Christmas Market Bringing Huge Sum Into This Section

Littlefield Buyer Pays Out \$4,500 in One Day for Turkeys

The throne of King Cotton threatened.

Thousands of dollars are pouring into the pockets of Lamb county farmers through the selling of their turkeys on the Christmas market, which opened Friday morning.

The market opened at 15 cents and had climbed to 19 cents yesterday.

While Littlefield is declared to be the largest market in Lamb county, turkeys also are being purchased at Sudan, Olton, Earth and Amherst.

Figures are not available as to how much has been paid to farmers of Lamb county for their turkeys since the opening of the Christmas market last Friday, but the figure would be nothing short of astounding. This statement is born out by the fact that one Littlefield concern paid farmers \$4,500 yesterday for turkeys in the buying of turkeys on the present market.

The turkey dressing plant of the Littlefield Poultry & Egg, a new industry in Littlefield, is in full swing. This plant is paying \$100 a day for labor, in addition to the money being spent with farmers in the purchase of their turkeys. Barney Wilson, manager, said that four carloads of dressed turkeys would be shipped out to eastern markets between last night and Saturday night





Announce Ginning Totals for Plains

Seventeen South Plains counties had, on November 14 this year, ginned 88 per cent more cotton than they had on the same date last year, the report of the bureau of the census of the department of commerce for the mid-November cotton ginnings, reported.

Total ginnings this year were 348,-\$15 on that date, compared to 184,-991 bales a year ago, a net gain of 163,824 bales.

Lubbock county continued to lead the South Plains with 52,350 bales. Those who wish to have a part by This county ranss 22nd in the state in production of cotton this year up to November 14.

Lamb county placed second with 42,674 bales. Lynn's place as third is being hotly contested by Hockley, exceeding that county by less than 300 bales while Dawson is pressing close to Hockley, holding fifth place with a thousand bales under Hockley.

In only one county has theer been fewer bales ginned this year than at the same time last year. This is Gaines where the ginnings are 500 bales fewer.

Cochran and Swisher counties do not have comparative figures with 1930 owing to the fact that these two were included in "all others" to avoid disclosure of individual operations." Following are the ginnings

Littlefield Farmer Dies Enroute to a Lubbock Hospital



GROWTH OF DIVERSIFICATION

Growth of diversification in Texas is reflected in a few figures just made public by the bureau of the census. It shows that the cattle and chicken population has increased several hundred thousand.

Several paradoxes are also apparent. Number of hogs dropped from 2,225,558 on Jan. 1, 1920 to only 1,561,461 on April 1, 1930. One of two things must be true. Either hogs have proved unprofitable or someone is overlooking an opportunity to make some money.

Hog raising in most sections on the Plains has proven highly worthwhile. Climate here seems particularly to favor diversified farming and abundance of feed that can be raised cheaply is just one more helpful factor.

Diversification makes the farmer independent. It puts him usually in a position where he is more or less self-sufficient and does not have to bow to the slightest whim of the market.

Since agriculture is basic in Dawson county prosperity for the farmer means prosperity for everyone. If diversification will give that condition to us then any forces, such as county agents, or anything else are more than worthwhile .-- Lamesa Reporter.

THE FARM SITUATION

The agricultural South is in better economic position than at this time a year ago, owing largely to reduced costs of production, and to more homegrown foods for farm families and feeds for farm animals, according to the report on the Agricultural Outlook for the southern states which is being distributed this week by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. Broadway stage hit. Mr. Robinson's S. Department of Agriculture. This report is being carried to farmers, through hundreds of meetings beginning this week in all the Southern States' by extension agents, vocational teachers of agriculture, and representatives of the Department of Agriculture and Federal Farm Board. The report was prepared at the outlook conference at Memphis, Tenn., November 10-13, in which 150 Federal and State economists and extension workers participated.

Economists from any parts of the South stated that this year's cotton crop was produced at the lowest cost in many years; that there is a general disposition to devote more acreage to the production of farm food and feed supplies.
