New Immense Electric Light Plant Is Planned

Water Holds Key To Development

The Southwestern Public Service Co. is expected to begin construction soon on a new \$6,000,000 electric generating plant in Lamb county. The plant will be a portion of the famous Halsell Ranch, four miles south of Earth and nine and one-half miles north of Amherst. The latter is the nearest rail point for the projected new plant.

Announcement of a conditional purchase agreement to acquire the power plant site was made by J. E. Cunningham, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, and Ewing Halsell, representing the Halsell Ranch.

Sale Awaits Water Tests
The conditional purchase agreement grants the Southwestern Public Service Company until November 26 to conduct water well tests to determine if there is a sufficient water supply for operation of the new generating station. Nine test wells will be dug for this purpose. At this time, five of the wells have been drilled. Terms of the purchase agreement call for the Southwestern Public Service Company to own 354 acres in fee, and to have water rights on approximately 9700 additional acres.

Three main factors were considered in acquisition of the Halsell Ranch location for the new power station which, when completed, will be the 11th base load power plant operated by the company.

Three Factors Cited
These factors, according to H. O. Hodson, chief engineer for the electric light and power company, were:

Truman Death Plot Fails

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—One Puerto Rican revolutionary was shot dead by President Truman's Secret Service guards and a second seriously wounded in an assassination attempt on the President.

Three of the guards were wounded, two critically. The attempt was made at Blair House, the President's temporary home. He was taking a nap at the time and was not injured.

The two gunmen, identified as Griselio Torresola and Oscar Collazzo, both of New York,

were described as members of the Puerto Rican Nationalist party, now in revolt against the government.

The two charged the executive mansion with blazing pistols about 2:15 p. m. Wednesday. Torresola was shot and killed and his companion dangerously wounded.

Thirty minutes after the shooting the President, heavily guarded, slipped away from Blair House to attend a memorial service at Arlington National Cemetery.

One of the wounded Secret Service guards, Leslie Coffelt, 40, died late Wednesday night.

Sale of the memorial poppies under auspices of the American Legion Auxiliary will be directed by Mrs. Hugo Beyer, poppy chairman.

Poppies for the auxiliary have been ordered from the veterans hospitals at Kerrville and Waco, where they are made by disabled veterans. Making of the poppies provides work for thousands of veterans unable to do other work.

The mayor's proclamation: "Whereas, the City of Littlefield, in 1917 and 1918, and again in 1941 to 1945, sent many of its finest young men and women to serve in the defense of our country; and

"Whereas, many of these made the supreme sacrifice in that service; and

"Whereas, the memory of their service and sacrifice should be forever kept bright for the inspiration of our own and future generations; and

"Whereas, the wearing of memorial poppies on the Saturday before Nov. 11 brings to our minds and hearts the memory of these gallant dead;

trap. Mr. Eaton said. J. W. McQueen, administrative officer of the Production, Marketing Administration, with offices in the Amherst city hall, said the PMA still is loaning 85 per cent of the cost of constructing permanent farm storage structures. Must Be Permanent To be approved for loans, these farm storage facilities must be of wood, metal or brick and of durable construction, he said. The milo harvest in the county now is well under way in 100,000 of the quarter million acres devoted to this crop in 1959 in Lamb county, Mr. Eaton said. The other 150,000 acres probably will not be harvested until after the first frost. Mr. McQueen said that thus far none of the farmers had taken advantage of the PMA field storage guarantees and probably wouldn't until after the first of the year. The PMA guarantees a loan rate of \$1.80 for No. 1 and No. 2 milo stored in the field.

assumed to be the recharge area for all underground waters east and south and consequently should offer the best likelihood of a continued water supply.

2. The proposed site is within 1 mile of a natural gas pipeline of the El Paso Natural Gas Company. Natural gas will be the fuel used in the boilers of the new plant.

3. An analysis of the electric load of the company indicates that the proposed site is close to the load center of the company's 45,000 square mile system. This makes the site the most efficient and economical location from the point of view of cost of transmission of the power.

Water Powers Not Great
Hodson stressed the point that in spite of the importance the company places on water, a generating station doesn't use large amounts of water even when operating at its peak.

