

First division to be judged Saturday will be swine, followed by sheep at 11 a.m., steers at 1:30 p.m. and Shetland ponies at 3.

Trophies will be awarded the first, second and third place winners in each Trustee election for the Little class and to the Grand and Reserve Champion pony of the show.


