The newly chosen queen was selected from a field of approximately a dozen entries when election competitions were staged at the rodeo grounds Tuesday night under the auspices of the Littlefield Rodeo club.

Miss Gibson is at home in the Bula community, and won the coveted crown, strictly on horsemanship, which was the sole yardstick for judging. She appeared mounted on a striking sorrel horse, smartly attired in full rodeo costume, and with saddle and bridle polished to mirror-like perfection.

As winner she received the crown, and a \$50 cash award. Three other young ladies received runner-up recognition. Second place went to Vinita Roberts of Littlefield, third to Melba Edwards, Littlefield; and fourth place to Ruby Pierson of Bula.

Rev. Vanderpool about 35 years of age, was transferred to Northwest Texas Conference, from North Texas Conference. He is married and the couple have two small

sons. They are expected to move here the latter part of the week, and he will fill the pulpit at the regular morning worship hour Sunday morning, at 11 o'clock.

The newly appointed minister is filling the vacancy made by the appointing Rev. Frank Beauchamp to the First Methodist Church at Shamrock. Rev. Beauchamp has been pastor of the local church here for the past three years. His family consists of his wife and two daughters.

Littlefield First Methodist Church is now in a new district, with headquarters in Brownfield, which includes the following churches: Amberst, Anton, Brownfield, Brownfield Circuit, Bula, Denver City, Draw, Enochs-Monument, Lake, Grassland, Levelland, Littlefield, Maple-Bledsoe, Meadow, Morton, New Home-Lakeview, O'Donnell, Plains, Ropesville, Seagraves, Seminole, Spade, Sundown, Taboka, Welch-Hancock, Whitharal-Pettit, Whiteface, and Wilson.

## Water Rights Are Discussed At Local Chamber Meeting

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of Littlefield Chamber of Commerce held Tuesday morning at 7:30 in Dyer's Cafeteria, Al Hall, manager and Loyd Roberts, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, and Harold King, a member of the board of directors of the Muleshoe chamber and a former mayor, were visitors at the meeting.

Problems created when the City of Lubbock purchased an option on the water rights on 50,000 acres in the irrigation belt southwest of the City of Muleshoe, were discussed by the Muleshoe representation, with the local board.

It was brought out that this underground water is associated with the sands of the entire South Plains area extending into New Mexico.

Hall reported that a meeting is scheduled to be held in Lubbock, June 11, for the purpose of discussing the problems with Lubbock city officials, when representatives from a score of towns in this area along with city officials and city representatives from Lubbock will discuss fully the water situation.

Nelson Naylor, local Chamber of Commerce president, appointed Arthur Duggan, Art Chesher, Roy B. McQuatters and himself as a committee to attend the water meeting.

## Highway Department Will Make Decision On New Route HGY. 84

Highway Department a few weeks ago, is receiving serious attention and careful study by city officials, a special highway committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and the Board of Directors of that organization.

No positive decisions nor recommendations have as yet been made, nor has the highway department made any commitment, beyond the fact that, at some future date, they probably in the near future, they are going to order and provide a 54-foot Highway 84, to replace the present route through Littlefield, which for a space of several blocks on Delano avenue, from the McCormick service station corner east of Phelps Avenue, and extending to the Littlefield Courts located at

Delano and North Westside avenue, are now only 50 feet in width, 34 feet less than the highway department requirement.

The cost of obtaining the frontage necessary to widen this street to the required width, has been found to be prohibitive. To acquire it by purchase or condemnation, is actually not being seriously considered, because not only of its cost, but due to the fact that it would actually wipe out and do-away with many established business concerns which have been established fronting on the southside of the highway, with Santa Fe properties, and several elevators and business houses fronting the north (Continued on Back Page)

# Greek Boy "Adopted" By Mr. And Mrs. Shotwell Through Plan CARE

Dr. and Mrs. I. T. Shotwell Jr. are foster parents of thirteen year old Vassilios Arvanitis of Dandroschori, Kastoria, in Greece, who's home now is in Saonica, Greece, and he will now be under Foster Parents' Plan for War Children, Inc.