"A power plant uses and re-uses water, and the only loss we have in water is that from evaporation and other uses which we can't control. We need an adequate supply, but we use in the peak operation of a power plant less water, for example, than that supplied by a large irrigation well," Mr. Hodson added.

First unit at the new power plant—which has been temporarily des-

ignated "Plant X," will be a 900 kilowatt generating station built by the General Electric Company. Plant construction is to begin in early 1961. J. B. Bottoms, a resident engineer of the Southern Electric Service Company, will be in charge of the project.

Plans Already Drawn
Mr. Bottoms has just completed a 20,000 kilowatt addition to the company's Rowell, New Mexico plant. General contract for the new plant has not yet been drawn by engineers of the western Public Service Company under supervision of Mr. Bottoms. The generating capacity of the new plant is expected to be in operation last August, and with the first unit of "Plant X" will be nearly 4 times as it was in 1943. The plant serves 125,000 customers in the Panhandle-Plains-Pecos area of Texas, Oklahoma, Mexico and Kansas.

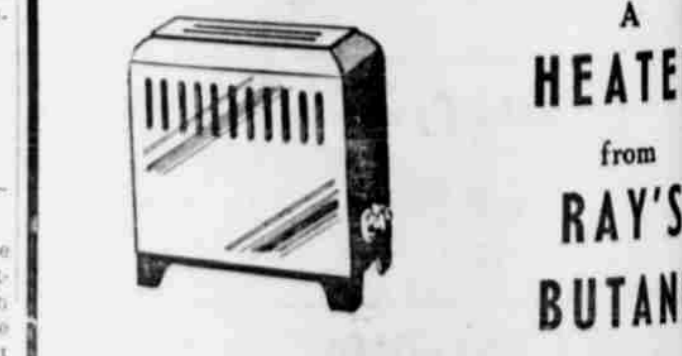

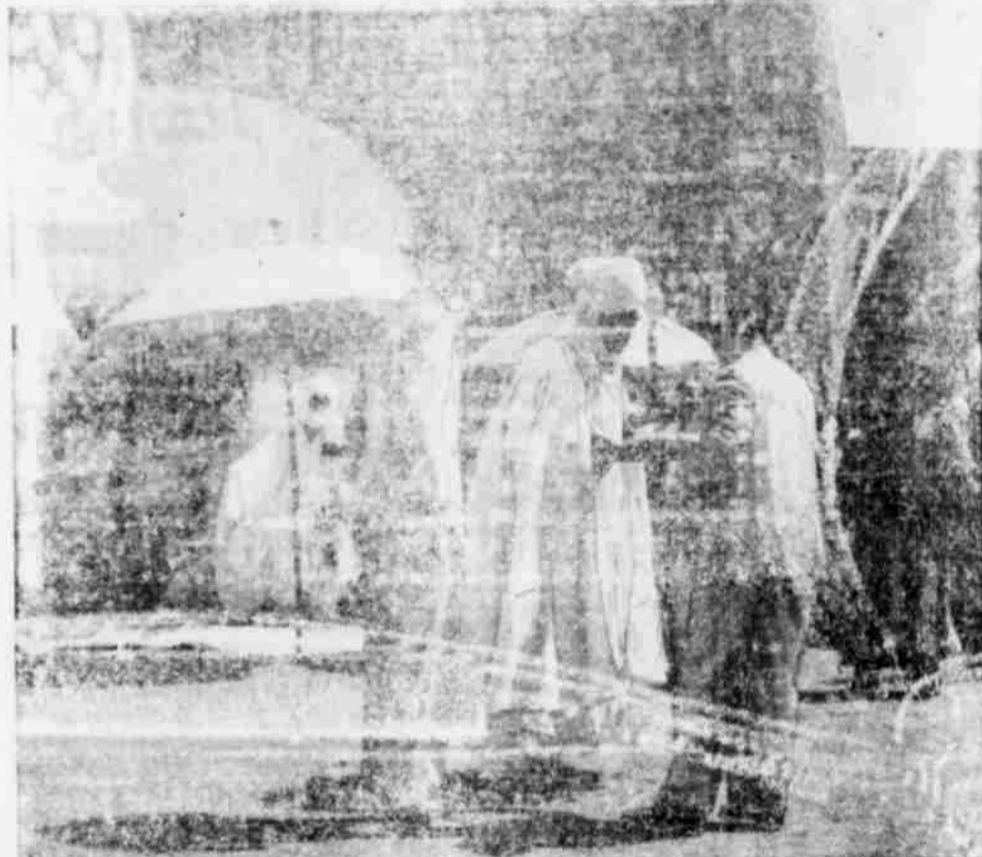
The post now is debt free and most members seem to prefer it remain that way.

