

Catholic Church Offers Land To School Board

86 Lamb County Farmers Approve Cotton Quotas

\$25,000 Is Considered 'Fair' Price

Board Takes Offer Under Advisement; Area Is One Block

A tentative offer to sell land owned by Sacred Heart Parish east of the school grounds on First Avenue was made Monday to the Littlefield Board of Education.

The offer was made by Monsignor Wilfred F. Bosen, pastor of the church, and the board took it under advisement. President Jack Christian commented that the land would be useful for school expansion in future years, particularly when a new junior high school building becomes necessary.

300 by 300 Feet

The land embraces one full city block and measures 300 by 300 feet. The church's one story brick rectory which was recently remodeled, is on one corner.

Monsignor Bosen explained to the board that money realized from the sale of the church land could be applied to the indebtedness of the new Sacred Heart church which is nearing completion. He said that he thought a "fair price" would be in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

In other actions the board: (1) Set Monday and Tuesday, Dec. 20 and 21 as "makeup days" for classroom time lost because of the football play-offs.

(2) Appointed William Brune to take the school census in January.

(3) Accepted the resignation of Ethel Eason, who has returned to A. Worth, and appointed Mrs. Iris Blackwell as seventh grade teacher of math and social studies, in his place.

(4) Approved a request of the Lutheran church to have a rally in the school gym, Jan. 30.

(5) Increased the rental fee on band instruments from \$5 to \$10 per year.

(6) Passed a resolution stipulating that Elmer Hall and Carl Keeling have the exclusive rights to the new electric football scoreboard donated by Hall-Keeling Builders Co.

(7) Authorized the purchase of eight basketball suits costing \$80 for Dunbar high team boys.

(8) Established a policy for bus drivers not to drive to a student's home unless the house is a quarter of a mile or farther from the road consistent with weather conditions.

(9) Appointed the following to a committee to investigate and select textbooks for adoption and use in the schools:

William Brune, Ralph Schilling, Paul Jones, D. C. Lindley, Forrest Martin, Bonnie Crosby, Elizabeth Ayres and Inell Lowe.

Post Office Braces For Biggest Christmas Rush

Littlefield postal employees are bracing themselves for what may be the busiest week end in Yuletide history. Early this week the cancellation machine was registering some 5,000 pieces of mail per day. But tomorrow and Saturday, the machine will tick off about 15 to 18,000.

"It's a perennial battle against time for the employees," Postmaster C. A. Joplin said. As usual, Christmas cards and gift packages are arriving far too slowly and the postmaster asked the public's cooperation.

"The big danger is that commercial shipments and incoming Christmas mail may slow up the outgoing operation. Poorly wrapped packages will also complicate our work," Joplin said.

To avoid unnecessary delays, and speed up delivery by Christmas Eve, Postmaster Joplin advises everyone to:

Mail all Christmas presents for distant states immediately. The recommended deadline date was Sunday but there is a chance that the packages may arrive before Christmas if they are mailed now.

The deadline for Christmas card mailing for out of town delivery was yesterday. To insure delivery now, an airmail stamp may be necessary. Local Christmas cards should be posted no later than one week before Christmas.

The post office will remain open all day Saturday to accommodate "last minute" mailers.

Only 16 Votes Cast Against Benson's Plan In 602 Ballots

Lamb county farmers joined with the nation Tuesday in voting overwhelming support of the strictest cotton acreage controls in history next year to retain high government price support.

Cotton farmers here cast 602 votes at the county's six polling places, according to Charles Hill of the Amherst office of the Agriculture Conservation and Stabilization office. Out of that number, 586 voted in favor of retaining marketing quotas for the 1955 upland cotton crop, compared with 16 voting against.

Nationwide, 17 out of 20 states yesterday reported complete returns and 335,488 farmers voted in favor of Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson's plan to reduce 1955 acreage allotments. Votes against were 30,093, far below the required two-thirds necessary to change the 1955 picture.

Here is the way Lamb county voted at polling places:

Amherst, 136 votes cast, 130 for, 6 against; Sudan, 63 votes cast, 60 for, 3 against; Littlefield, 221 votes cast, 220 for, 1 against; Earth, 55 votes cast, 51 for, 4 against; Springlake, 35 votes cast, 35 for, none against; Olton, 92 votes cast, 90 for, 2 against.

According to Hill, slightly over 700 votes were cast in 1954 with the same majority of approval.

Texas farmers who joined in the voting followed the national trend. Final returns showed a vote of 51,970 farmers in 147 counties on upland cotton, with 46,068 approving the present system and 5,902 against extending the support-act program. The percentage in favor was 88.6, slightly below the 90.5 per cent approval registered in last year's voting.

