"But during cotton season, his main interest will be advising farmers, through their county agents, on how to fight cotton pests," says District Agent W. H. Jones. "He will go where there is a bad outbreak, or where he is most needed."

"Chances are good that his services will be in demand.

"If it's an insect year, we'll be in worse condition than we were with a 40 per cent crop." This is the opinion of Don L. Jones of Lubbock Experiment Station.

"It's not how much an insecticide costs,"says Monroe Waits of Abernathy. "It's knowing how, where, and how much to use. We need to know when not to poison, too.'

"Well probably have almost 100 ages over 1950," sayn K. N. Clapp, "guesstimator." "We had about 1 3/4 million acres in 1950. It looks as if we'll have nearly 3 1/2 million this year. We estimated last year that we lost only 10 per cent of our crop to insects. Yet we actually had more insects than we had one year when we marked off 40 per cent to boll-worms. That shows how much a little know-how on insect control can help. And with twice as many acres, we're going to need all the help we can get."

"Clapp further points out that before 1949, "not 100 formers in the whole area knew the harmful and beneficial insects; and most of us wouldn't have known a fleahopper if it had lit on the end of our nose." Now, he estimates, Lowest In Five about 75 per cent can at least recognize the important harmful insects.

"It would mean that we could space new wells properly for the best use of the water, Then, too, we could experiment to find economical ways to put water back into the underground reservoir. So far, no individual or group has been able to finance such a study."

"The state law, passed two years ago, authorizing a local underground water district, provides: "Districts shall have t he power to regulate the spacing of wells and require a permit for drilling, but cannot prohibit a farmer from drilling a well.

"Districts shall have the power to lavy a tax, not to exceed 50 cents per \$100 valuation, for support of the district's project.

"Districts shall hove the power to conduct educational programs, prevent waste and pollution of

April Is Designated Cancer Month

April is designated as the month in which the American public is urged to become aware of cancer, its causes, and some of the ways of preventing it. Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, family life specialist with the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service lists some of the causes as outlined by scientific research: over-exposure to sunlight; action of certain chemicals: constant irritation of warts, moles, or s ore places; and prolonged exposure to beat.

She says people who work in the sun are particularly susceptible to skin cancer on hands, face, and neck. Statistics show that in Texas, which gets of every possible one hundred thousand develop skin cancers; in Michigan, which gets half as much sunlight, the rate is 24 per hundred thousand. Not every person who works in the sun gets

skin cancer. Mrs. Johnson says farm people who work in the sun can be aware of the possibility and follow up any indications of the development of cancer of the skin.

One ray of hope, the specialist adds, is that specialist adds, is that science refuses to give up in finding a cure for this disease. Mrs. Johnson points out, also, that 95 per cent of all cases of skin cancer are curable if taken early enough.

Periodical physical check-ups by the family doctor are recommended. Persistent hoarseness, unexplained coughing, changes in color or size of warts. moles or birthmarks, should be noted by a physician.

Farm Land Ownership Southwest COLLEGE STATION, April 24-Who owns the

farm lands in the Southwest?

This question was the basis of a recent study conducted by John H. Southern, agricultural economist with the U. S. D. A. Bureau of Agricultural Economics, stationed at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The study covered five states-Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Oklahoma

Southern found that most of the farm land is owned by individuals. They owned four farms out of five-83 per cent of all farm lands.

Corporations, primarily land and cattle companies, held nearly 11 per cent of the land in 1946. Almost 16 per cent of the farm land in Texas is held in corporate ownership.

Only 3.6 per cent of the farm land was publically owned, and this was confined almost entirely to Texas and Oklahoma

Of the individual land owners, the farm owners operators account for nearly 50 per cent of all the owners in the Southwest. However, they own only 23 per cent of the farm land, with an average of 192 acres each-valued at \$7.674.

Twenty-five per cent of the owners in Texas held less than two per cent of the land; on the other hand, 20 per cent of the owners held 80 per cent of the land.

This Study is reported in S. W. R. B. No. 3, which was published by the Arkansas Agricultural Experiment Station for the Southwestern Land Tenure Research Committee. Copies of this bulletin are available from the Publications Office, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas.



Contagious catarrhal conjunctivitis is the formal title of pinkeye, one of the most contagious of the virus diseases; it is an inflamation of the wet lining that forms the rims and underpart of the eyelid. It may come along or with other diseases: the flu is usually associated with red rimmed eyes. Gonorrhea also is frequently marked with an eyelid inflammation.

Since pinkeye can be mistaken for other much more serious diseases, it is always advisable to have it checked. Granulated eyeconsistent lids, known as trachoma, is one of the more serious of the eyelid afflictions caused by a virus, and it, too, is contagious. Trachoma can even lead to blindness.
