# HUGE PROGRAM IS PLANNED FOR BIG BOND RALLY TONIGHT

## Much Activity Continues In Oil Development In Lamb County

### Hunt Oil Company, Dallas, Make Two Wildcat Locations

Also A Third Test Is Said To Be Staked On Swede Kling Farm

More progress is reported in oil development in Lamb County. Hunt Oil Company, Dallas, have made locations for two explorations in Southwest Lamb County, one a straight wildcat, and the other to be approximately three-quarters of a mile northwest of the Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Jackson, lower permian discovery, now on the pump and making between five and eight hundred barrels, according to reports.

Hunt No. 1 E. J. Foust, the wildcat project, will be four miles due north of the Humble discovery, Lamb county's first producer. The location is 660 feet from the east and south lines of the northeast quarter of section 43, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey. It is scheduled to drill to 8,500 feet, unless it gets pay in the lower Permian above that level, or goes into the granite.

Hunt No. 1 A. A. Snitker, the northwest extension for the southeast Lamb county discovery, will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 31, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey. It will drill to at least 6,000 feet, and possibly deeper.

This location is one-half mile west and one-quarter of a mile north of the Humble indicator for a pool opener.

Another location had also been staked two miles east of Littlefield on Oklahoma Avenue on the Swede Kling farm, which is a mile and a half from the E. C. Ross farm.

Much activity is reported in leasing and buying of royalties. Among others doing business in this area

The Wildcats crushed the Mustangs of Denver City on their own field last Thursday by a score of 39 to 20 to bring the bi-district championship to Littlefield. Before a crowd of 2,500 rabid fans the Wildcats turned on the power to crush the hopes of the Mustangs in the first half 26 to 0.

The Wildcats received the kick-off and marched methodically down the field on successive runs by Arend, Sewell and Lyman, with Lyman crashing over to score the first

Some outstanding play in the game was Wildcats fighting line, composed of Owens, Brandon, Pratt, Buell, Ware, Hendrickson, and Peel. They wore the vaunted Denver City "Mules" to a frazzle. ## Forty-five Men All Soldier Show To Be Feature Of Rally

### Returned Heroes To Make Talks; Bonds To Be Given Away Free

In connection with the smashing Sixth War Loan Drive, a huge bond rally will be staged tonight (Thursday) in Littlefield, at the Palace theatre, opening at 8 p. m. It will be headed by a group of returned war heroes from every battle front.

A 45-man all soldier show from Lubbock Army Airfield will be here to show the people of this area examples of military entertainment, GI humor and precision military drills.

Several units of the show have been selected from the best acts of "Varieties of LAAF" which recently played before soldier audiences at Lubbock Army Airfield and South Plains Army Airfield. The other acts are taken from the LAAF Band and the crack LAAF drill team, both of whom have also made numerous appearances this fall. All will be under the direction of CWO Ashley B. Miller. There will be no admission charge and the show, which will be held in Littlefield, is sponsored by the United States Treasury War Finance Committee of Texas.

Several bonds will be given away. The speaker for the evening will be M-Sgt. Howard J. Baker, who recently returned from the Mediterranean Theatre where he was an aerial gunner. M-Sgt. Baker wears a number of decorations won during the African Campaign, General Doolittle's attack on the marshalling yards of Rome, and as one of the survivors of the famous raid on the Ploesti Oil Fields. Master of Ceremonies will be M. M. Murphree of Dallas, who will represent the state headquarters of the War Finance Committee.

Other servicemen who have just returned from the European and Pacific theatres of war and who will speak at the rally are Sergeant Clyde Mayo, Private Richard J. McCarthy and Sergeant Guy B. Cohea. Sgt. Mayo from Nevada, Texas, is one of the oldest paratroopers in the U. S. Army. The 47 year old sergeant landed on the Cherbourg Peninsula on D-Day within 500 yards of a German Infantry regiment but was not seen. Mayo was injured in this landing but established contact with the French underground who helped him return to his own lines. Pvt. McCarthy of Albion, New York, is a veteran of the campaign to recapture Guam. He was with the first unit to hit the island and went through the full 17 days of fighting before he was injured. Sgt. Cohea of El Paso, Texas, served with the First Cavalry Division in New Guinea and the Admiralty campaigns. He wears two bronze stars for action in these campaigns and was wounded in action in the Admiralty Islands.

