# Hourly Wage On Braceros **Established**

Hourly wages for Mexican Bracero labor was established last week by the Department of Labor. The wages range from 60 cents to \$1 per hour over a 22-state area with the minimum set at 70 cents for Tex-

The ruling by the Labor Department was not unexpected in Lamb County, however, it will certainly prove unpopular to hundreds of Lamb farmers who use bracero labor for long per-

Based on an average contract of six weeks, with the bracero working an eight-hour day, five days a week, the 20 cent hike (up from the longstanding 50 cents an hour) will cost Lamb farmers an estimated addi-

tional \$300,000 to \$400,000. Secretary of Labor Arthur Goldberg set the rates after In Court studying reports of farm labor

Goldberg said in an order accompanying the rates that he would not certify braceros to farmers unless they agreed to pay the minimums. Then, such certification will be made only if domestic farm workers are

At the time of his death, Storey was state president of the National Association of Retired Civil Employees. He was a veteran of over 27 years in government service, including nearly 20 years as

postmaster in Littlefield, until he retired in February 1954. Storey was a big, colorful man with a broad smile and an even broader brimmed Texasstyle hat which was one of his trademarks. He was considered by many to be sort of a goodwill ambassador for Littlefield

and West Texas. He was a long-time member of the Littlefield Rotary Club and the Masonic Lodge. He was also active in the National Association of Postmasters until

he retired. A native of Red River County, Storey's record of public service goes back 36 years. He taught in the Littlefield High School and was superintendent of schools after moving to Littlefield in 1921 from Shallo-



The Texas State Committee on Public Education has drafted and announced a set of "Criteria of a Good School Board Member," The 50-mem

which drew up the Criteria is composed of business and professional men, housewives, college and public school administrators, former teachers and hoard members, newspaper publishers and college professors. The Criteria follow:

A good school board mem-

is one who has a strong belief in public education -- its Importance to the individual, to the community, to the state and to the nation.

Should be sincerely interested in children never forgetting that they are the reason for public schools and for histrusteeship.

Should understand the difference between policy and administrative or classroom procedure and should understand but not usurp the teacher's or the superintendent's professional responsibilities.

Should never forget that the public schools belong to the public and should represent all the people of a community, not a particular area, nor vested interest nor special small friend-

ship group. Should be informed of and sincerely interested in the instructional program and other facets of the school system and willing to accept new developments in each area.

Should be able to judge the strengths and weaknesses of the school and should endorse improvements or changed only after open - minded consideration of all the facts.

Should be able to work with fellow board members, should support board decision, regardless of personal views, and have moral integrity and courage to accept criticism.

Should be able to think independently, objectively, and soundly and should always renember that he is a school official only in official board meetings, and at no other time in a position to make a relat-

ed commitment. Should be willing and able to

give the necessary time to board service to insure he is an informed and effective board member.

Should do his work without desire for personal consideration

Should be willing to study current literature on school boards and to participate in study




