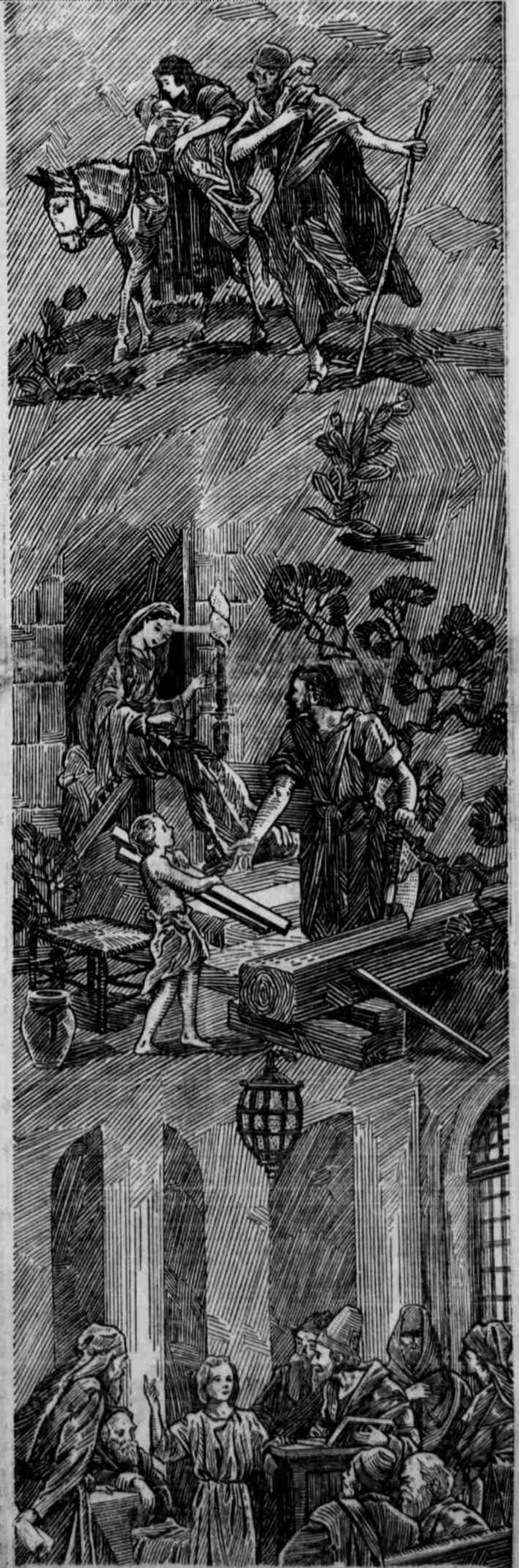
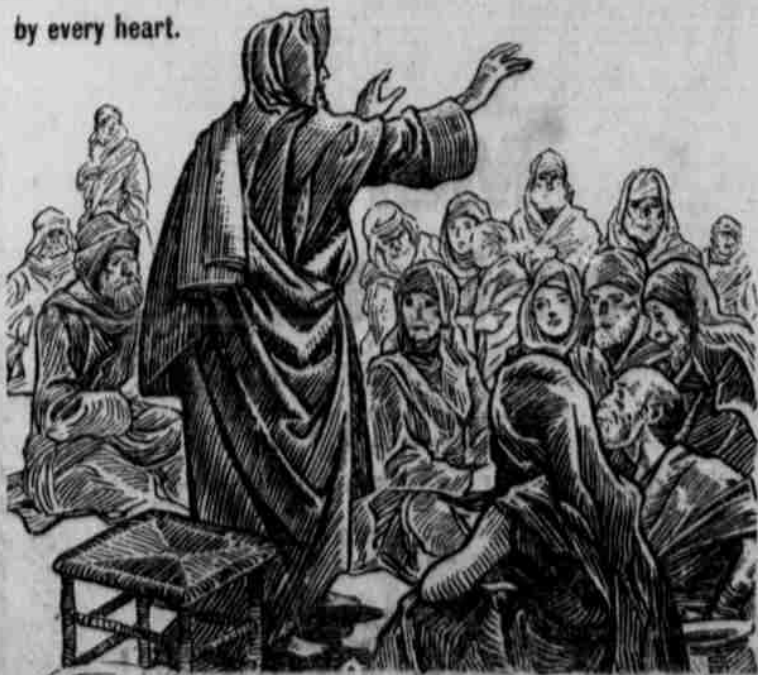
The Song of Christmas