Texas growers of long staple cotton in 11 counties also approved support acts by a vote of 330 to 23, a 93.3 percentage compared to 86.1 in 1953.

Under the program, farmers would plant no more than 18,113,208 acres in cotton next year, compared with 21,400,000 acres this year. Price supports would be set at anywhere from 82 1/2 to 90 per cent of parity.

If farmers had rejected the Benson program, supports would have fallen automatically from this year's 90 per cent to 50 per cent in 1956. Controls never had been rejected in eight previous referendums.

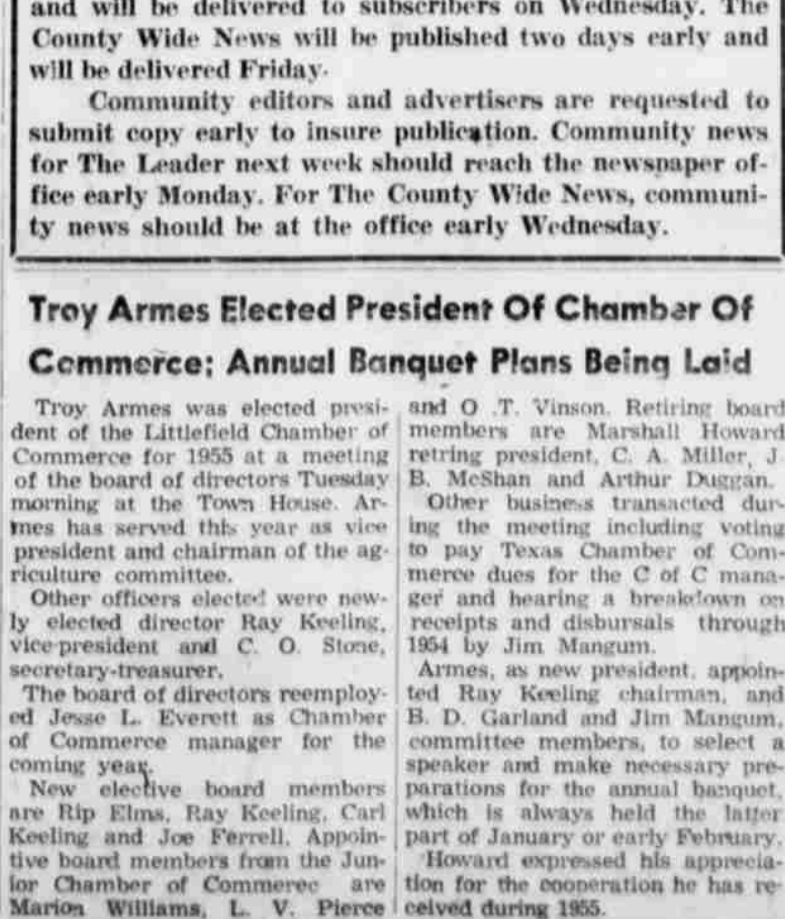

New Parkview Baptist Church To Be Ready For Dedication In Two Months

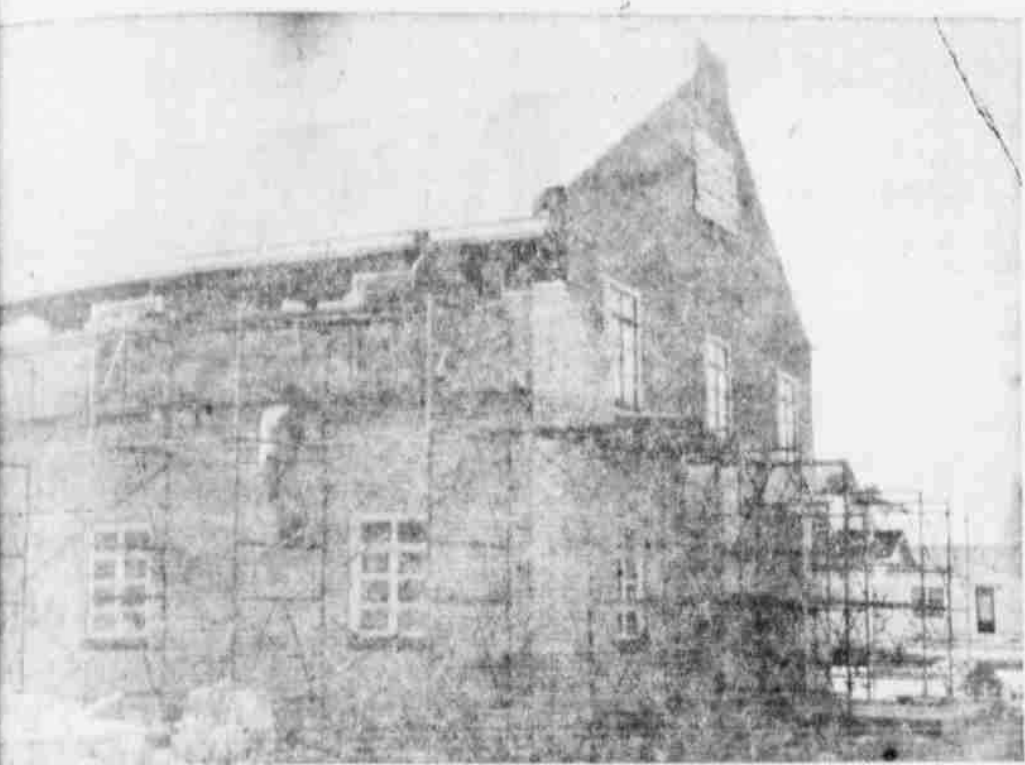
Workmen this week were putting the finishing touches to the new Parkview Baptist church which will be valued at about \$40,000 when completed.