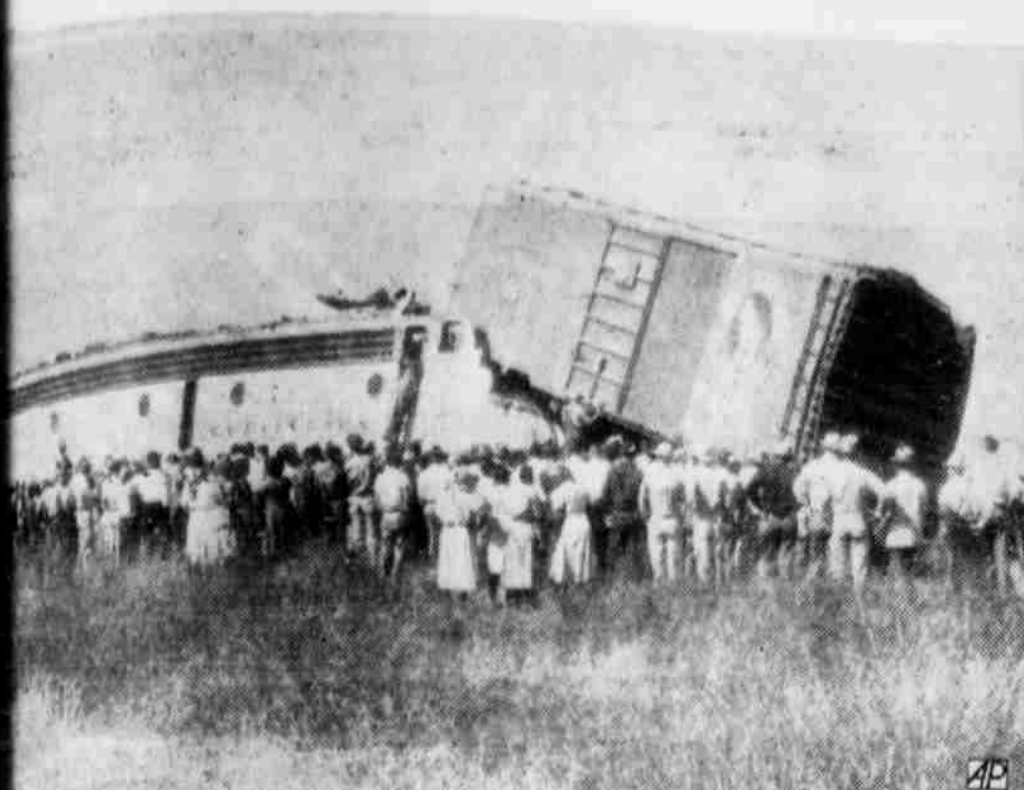

Jal, New Mexico Visited By Tragedy

Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Massengill of Littlefield were suddenly called to Jal, N. M. Thursday, in response to a message that her sister and brother-in-law and two of their three children of that city had lost their lives when an explosion threw flaming gasoline into their home late that day.

The dead were: W. L. Barclay, 31, auto mechanic; his wife, Katherine Barclay, 29, and children Larry Michael, 3 years old and Stephen Barclay, 16 months.

The explosion knocked Barclay 25 to 40 feet away, setting his clothes on fire. The blast also threw flaming gasoline into the bedroom.

Barclay Badly Burned
Badly burned on his arms and chest, Barclay got up from the ground, dazed and made his way to his car, where he got a rug to put out the fire in his clothing.

Then he tried to enter the house to rescue his family. The flames were intense.

Mrs. S. J. Ayer, who lives about a half block from the Barclay home, heard the explosion and saw a "ball of flame" over the duplex.

Mrs. Barclay was found on one of the two beds in the room. One boy was lying on the floor directly between the beds, while the other was on the floor near the end of the beds.

The bodies of Mrs. Barclay and Larry Michael were badly burned. Stephen's body showed signs that the single blast of burning gasoline had killed him.

