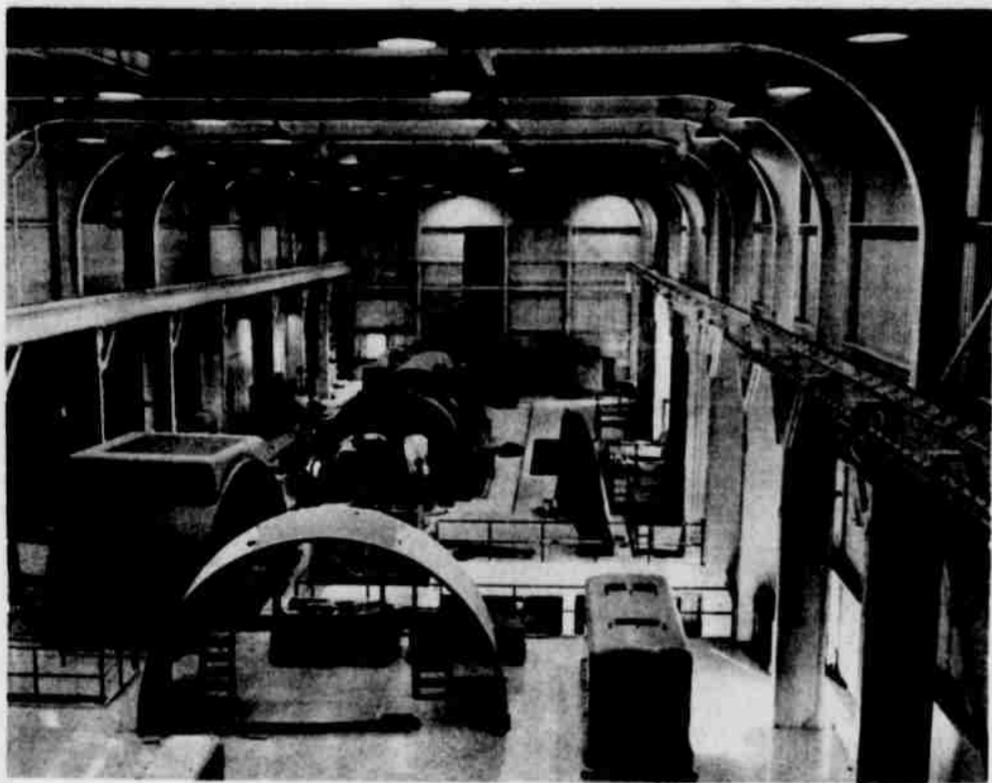
ilities in 1964 is the building of a two hundred thirty thousand volt transmission line linking Plant X and Cunningham Station. This line will be the first constructed by the company to operate at 230,000 volts, although some segments of the present transmission system, which are operating at 115,000 volts, have been built for easy adaptation to the higher voltage.

The company's ultimate goal is the operation of a 230,000 volt "backbone" transmission system extending from Borger to the Pecos Valley region of New Mexico. The result of doubling the transmission line voltage is that the line will then carry four times as much power.

The 230,000 volt transmission line construction scheduled for this year also calls for a new 230,000 volt line to Lubbock. This will make it possible for the Lubbock area to receive power at the new higher voltage and guarantee even better service in that region.

In addition to the transmission grid, which ties together all of the company's plants, the generating facilities of the larger stations, Plant X, Cunningham and Nichols Station, near Amarillo, are directly controlled by an automatic dispatching system, which electronically determines the most efficient generating units to be operated. The dispatching system also computes the share of the load which other plants should be carrying, on the basis of costs, and then these loads are assigned to the plants by direct communication from the load dispatching center in Amarillo.

"There are several other important factors which make it possible for our rates to our customers for electric service to not have to be raised. One of these is the fact that our customers are using more electricity, which makes it possible for us to use larger and more efficient equipment. Our employees are due a measure of credit for these low rates, too, for in 1963, operating expenses and maintenance took a lower percentage of gross revenues than they did the previous year, and it is efforts like this which overcome the rising costs of many of the things necessary to our business, and make it possible to keep our rates low", Watson concluded.

Bristow served two years as a pastor and has been engaged in crusade evangelism in the states of Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas, and New York, and in the Canadian provinces of British Columbia and Alberta.

During his college days, Bristow served two terms as Baptist Student Union president on his campus, and was appointed by the Baptist students of Texas colleges as a BSU summer missionary to the Pacific Northwest in 1957.