Rev. Quint Farley, the church's new pastor, who succeeded Rev. John Taylor, said the church may be ready for services in 30 days. Furniture and equipment have been installed and except for minor woodwork touching up and the laying of outside brick, the church is ready.

The official dedication will probably be within two months, Rev. Farley said. The new structure has been planned for future use as an educational building. It has an auditorium, baptistry, classrooms, a soup-kitchen, a room for three offices, and will seat 350. Pews and the pulpit are of blond.

Only four years old, the church was organized as a mission of the First Baptist church and now has a membership of 300 and a Sunday school attendance of 155.

Rev. Farley, veteran of four years navy service as a radioman, graduated from Howard Payne Baptist college at Brownwood. The 28 year old minister was reared in Roby, Texas. His wife, Charlyne, is a native of Alabama. They have three children, Sharon, 6; Debora, 4; and Michael, 11 months.

Use Publication Suggestions To Create Novel Decorations

Christmas Centerpieces Constructed From Cedar, Inverted Glass, Glitter

Three young matrons of Littlefield have earned the title of their friends of "the cleverest gals in town" with their tables and mantel decorations they have made.

Mrs. LeMoine Grissom, Mrs. Betty Roden and Mrs. Jarold Jones put the finishing touches on their decorations at a recent luncheon at which Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Grissom

and Mrs. Roden were hostesses. Their guests' first inkling of the things they were to see inside was the door of the Jarold Jones home, decorated by Lemoyne Grissom.

LeMoine covered the door front with red oil cloth, then used strips of white adhesive tape to form musical staves. The notes and words to "Noel, Noel" were made of pieces of white paper.

BOOK IDEAS

Barbara used an illustration in a Christmas idea's book in decorating her mantel. Silver bells tied with red satin ribbon dangle from the upper right corner of the mantel mirror. The ribbon drapes gracefully across the mirror to the lower left corner where a gay Santa Claus on a styrofoam base stands on the mantel, surrounded by greenery. Reindeer march through wisps of angel hair across the length of the mantel, from which the traditional stockings are hung.

Betty's contribution was a modernistic wall tree constructed of two flat thicknesses of chickenwire cut in the shape of a tree and covered with tinsel and silver and colored Christmas balls. On the buffet beneath she placed a Santa Claus cookie jar between a pair of crystal candleholders bearing frosted candles.

USE GOLD PAINT

A brandy sniffer and some gold paint resulted in a beautiful candleholder. LeMoine painted the brandy sniffer gold inside and out, filled it with sand and placed a gold-painted candle in it. This was tied with a gold ribbon and pine cone bow. Strips of florists wire painted gold, were stuck into the sand around the goblet. Small gold Christmas tree balls were placed on the end of each wire.

For a luncheon, Christmas Day

dinner, or supper party, they constructed a Della Robbia wreath, centerpiece, which was a large piece of doughnut-shaped styrofoam as its base. All fruit and nuts around the wreath were shellacked and attached with florists' wire to an abundance of cedar. Centering the wreath was a tall, frosty red candle.

LAMP GLOBE

One of Barbara's creations, perfect to be given as a game prize at a Christmas party, was a clear lamp globe filled with Christmas balls and placed on a cedar-banked styrofoam base.

An ordinary syrup bottle, sprinkled with glitter and tier with silver Christmas ornaments, served as a candle holder for a slender silver taper.

An inverted medium-sized funnel, colored red, had a styrofoam ball on top wearing a smaller red funnel cap. Black buttons on the styrofoam face formed eyes and nose and an angel hair beard completed the small Santa table novelty.