A history of the child sent to Dr. and Mrs. Shotwell was as follows: "Vassilios was born in the little town of Dandroschori, Kastoria, in Greece. He has an older brother, Evangelos. His father was a laborer, and although he earned very little money, he supported his little family fairly well. But when Vassilios was only five years old, the

Bulgarians raided the village, and executed his father, and the widow was left alone to support her two children by herself.

"The mother and Vassilios now live in Saonica, where they moved in 1945. The older brother has accepted the help of a relative in Canada, and is now living there. The widow and child live in one miserable little room, with a leaking roof, and a rough board floor. They get no pension from the father's death, and the mother's earnings is only \$13.33 a month, when she can get the work. This is a pitiful sum for the support of two people. Food and clothes are a prob-

lem which they cannot solve. This family is in dire need of help.

"Vassilios is a very nice looking boy, very fond of school, and is a very good student. He is very ambitious, and hopes some day to become a doctor. A Foster Parent adoption of this boy would be a great help to this family."

Foster Parents' Plan for War Children does not do mass relief; each child is treated as an individual. "Adoption" is financial, not legal. The foster parent merely promises to contribute \$15 monthly towards the child's support, for at least a year. In return the foster parent receives a photograph and

brief history of the child and correspondence through the Plan office is encouraged since the children need the feeling of being loved and belonging to someone, some place. Though the war in Europe has been over for six years it has never ceased for these children.

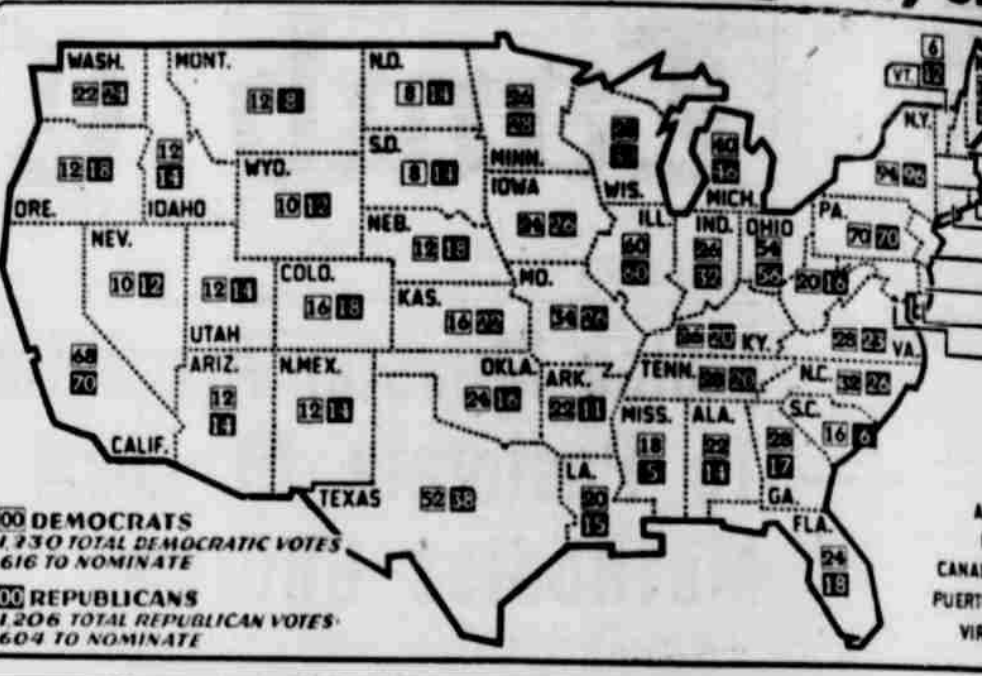

# Fun's Fun But Can You Deduce It

A Liberal Party leader in England—a woman, naturally—suggests the stiff British income tax laws be relaxed sufficiently to permit a man to take his wife out on an occasional, deductible spree.

Nancy Seear, who seems to be either a spinster or a Lucy Stoner, thinks that such an innocent night on the town—dinner, movies and a sitter taking care of the kids—should be itemized on the tax form as "maintenance of family good-will."

I don't know much about British income taxes except that they are high, but it seems like a pleasant, common-sense suggestion, and one which might be given a little thought on this side of the Atlantic by the minds who think up tax schemes to separate us from our money.