Traffic Ordinances  
Will Be Enforced

At a recent city commission meeting, orders were issued that all provisions of the traffic ordinances must be rigidly enforced, and the commission gave W. G. Street, city secretary, and City Marshal J. L. Walraven instructions to see that this is done.

In an interview with a Leader reporter Friday, Mr. Street stated that very few people had been bringing the traffic violation tags, attached to their cars for not obeying the city parking ordinance, to the city secretary's office, but were destroying them. He stated that the city had now a list of all auto owners in the county, and that hereafter tagged cars would be checked for owners, and that should car owners not bring the tag to the city secretary's office and pay the fine, warrants would be issued, which would mean additional cost.

Mr. Street stated he disliked very much taking any fines, but that the city must enforce the traffic ordinance, otherwise the parking problem would be difficult, adding, "We know our town hasn't enough parking space. We are only asking that all people cooperate by parking within the white chalk lines, thus permitting more people to park on Main Street."

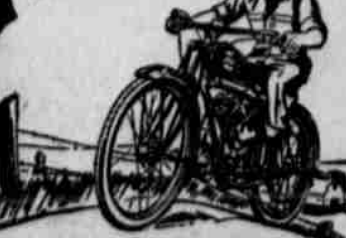

Extension Service reminds us that any farmer who has made a gross income of \$500 or more this year must file an income tax return.

And here's a choice for you, as far as the time of paying taxes is concerned, you can either file a declaration of estimated 1946 net income by January 15 and follow up with final return March 15, or you can get the job done early by making your final return by January 15. If you do pay up before January 15, you will not have to make a declaration. The final return by that date takes the place of the declaration.

Finally here's good news on income taxes, too. They're going to be less this year. The average farm income tax bill will be approximately 17 per cent less than it was last year. Remember the dates—January 15 for a declaration; March 15 for a final return. Or do it early and get the final return in by January 15.

"A" sheets that will help the farmer list his expenses and reprints are available at the county agent's office. It farmers will use this sheet it will help them to list each expense and probable savings.

You may have failed to make enough money to make a return or pay taxes, but if you show a net loss of \$1,000 and you can carry this to 1947—which will give you \$1,000 more free of taxes. It is wise for each person to talk to some qualified

Santa Fe handled a total of 41,102 cars in the preceding week this year.

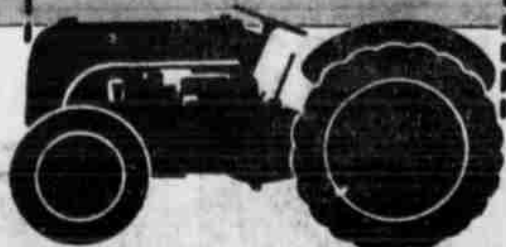

### Insemination Offers Faster Means Production of Dairy Cows

Artificial insemination offers one of the fastest means of raising the production of dairy cows. M. College and M. College state out that the production of 3,080 pounds of milk from 136 pounds of feed. Everyone in the dairy industry should be determined to do something about raising these production figures, says Burleson, and artificial insemination is one of the quickest means of getting higher dairy production. In summing up the advantages, as well as the disadvantages, of the artificial breeding program in Texas, Burleson gives these facts:

The primary purpose of artificial

insemination is the improvement of dairy cattle. There are other advantages, but this is the basis for the work. Artificial insemination permits the mating of many females to a single sire. If this sire has proven ability for high production behind him—and this should certainly be the case in an artificial ring or association—his worth as a herd builder can be spread more widely. The number of cows bred from one bull service can easily be from 50 to 100.

