

Lamb County Farmers Save \$52,600 Result Of Legislature

Farmers in Lamb County will save about \$52,600 a year as a result of legislation just enacted by Congress affecting interest rates on Federal Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans.

The temporary rate of 3 1-2 per cent on first mortgage Land Bank loans will be continued for two years ending June 30, 1942. During this period the interest rate on first and second mortgage Land Bank Commissioner loans will be reduced from 4 to 3 1-2 per cent. Land Bank and Commissioner loans were originally written at contract rates averaging about 5 per cent.



from the air has not reached the point where deliberate hits could be scored by bombs aimed at such confined targets.

The nurrowness of the Gibra tar terrain, however, though providing protection from the air, ser iously interferes with the port's utility as an offensive air base. There is lack of adequate landing space Mrs. H. C. Thornton, Mr. and Mrs. for airplanes at Gibraltar would require use of airplane carriers.

The Gibraltar dockyard would be under distant artillery fire if Spain became hostile, making Gibraltar vulnerable as a British repair station. But an artillery bombbardment would not affect the rock it self within whose sides are innumerable chambers for big guns, To capture Gibrultar an invading force would have to cross a low sandy isthmus half a mile wide and one and one-half miles long leading from Spain to the rock. The devasting fire that could be brough to bear on this exposed position would make any attack hazardous in the extreme.

The guns of Gibraltar could repel any possible assault from the sea. The last time an attempt was made to capture Gibraltar was by the French and Spanish in 1783 The besieging fleet marked a great advance in warship construction with the ships' sides six to seven feet thick. It was thought this ar mor would defy any size cannon ball, as it did early in the engagement. But later the British began using red hot shot, then an innovation and the attacking fleet was put out of action.

As long as Gibraltar is in British possession no shipping can enter or leave the Mediterranean from or to the Atlantic ocean without Britain's consent. Great Bri min's blockade of the continent is greatly facilitated by his fact, which will have an important bearing on the outcome of the war if Hitler's threatened invasion of the British Isles fails.