Here in the United States, taxpayers are permitted to throw deductible parties and to entertain expensively in the interest of developing new business and in maintaining customers.

I make my living in a community called New York City where the deductible party has been developed to a high point. It's been years, almost, since I attended anything more extensive than an informal dinner at the home of a friend which was not carefully plotted and arranged so as to be ultimately all but written off as a business expense.

Deductible entertaining obviously sets up some interesting psychological barriers. A guy who is a charming host and adroit check-grabber when he knows most of his good-fellowship can be charged off to a bid for a new business account, is apt to think over carefully the proposition of taking his wife on a less extravagant gala when its price comes from monies earned after taxes. As a matter of fact, I've observed rather closely that those blessed entertainment

accounts exercised violently during three-hour customer luncheons and cocktail hours, are the most fervent advocates of the quiet-home-life, the pipe-and-slippers routine.

But husbands without the magic wand of deductible camaraderie are apt to prefer the hearth to the ring-side table. Currently, they can answer their wives' pleas for a change of pace with a stark: "We can't afford it."

Miss Seear explained that "even the most devoted wife and mother will eventually feel she has seen too much of the inside of her own house." With the added inducement of being able to clip most of the party tab from next year's tax returns, maybe most husbands wouldn't be so difficult to blast out of their easy chairs.

Of course, I can't imagine the federal tax people going for anything like this—not when a working woman still can't deduct the price of a caretaker for her children; when until recently baby oil was taxed as a cosmetic; when cigarette-smokers and whiskey-drinkers pay more taxes on their purchases than cigar-and-pipe smokers and wine-and-beer drinkers. A proposal of a deduction called "maintenance of family good-will" undoubtedly wouldn't get any farther than the receptionist's waste paper basket.

Anyway, it would probably cause the unmarried tax-payers to scream about the unfairness of it all. Maiden ladies would probably apply for a morale deduction which would include a visit to the beauty salon and maybe the price of a man-catching wardrobe. Bachelors could make a pretty logical pitch in favor of deducting expenses incurred during the courting period, which as everyone knows is a period of free spending and the exercise of salesmanship.

On second thought, maybe the whole tax structure would be in danger of collapse if we open the door on good-will, even family.