Included in the program will be martial music, glee club and dance music, impersonations, a skating and comedy act, drilling by pre-flight trainees, and a tumbling act featuring Pvt. E. G. Oehldrich, a former headliner with Ringling Bros. Circus, and specialties by member of the 714th Army Air Forces Band.

A large crowd is expected, since this is the first time that a group of this kind has been able to tour the South Plains area.

The caravan will leave Levelland about 5:30 and arrive here in time

## FOUR BROTHERS CHOSE THE MARINE CORP

Pictured above are the four sons of Mr. and Mrs. Dee Chapman of Littlefield who recently received a

message from the War Department that their third son, Cpl. John Henry Chapman of the U. S. Marines was killed on Vella Lavella Island on October 7.

All of the boys preferred the U. S. Marines.

Gy-Sgt. Loyd W. Chapman, the oldest of the group, has been in service seven years. He enlisted at Dallas on July 28, 1937; went to San Diego, and directly overseas landing in China on September 19 of that year. He remained in China until March, 1940, when he returned to the States. In November, 1942, he was transferred to Alaska. Returning to the States again in July of this year, he spent a 30-day furlough at home in September last. He is now stationed at Oceanside, Calif., taking special training.

Pvt. George W. Chapman enlisted on May 28, 1941, and went overseas in March of this year. He is now stationed in Hawaiian Islands.

Cpl. John Henry Chapman enlisted in the Marines on June 28, 1942, and took his first training at San Diego, and from there was sent to the Naval Training Station at Chicago for mechanical training. He went overseas in May of 1943, and was a mechanic at the air base for several months before going to Navigator's School, following which he served as a navigator on a transport plane evacuating the wounded from the battlefield, until he met his death in a crash on Vella Lavella Island while flying in extremely mad weather. All his shipmates died with him. His grave is on New Georgia Island.

Cpl. Chapman had only been home on one furlough since enlisting, which was in January of 1943.

Pvt. Jimmie Chapman enlisted in the Marine Reserve on January 25, 1944, and was inducted and left March 6. He was home on a furlough in July, and went overseas in September. He is stationed in the Solomon Islands.

## TEXANS PASS THROUGH NORTH, INDIANS HAVE NEW HIGH-SIGN

Pvt. Walter Sharp, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Sharp of the College Heights Addition, arrived in Littlefield last week, after receiving assignment at the Ashburn General Hospital, McKinney, Texas. Pvt. Sharp arrived in the states the first of October, after serving in Alaska and the campaign for the Aleutian Islands almost three years. He stated that new comers to

West Texas thought ordinary sandstorms are bad, but "we've clocked with scientific apparatus on the Aleutians several gales that were 120 miles per hour and more."

Pvt. Sharp brought the following clipping from a newspaper in Anchorage, Alaska:

**TOZI CACHE, Alaska.**—Those Texans go everywhere and every place they go they leave their mark. Although the Tanana and Yukon rivers are far removed from the Rio Grande, there is evidence that GIs from the Lone Star State have passed this way and paused a while to strum their guitars and sing the songs of Texas.

Nenana, Minto, Tanana, Tozi, Galena—any of the villages along the river possesses its quota of native girls and you would naturally expect them to exhibit some of the shyness that is traditional with demure Indian maidens. But, no! They greet GIs with a grin like a Texas 'possum.

"Hello!" you say, presuming that they will respond with the Indian salutation: "How."

Not so; the universal response to a soldier greeting is "Wu Hoo-ooo—San Antone!"

Your steamer passes a small native village and the entire population turns out and waves to the passengers. It is apparent, from the greeting they shout, that even small towns have not been overlooked by the Texans.

You pass on and presently come to a bend in the river miles from any village. A squaw is tending her fish wheel, but upon sighting the steamer she springs to her feet, waving her arms frantically.

"Wu Hoo-ooo!" she howls, brandishing aloft a fish. "Wu Hoo-ooo—San Antone!"

### New Postal Note To Be On Sale

The new postal note, a simplified money order, is expected to be ready for sale in the nation's 1,575 first-class post offices on Jan. 1. Postmaster General Walker has announced.