A silver candle was glued to the bottom of an inverted silver-painted glass, and tied with silver ribbon and bells.

A silver bell was made from a coffee mug turned upside down and painted silver. A red ribbon served as the handle.

USE GREENERY

Several table centerpieces were created from styrofoam bases topped with greenery, pine cones and ribbon and holding in one corner bulb-shaped frosted candles. Variations were achieved by using all silver, all gold or all fuschia Christmas balls rather than multi-colored ones on the centerpieces.

To suit the taste of the modern art enthusiasts, they whipped up a paper Rudolph with branched twigs for horn and a quizzical button face. He consists simply of a gold paper funnel neck with the point inserted into a cutout in the gold paper funnel head. The twig antlers are accented with small gold balls and stand up perkily

from the large open end of the head funnel, turned toward the wall.

The decorations proved as economical as they are attractive since Barbara, Betty and LeMoine melted and whipped the paraffin to make the candles, and used materials at hand in the construction . . . a little paint, some glitter, a tree ornament or two and plenty of cedar.

Now that it's open season on peace, duels and Christmas ideas, we'd like to take a pot shot at the latter.

If you happen to be one who is committed to a happy Yuletide season in a setting of pink and primrose, blue and gold, or silver and chartreuse, you'll find us a bit old-fashioned.

If, however, you lean toward traditional Christmas red and evergreen colors, here's an idea for

your Christmas doorway that says "Welcome" to every comer and every passerby:

Before you tack it up, however, arrange the Christmas cards over it in a pleasing design, pin each from underneath through the bottom half of the folder, only, with the open side slanting down. This leaves the top fold

loose so the breeze gives movement to the cards but does not open them wide.

Outline the doorway in evergreens and conceal a spotlight behind some shrub so that it shines on your entrance. Your friends will be diverted not only by the color and movement, but by the individual greetings as they wait for you to answer their ring.

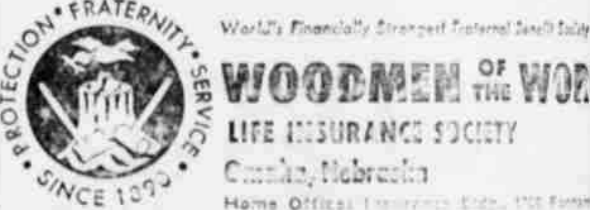

16 Conservation Practices Okayed By ASC Committee

The Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee yesterday announced that it has approved 16 agriculture conservation practices for the 1955 ACP program year.

The first initial sign up period for the aid began Dec. 13 and will end Dec. 23. Applications received during this period will be considered, consistent with the amount of available funds. Tentative approvals will be issued about Jan. 1.

PURCHASE ORDER

It was pointed out that if a farmer signs up it will be necessary for the Soil Conservation Service to determine the need and practicability of the project. After prior approval (ACP Form 245) is received by the farmer and he wishes the government payment to be made to some contractor, he must receive a purchase order before the work is started, from the Armerst ASC office.

ACP projects, and identifying numbers approved by the committee, are:

A-3. Establishment of additional acreage of vegetative cover in crop rotation to retard erosion and to improve soil structure, permeability or water-holding capacity.

A-6. Initial establishment of field strip cropping to protect soil from wind or water erosion.

E-2. Initial improvement of vegetative cover on rangeland by artificial reseeding for soil protection.

CONTROLLING SHRUBS

B-3. Controlling competitive shrubs to permit growth of adequate desirable vegetative cover

for soil protection on range or pasture land.
D-5. Constructing wells for livestock water as a means of protecting established vegetative cover.

B-7. Constructing dams, pits, or ponds for livestock water as a means of protecting established vegetative cover.

C-1. Initial establishment of permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water without causing erosion.

C-4. Constructing terraces to detain or control the flow of water and check soil erosion.

C-5. Constructing diversion terraces to intercept runoff and divert excess water to protected outlets.

CONSERVING WATER

C-12. Reorganizing farm irrigation systems to conserve water and prevent erosion.

C-13. Leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation water and to prevent erosion.

C-14. Constructing or lining reservoirs for irrigation water.

C-15. Lining irrigation ditches to prevent erosion and loss of water by seepage.

D-4. Establishment of a vegetative cover to protect cropland throughout the 1955 crop year.

E-3 (a). Bringing adequate amounts of clod-forming subsoil to the surface on sandy cropland subject to wind erosion to protect soil from blowing.

E-3 (b). Contour listing, contour chiseling, cross slope chiseling, pit cultivation, or chiseling on the contour for wind erosion control.