Other advantages of artificial insemination are: (1) Services of outstanding sires can be made available to the small herd owner at a cost he can afford to pay; (2) the danger of having a bull on the farm is eliminated; (3) Certain genital diseases can be more easily controlled; (4) bulls can be proven faster because more daughters are possible; (5) herd owners share the risk in proving young bulls; (6) Herd and breeding records are made available when otherwise they may not be; (7) dairy cattle are improved, which means more prosperous dairy farmers.

An artificial insemination program has its limitations. There is no magic in it; the offspring produced receive exactly the same inheritance as they would if the same parents had been mated naturally. The rate of conception normally will be about the same as in natural breeding. The program should not be considered or sold as a cure-all for breeding troubles. It is probable, however, that these breeding troubles will be discovered sooner in artificial insemination work than otherwise.

Artificial insemination offers the greatest possibilities to a group of dairymen who have organized for the

purpose of carrying on this type of breeding program. Such a group should have at least 1200 cows signed up for service. A technician is hired and a breeding fee of \$6 is usually charged.

Two dollars of this fee goes to the bull stud to cover cost of semen. If the technician breeds 1,000 cows during the year, the association would take in \$4,000 to cover operating expenses—the technician's salary, travel, utilities and equipment. Prospective associations are encouraged to hold off operations until they have sound financial backing and a business-like organization.

The Pure Bred Dairy Cattle Association has set up rules and regulations governing artificial insemination in purebred dairy herds. To insure the registration of resulting offspring, Texas associations must conform with these rules and regulations.

Prospective associations may obtain a copy of the requirements necessary for approval in Texas through their county agricultural agent.

collided with another car on the highway this side of Canyon.

The truck, a new \$8,000 vehicle, loaded with 3300 gallons of gasoline, caught fire and was completely destroyed, and is reported to have carried no insurance.

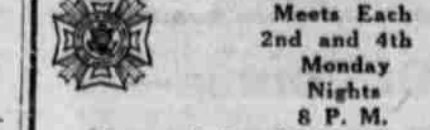

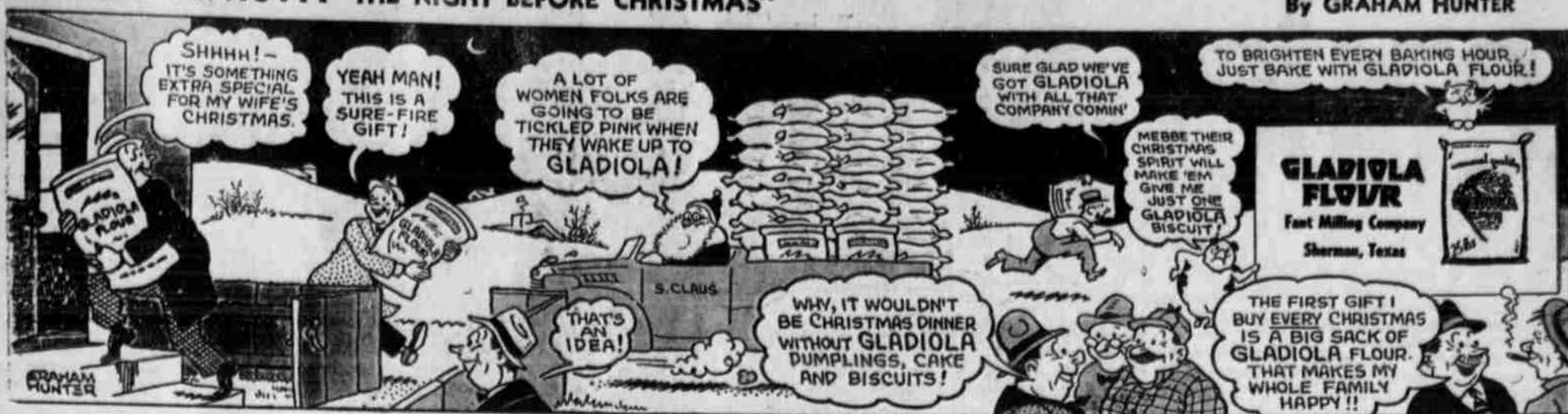

### Atomic Energy Information Said To Be Available

The latest atomic energy information now has been made available to the public in printed form, the United States Government Printing Office has announced. A 195-page book entitled "International Control of Atomic Energy: Scientific Information" came off the great presses of the printing office December 13. The publication is available for 30 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.