The note, to be used for amounts up to \$10, will be sold for a uniform fee of five cents. Here's the way Walker said it would work:

You walk up to a money order window and announce you want to send a postal note for \$2.93. The clerk affixes a 90-cent stamp and a 3-cent stamp to a \$2 postal note. You give the clerk \$2.98, which includes the five-cent fee, write the payee's name on the note, detach a stub for your record, and mail the note. The transaction requires no writing to be done by the clerk.

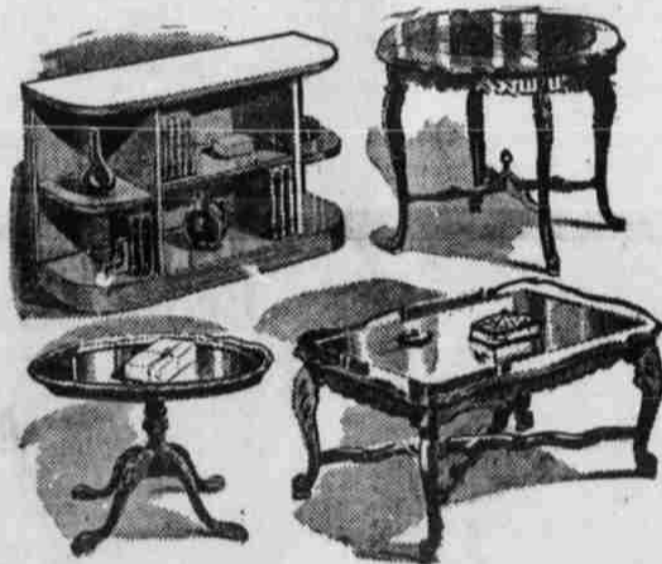

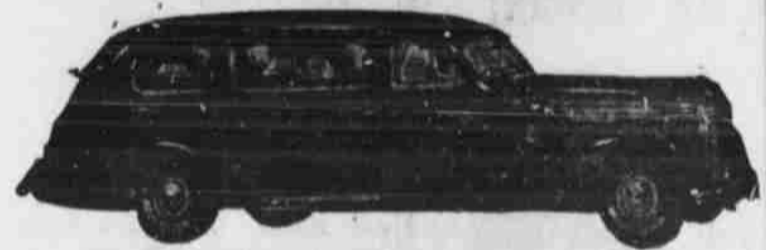
Mrs. Coen's nephew of Lubbock is in the same group with her brother.

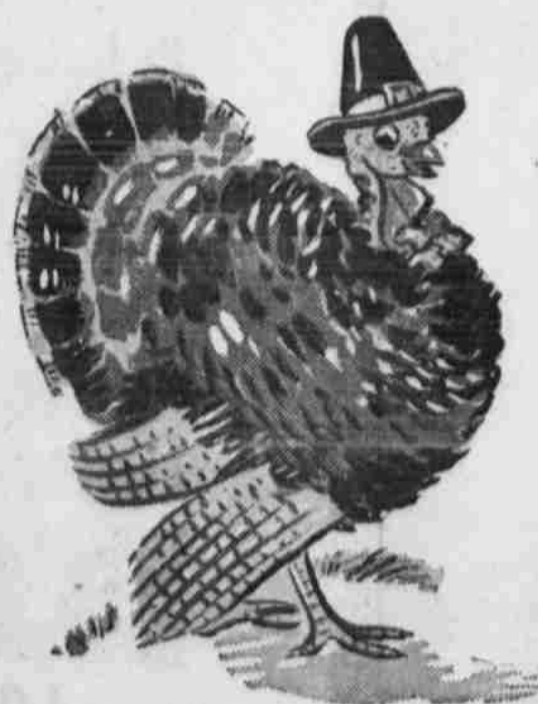

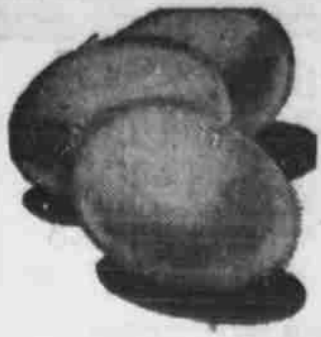

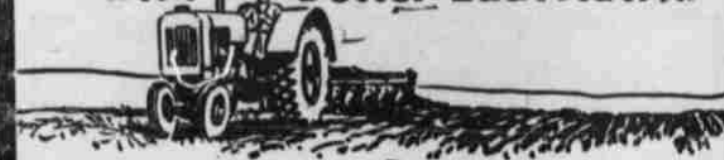
