#### **Draft Board Ready For Orders** No Change, Yet, In Organization

call for 20,000 recruits, the Lamb Cochran-Bailey Tri-County Draft Board has received no new instructions that would alter present draft and registration procedure, it was announced Tuesday by Floyd Coffman, Lamb County representative on the board.

Records of all new an old registrations have been kept up to tate, and Coffman said draft operations will begin when an order comes calling for it.

Organization Unchanged The Selective Service Board. which has its headquarters at Muleshoe, has been operating with a very limited program since the last call for draftees in the fall of 1948. One stenographer has been employed two days each week and board meetings are held once a

month.

A total of 2,500 men in the three counties were registered during the 1948 registration. Lamb County furnished 1,300 within the age limit, Bailey County registrants totaled 500 and Cochran County, 700. Three men in the 18-25 limit were drafted from each county during the 1948 call.





#### The Big Idea of Faith and Peace

JP IN PAWLING, N. Y., there is published a very small magazine with a very big idea. A lot of people believe in this big dea, but few do anything about it. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, ditor-in-chief of this little magazine, called Guideposts, is doing omething about it. omething about it every day of his life. The idea?

What Dr. Peale urges all of us to do cannot out further the idea, for all he asks us to do is within our power: to have faith. "Faith," we read rom The Book, "is the substance of things hoped or, the evidence of things not seen.

If you haven't looked up the defini-tion of "substance," here it is: substance means "the substantial part, the main part," of anything. So substance is the main part when we hope.

We live by faith. If we didn't have faith, we would accomplish nothing, have nothing, be less than nothing. So let's cooperate with this man who is spending his life in helping all of us. Let's follow some suggestions he sets forth, and in which he has great faith. Here are those suggestions. It will help you every day of your life to follow them to repeat to yourself every morning as you start the day:

1-I will seek a change within myself that I may have inner peace.

2-I will seek to effect, with God's help, a similar change

in my family, my social group, my community. 3—I will seek to make my faith infectious that I may attract other people to God by what I am.

4—At every opportunity, I will pray for peace, speak for peace, act for peace, and think for peace. I will try to win at least two others to a similar dedi-cation and charge them each to do likewise.

Dr. Peale says that if this process is repeated only 31 times, the entire population of the world can be reached. And it can start with you.