A second drum of gasoline in the yard, of 55 gallons capacity, did not explode.

Neighbors immediately ran to the scene.

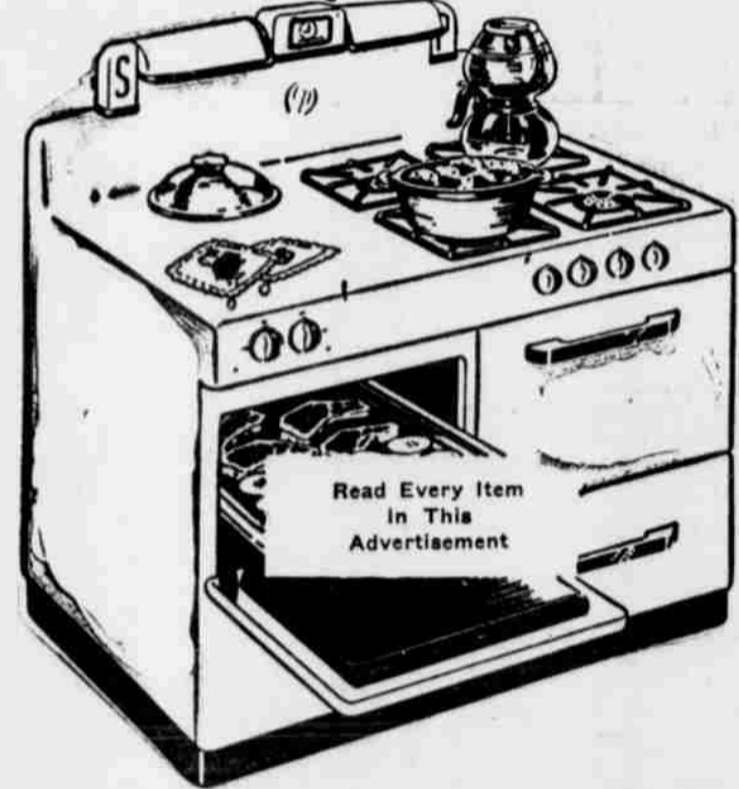

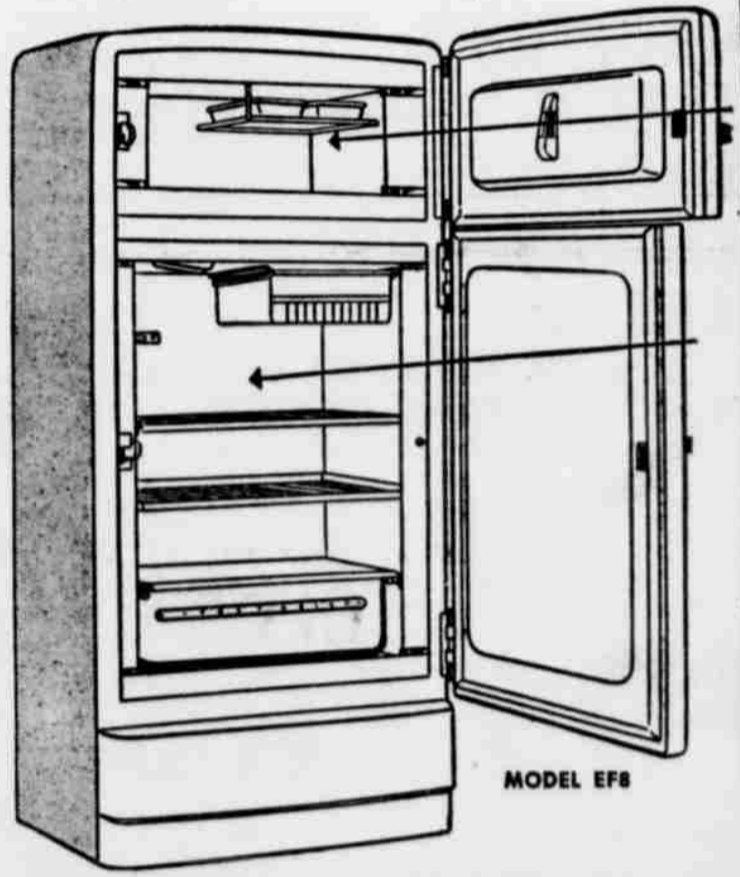
