vice in October, 1942.

Sgt. Paul L. Pinkerton of Littlefield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul L. Pinkerton of Omega, N. M., and formerly of Littlefield, probably has traveled more than any of the other men in his group. Sgt. Pinkerton entered the service in Lubbock early in 1942 and went across in No-vember, 1942. He landed with the Allies in North Africa on D-Day, Nov. 8, 1942, with the initial in-vasion force. He was on duty as a mechanic in North Africa and fel-lowed the Allied forces through Tunisia, into Sicily and into Italy, After a few months in the Italian area, Sgt. Pinkerton went to the China-Burma-India theater in February, 1944. He was a member of the famed 'Flying Crows' fighter squadrons, one of the most travelled squadrons in the AAF. Sgt. Pin-kerton worked on P-40s in North Africa and on P-47s in India and China.

### This May Help You

For those who are confused (and who isn't?) by all the "jimas," "shi-mas," "rettos," and "guntos" in the headlines these days, here's a little dope on the pecular ways of Japanese nomenclature, as collected by Lt. Milburn McCarty, Jr., a Marine Corps public relations officer.

"Jima" means island, and so does "shima." Japs use "jima" for one shade of meaning and "shima" for another. But the distinction is too complicated for most of us to master. When a Jap wants to talk about a lot of islands he says "shima jima" and. that clears up everything.

"To" and "shu" are also- Jap words for island, or at least they are when combined with prefixes, as in "retto," an d- "Honshu." Okinawa, off the shores of the main Jap islands, connotes " an offshore piece of rope." "Tokio," a rela-tively new name in Japanese history . (having been substituted for old Edo around the turn of the Century), means "Eastern Capital."