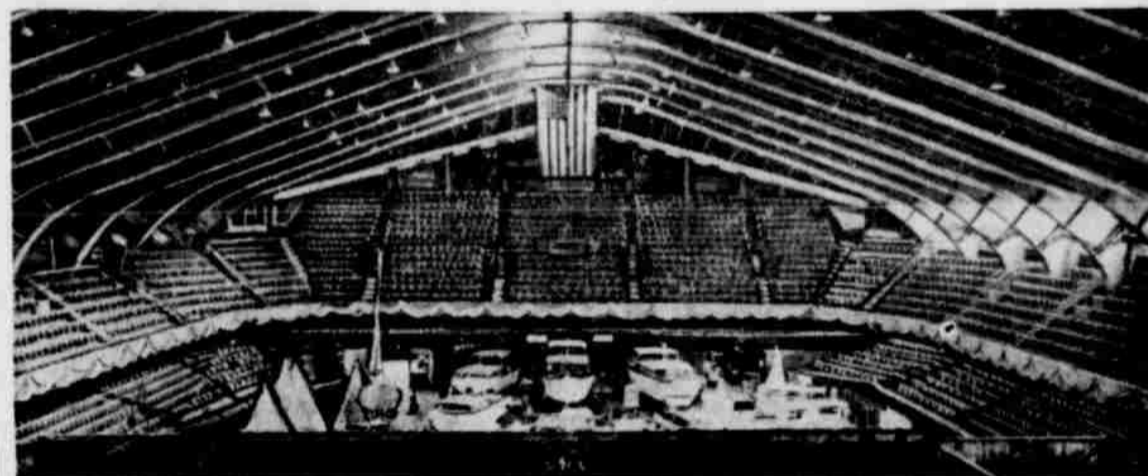

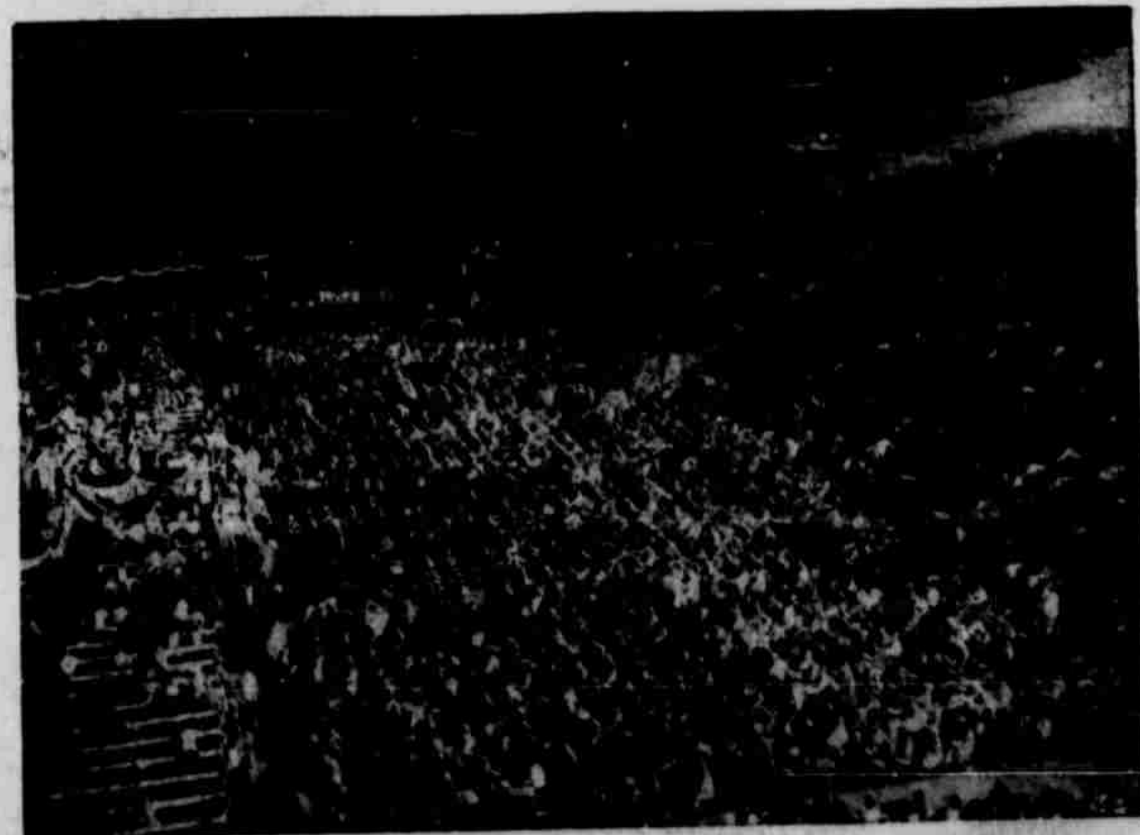

It has been known, talked of in Littlefield for several years, that sooner or later some change would have to be made to provide a wider Highway 84 through Littlefield.

After the communication was received from the highway department, city officials advised the Chamber of Commerce, and asked that the matter be given study. The chamber turned the matter over to their highway committee, headed by Chas. Duvall, which proceeded to contact all property owners, and get and tabulate their views and opinions. This tabulation and report has now been made and completed.

In an interview with Mr. Duvall this week, he told the Leader that this committee found in making the survey that property owners affected were almost unanimously opposed. Many stated that they would not sell right-of-way, with almost an equal number saying that they could not, unless they could sell all of their property fronting the highway—that the cost would run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, and be prohibitive.

Ralph Douglas, city engineer, when contacted this week stated that the City of Littlefield was in the process of submitting an alternate plan (of re-routing) to the State Highway Department, for that body to start work upon, not specific, in order to secure from the Highway department a concise proposal of highway department desires. He emphasized that the city and city officials are urging or sponsoring no definite new route or routing. Several possible routes may be submitted by the city.

It is planned to construct a four-lane Highway 84 through (or bypassing) Littlefield, by the highway department. Included in the still indefinite plans, it is reported, is a 4-lane highway over the Santa Fe tracks and the present 84, for the present Spade Highway, near Peyton Packing Company, with a highway "circle" connecting Highways 84, 54 and 51, at some still unnamed or not designated point.
