PROGRAM CHANGES ANNOUNCED

Cotton Acreage Requests Now Being Received Here

Changes in Texas' Release and Reapportionment program on cotton for 1964 have been announced by the State ASC Committee and could result in Lamb County and the High Plains area getting a larger share of released cotton acreage.

Lamb County got slightly more than 4,300 released acres last year. The 23 counties in the Plains Cotton Growers' territory received 91,684 acres of cotton under this program in 1963.

The Lamb ASC office is presently taking applications from farmers who desire to obtain released acres. Final date for requesting additional acreage or releasing acres, has been set for March 4. It is important that area farmers understand that requests for reapportioned acres must be filed with the courty ASC confinition

with the county ASC confimittee before that date.

Farmers must go so the ASC office and fill out an application, or write feed an application form.

Resportioning of the acres will take place on March 25 in the area zone.

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

This cake is delicious and is the answer for those who do not care for dark fruit cakes that are spicy. This cake improves with age, but if it is kept very long it will re-quire refrigeration.

PLANT X IS MAJOR ITEM

Southwestern Plans Largest Year's Investment In 1964

Company's plans for 1964 call for the largest one year in-vestment in new facilities in its history, it has been announced by A. R. Watson, president and general manager of the electric light and power company.

Watson revealed today that the company has investment plans for new equipment and construction of \$30,222,000 for

this year.
"The 1964 improvement and construction budget is nearly 31% higher than our record years for construction, which were 1953 and 1963, and is evidence of our continuing confidence in the growth of this region", Watson said in his an-

pany's 1964 construction program will be an accelerated schedule of work on the second unit of Cunningham Station, located west of Hobbs, New Mexico. Originally scheduled for completion in 1966, the con-tinued growth of the area has resulted in this timetable on this 210,000 kilowatt unit being advanced a full year, and it is now scheduled to be in service

Still another major generating plant addition is the 4th turbogenerator at Plant X, in Lamb County. This 210,000 kilowatt unit, the largest single machine ever installed on Southwestern'-

in mid-1965.

"With our present generating capability being a little over one million kilowatts, and additions which total 420,000 kilowatts being planned for the next two years, it is apparent that we see our biggest period of growth still ahead of us. This, of course, means that this area must also be looking forward to its greatest growth period, because we install newfacilities only because we see they will be needed, and we must be ready in advance of the hour of need", Watson pointed out.

Directly related to the construction of the generation fac-

all go into service in filities in 1964 is the building of a two hundred thirty thous-and volt transmission line linking Plant X and Cunningham Sta-This line will be the

first constructed by the com-pany to operate at 230,000 volts, although some segments of the present transmission system, which are operating at 115,000 volts, have been built for easy adaptation to the higher voltage.

The company's ultimate goal is the operation of a 230,000 volt "backbone" transmission system extending from Bor-ger to the Pecos Valley re-gion of New Mexico. The re-sult of doubling the transmission line voltage is that the line will then carry four times

as much power. The 230,000 volt transmission line construction scheduled for this year also calls for a new 230,000 volt line to Lubbock. This will make it possible for the Lubbock area to receive power at the new higher voltage and guarantee even better service in that region.

In addition to the transmission grid, which ties together all of the company's plants, the generating facilities of the larger stations, Plant X, Cunningham and Nichols Station, near Amarillo, are directly controlled by an automatic dispatching system, which electronically determines the most efficient generating units to be operated. The dispatching system also computes the share of the load which other plants should be carrying, on the basis of costs, and then these loads are assigned to the plants by direct communication from the load dispatching center in Amarillo.

"There are several other important factors which make it possible for our rates to our customers for electric service to not have to be raised. One of these is the fact that our customers are using more electricity, which makes it possible for us to use larger and more efficient equipment. Our employees are due a measure of credit for these low rates, too, for in 1963, operating expenses and maintenance took a lower percentage of gross revenues than they did the pre-vious year, and it is efforts like this which overcome the rising costs of many of the things necessary to our business, and make it possible to keep our rates low", Watson