Authors of the book are well known scientific authorities, all of whom were associated with work on the atomic bomb during the war. The

book is a collection of the material which was made available to the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission by the U. S. Representative, Bernard M. Baruch.

Covered in the book are such subjects as introduction to atomic energy, military effectiveness of the atomic bomb, therapeutic uses of artificial radio activity, beneficial uses of atomic energy, applications in medicine, and technological control of atomic energy.

The printing office reported that several thousand advance orders were already on hand, and that hundreds of additional requests were being received in each mail.

He won many placings on his meat animal exhibits, including \$819.63 in cash prizes, which brought his estimated income from all 4-H projects to \$17,539.06. At the 1946 Houston Fat Stock Show, he showed the grand champion litter, grand champion pen of three barrows, champion Duroc pen of three barrows and received other major awards. He sold 19 of the 24 pigs exhibited for \$2,136.00.

Floyd Terrell, 17, of Plainview, wins state honors in the 1946 National 4-H Home Grounds Activity. His reward is a 17-jewel gold watch provided by Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Chicago. Among his home-landscaping achievements during nine years of club work are removing old unnecessary fences and repairing others, helping remove dead trees, leveling off two big holes in the yard, filling in an old cellar and planting grass over the area. Floyd also helped in planning and building the family's new 12-room modern home.

Lone Star State's winners in the 1946 Dairy Foods Demonstrations are (individual) Dolores Williamson, 16, of Eastland, and (team) Joyce Horn, of Winters, and Melba Pearce, of Bradshaw, both 15. Each receives a \$50.00 U. S. Savings Bond provided by the Kraft Foods Co. Dolores demonstrated "Snack Bar", and the team's demonstration was titled "Custard Float". Dolores' demonstration was given before an audience of 150 people, and that of the team five times before 325 people. The purpose of the demonstrations was to gain experience in public speaking, and develop teamwork and sportsmanship.

All of these activities were conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA co-operating.

### Broomcorn Reported As Good Cash Crop

Broomcorn in the Panhandle is a real cash crop, as was demonstrated by Dallam County farmers this year. Six farmers in the Stateline community in Dallam County planted 956 acres in broomcorn this year, reports Dallam County Agricultural Agent Marvin J. Simms. The crop paid off a net profit of from \$100 to \$200 per acre.

Frank Davenport, Dallam County farmer, harvested over 47 tons of broomcorn off 210 acres. Showing just how good a cash crop the broom-

corn is, County Agent Simms that Davenport sold the crop a ton which after deducting tation and processing costs amounted to \$100, gave him a net of mately \$200 on each ton.

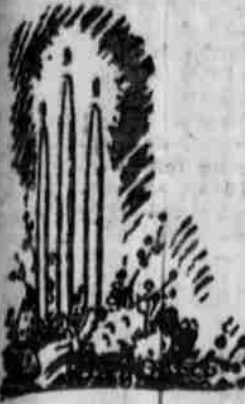
Plans also include taking out of the culvert and paving the space from the wholesale building to the highway.

activities than others, but all are charged with the duty of assisting veterans and their dependents.

Q. Are persons who assist in the presentation of pension or compensation claims to Veterans Administration permitted to charge for their services?

A. It is unlawful for any person, whether he be an attorney or agent admitted to practice before the Veterans Administration or not to charge or collect any fee for services in respect to a claim. However, the law provides that the Administrator of Veterans Affairs may by regulation authorize payment of fees in an allowed case to an admitted attorney or agent who has filed a valid power of attorney in that case. Such fees are deducted from the monetary benefits allowed.

Q. What identification data should I give in writing about my claim for benefits administered by the Veterans Administration?

