PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING FOR STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND RELATING TO TERMS OF SCHOOL OFFICERS.

H. J. R. No. 14.1 Proposing to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding ther to Section 16, providing that the term of all officers of the public free school system, including State institutions of higher

education, may be fixed not to ex ceed six years; proposing to amend Section 8 of Article 7 of said Conatitution, authorizing the appointment or election of a State Board of Education to serve not to exceed six years; requiring said am and ments to be submitted to the people for adoption and making appropria-tions therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section I. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section