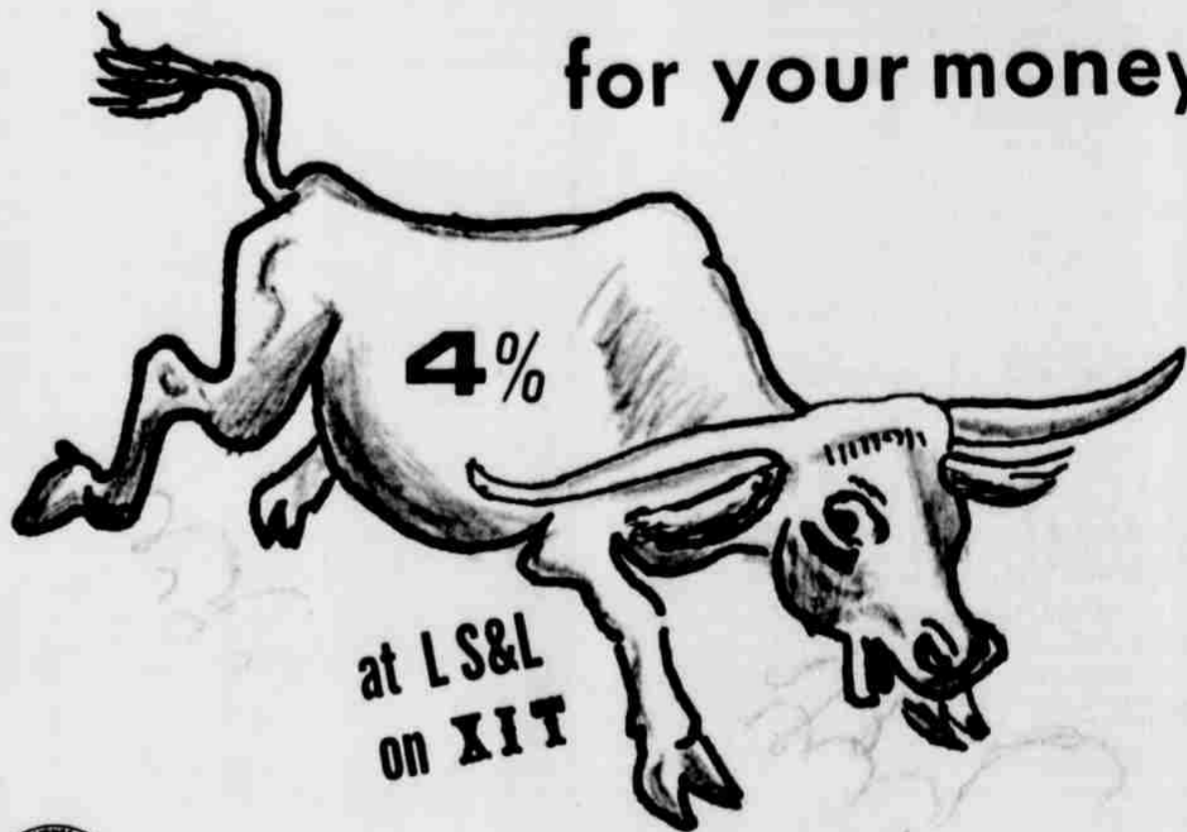

# Peace Corps Placement Tests Set In Lubbock

The next Peace Corps Placement Test is scheduled to be given nationwide on Saturday, January 11 at 8:30 a.m. The non-competitive aptitude tests will be administered at 825 post offices and other federal buildings in major cities throughout the United States.

In this area, tests will be administered in room 16-A of the Lubbock Post Office building and room 322 of the Amarillo Post Office building.

All applicants for Peace Corps service are required to take the Placement Test as well as submit a Peace Corps Questionnaire. Those who have not completed a Questionnaire will be asked to do so immediately after the testing. No applicant will take the test more than once without special permission from the Peace Corps.

Applicants should allow themselves about one and a half hours for the Placement Test. If they are proficient in Spanish or French they should plan an additional hour for the language achievement test -- designed to test mastery of grammar, vocabulary and reading comprehension.

The Placement Test itself is composed of a 30-minute general aptitude test (made up of verbal, mathematical and spatial problems) and a 30-minute modern language aptitude test. The latter is designed to provide an indication of one's probable degree of success in learning to speak and to understand a foreign language. Knowledge of a foreign language is not needed to score well on this aptitude test, nor required for entrance into the Peace Corps.

There are no passing or failing marks on the Placement Test. The scores are used, along with other criteria, to aid in the selection process. They help the Peace Corps to place prospective Volunteers in the most appropriate overseas assignments.

Training will begin this summer to help fill requests for more than 6,000 Volunteers to serve in 46 countries around the globe -- in Africa, Asia and Latin America. Hundreds of different skills are needed in the major fields of education, agri-

culture, health, construction, engineering and community development. For example: Ivory Coast wants science and math teachers; Nyasaland has asked for English and vocational teachers; Afghanistan needs carpenters and bricklayers, while Pakistan needs nurses. Chile wants agricultural extension workers and Honduras wants Volunteers for community development.

To take the Placement Test applicants must be American citizens at least 18 years of age. There is no upper age limit. Married couples may apply if they have no dependents under 18. A college education is not a requirement if an applicant can offer a certain skill or experience. Liberal arts college graduates with no special "skills" are often used as teachers and community development workers.