A. If you are making application you should give your full name, grade, organization, date of entrance into service, date of discharge, and date and place of birth. After the claim is filed it will be assigned a claim number which should be mentioned in all subsequent communications.

Q. Does the name "United States Government Life (converted) Insurance" include "National Service Life Insurance"?

A. No. "United States Government Life Insurance" is insurance issued to World War I veterans or to persons who applied for same while in active service before October 8, 1940. "National Service Life Insurance" is insurance provided for World War II veterans. Each is sometimes referred to as "Government Insurance" and each is administered by Veterans Administration under authority granted by Acts of Congress.

Transfer of the U. S. Naval Hospital at New Orleans to the Veterans Administration for temporary use has been approved by President Truman and the Federal Board of Hospitalization.

The Naval hospital, which has a 600-bed capacity, will be opened to veterans as quickly as a suitable staff can be assembled, Dr. Lee D. Cady, VA's medical director for Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, said.

In addition to the temporary facilities at New Orleans, VA's medical service now has 7,260 beds available for veterans in hospitals in the tri-state area administered by the VA Dallas branch office.

Sharp declines in prices received by farmers for cotton, corn and poultry products lowered the general price level of farm products 3.7 per cent from mid-October to mid-November.

### Will Contribute To Christmas For Forces Overseas

Contributions to the Texas USO campaign will give our occupational armies over the world a Christmas present which they can enjoy all through next year, officials of the state USO drive pointed out at a meeting in Dallas Saturday.

American men who will spend Christmas in foreign lands total 573,500, and approximately 200,000 veterans and servicemen will be patients in hospitals this holiday season, Col. Carl L. Phinney, state campaign chairman, said.

In Germany there are 350,000 Americans in occupational armies; in France, 10,000; China, 31,000; Japan and the Pacific, 150,000; Italy, 5,000; Trieste, 12,000; Africa and the Middle East, 7,000. A real "White Christmas" will be the lot of 400 men in Iceland.

Texas USO leaders gathered in Dallas to confer with Robert H. Stroud of New York City, associate campaign director, about the progress of the state drive which has now passed the half-way mark with 56 per cent of its quota raised.

Thirty-eight counties conducting separate USO drives have "gone over the top," with 60 counties reporting completion of their campaigns. Ten Community Chest cities which included USO have filed successful returns, Colonel Phinney reported to the national director.

Since the appeal in many counties will not be made until the latter part of December or the first months of next year, the chairman pointed out the excellent opportunity Texans have to remember their 120,000 men overseas, in hospitals, or in service this Christmas.

"General Eisenhower has termed the continuation of USO a necessity, not a luxury. Contributing now to the USO campaign will give our men in service a Christmas present they can enjoy through 1947," he said.

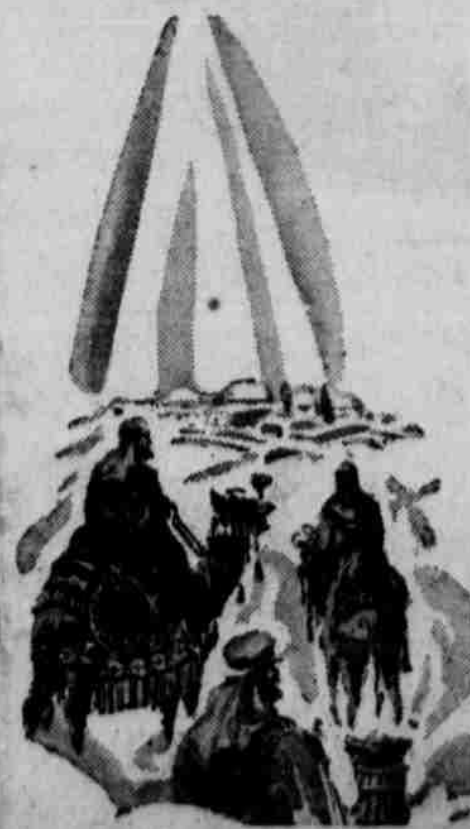