Texas Cotton Farmers Hit One Half Bale To An Acre

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Texas cotton farmers averaged just under one-half bale to the acre this year, in spite of the drought, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

The average yield was 242 pounds per acre, well over the 200-pound record which stood of 37 consecutive years, from 1912 to 1949, the bureau points out. Some individual areas (notably Central

and East Texas and the Blacklands) did not fare so well, but their deficiency was more than made up with high-grade, long-staple cotton from irrigated sections in the Trans-Pecos and El Paso areas.

When the new Congress convenes in January, Texas cotton acreage allotments are expected to be increased, the bureau notes. If this happens, there will be an even greater demand for methods of fighting the boll-worm and boll-weevil problems, and for some way to defoliate cotton stalks so mechanical pickers can be used.

The answer to both of these problems, bureau officials say, may lie in the use of helicopters instead of the less maneuverable, conventional airplanes. The helicopter, using the advantage gained in its "downwash" from the overhead propeller, can spray much more thoroughly than airplanes, and "hard-to-get-at" places are virtually eliminated. The helicopter's maneuverability even enables the pilot to fly at night under favorable weather conditions.

The bureau reported that farm cash income from cotton was 25 per cent greater in the first nine months of 1954 than in the same 1953 period.

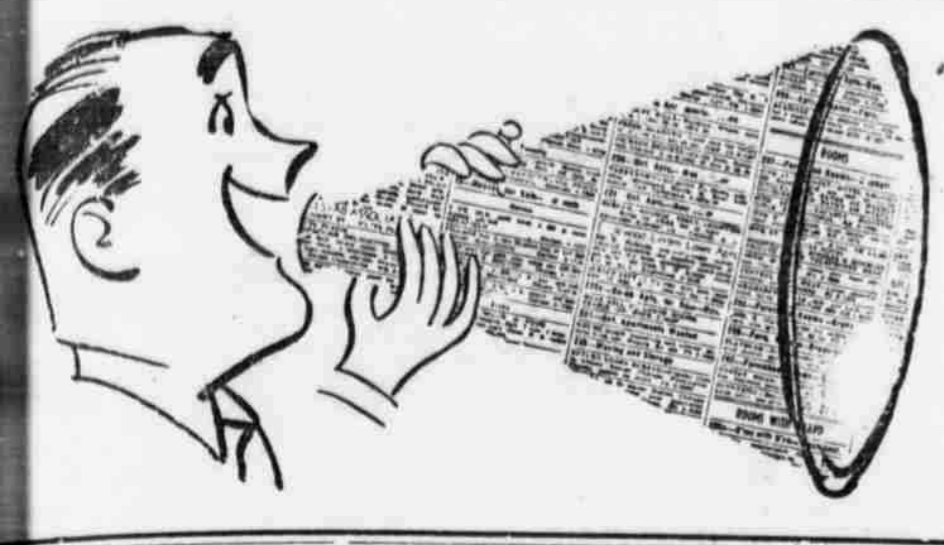

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
A public service lecture of the State Bar of Texas

Got a good idea for a new invention floating around in the back of your mind? Yes? Perhaps to protect your right you should file an application for a patent with the U. S. Patent office.

Under the patent laws of the United States, an application for patent must be filed, if at all, earlier than one year after the date of first public sale or use or published disclosure of the invention. If this deadline is met, then the person who first conceives a new and novel patentable idea is entitled to it, provided he thereafter pursues a course of reasonable diligence in reducing his invention to practice or filing a patent application thereon. Therefore, if conflicting claims arrive as to who is entitled to a patent, it is necessary to establish who first had the idea, and not just who filed the first application for patent.

Given Credit

Since an inventor is automatically given credit for a date at least as early as his application, without having to introduce any proof, an early application date is advantageous though not conclusive.

But if an inventor protects himself while he is making tests and perfecting his invention, he can get credit for a date earlier than his date of application.

To do this, he should, as soon as he conceives the idea, make a written record of the facts, including a general statement of the nature of his invention, and a rough drawing if possible. Preferably the written record is photocopied. The photocopy of the record should be dated and signed by two witnesses who have read and understood the photocopy of the record on the dates besides their names.

While some inventors mail written disclosures of their inventions to themselves, such procedure is not necessary if the foregoing preferred procedure is followed.

Can Continue Work

By taking the above precautions, an inventor establishes a preliminary date showing the time when his original idea was conceived. After that he can continue with his work, perfect his idea, and after it is perfected, make application for a patent, if he feels that he has a patentable idea. But the inventor must also keep records of his continued work, and the continued work should be disclosed periodically to a witness who is not a co-inventor.
