Texans Pay Low Prices For Petro

Lower prices paid by Tex-as consumers for petroleum products point up that our state is traditionally and consistently ahead of others in safeguarding the rights of its people, Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey said in Austin last

Ramsey, appointed to the Railroad Commission last September, is a candidate for the unexpired term of the late Commissioner Olin Culberson,

"The primary function of the Railroad Commission," Ramsey said, "is to protect the interest of the public. Suc-cess in this responsibility under conservation laws and court decisions is clearly re-flected in the lower prices Texans pay for petroleum pro-ducts. A good example," he said "is that the average price of regular gasoline, excluding taxes, in Texas is five cents per gallon lower than the average nationwide price for the same products. This adds up to a sizeable annual saving to the Texas consumer."

Ramsey noted that a survey of 32 cities in 26 states by the Oil and Gas Journal showed that as of March 20, the average price for the 32 cities was 19.2 cents per gallon, as compared with the average price per gallon of gasoline in Texas of 14.2 cents.

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


