Southern Baptist Convention To Meet At Chicago May 9

The Southern Baptist Convention which has nearly eight million members in 22 states will meet this year for the first time outside of the traditional South.

The annual meeting will be held in Chicago, May 9-12, and will be attended by 15,000 messengers elected by the churches.

Baptists are unique in that their annual convention is primarily a body representative of the churches and not a minister's group. The convention is constituted of his congregation "messengers" rather than "delegates" from the churches, in that no one carries authority

to blind back home a member of the convention.

The theme for this convention, over which Dr. B. B. Lee, Memphis, Tenn., will be taken from the fourth of "America." It is "Freedom Light." Southern Baptists expected to consider several important social and religious issues facing America today.

These are separation of church and state, the race problem, to do about missions in the Far East, the closing of the convention will be a historic rally in the Chicago in which the Baptist church of Chicago will join.

Southern Baptists are to go with their convention to Francisco, Calif., next year. The convention is expected to look upon as being more radical than their Chicago.

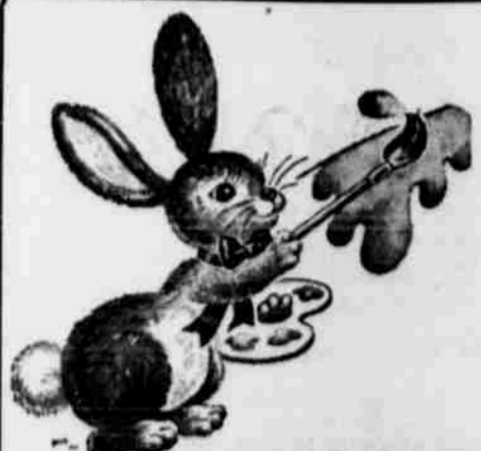

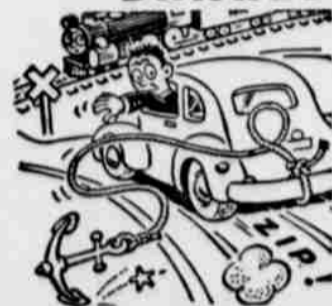

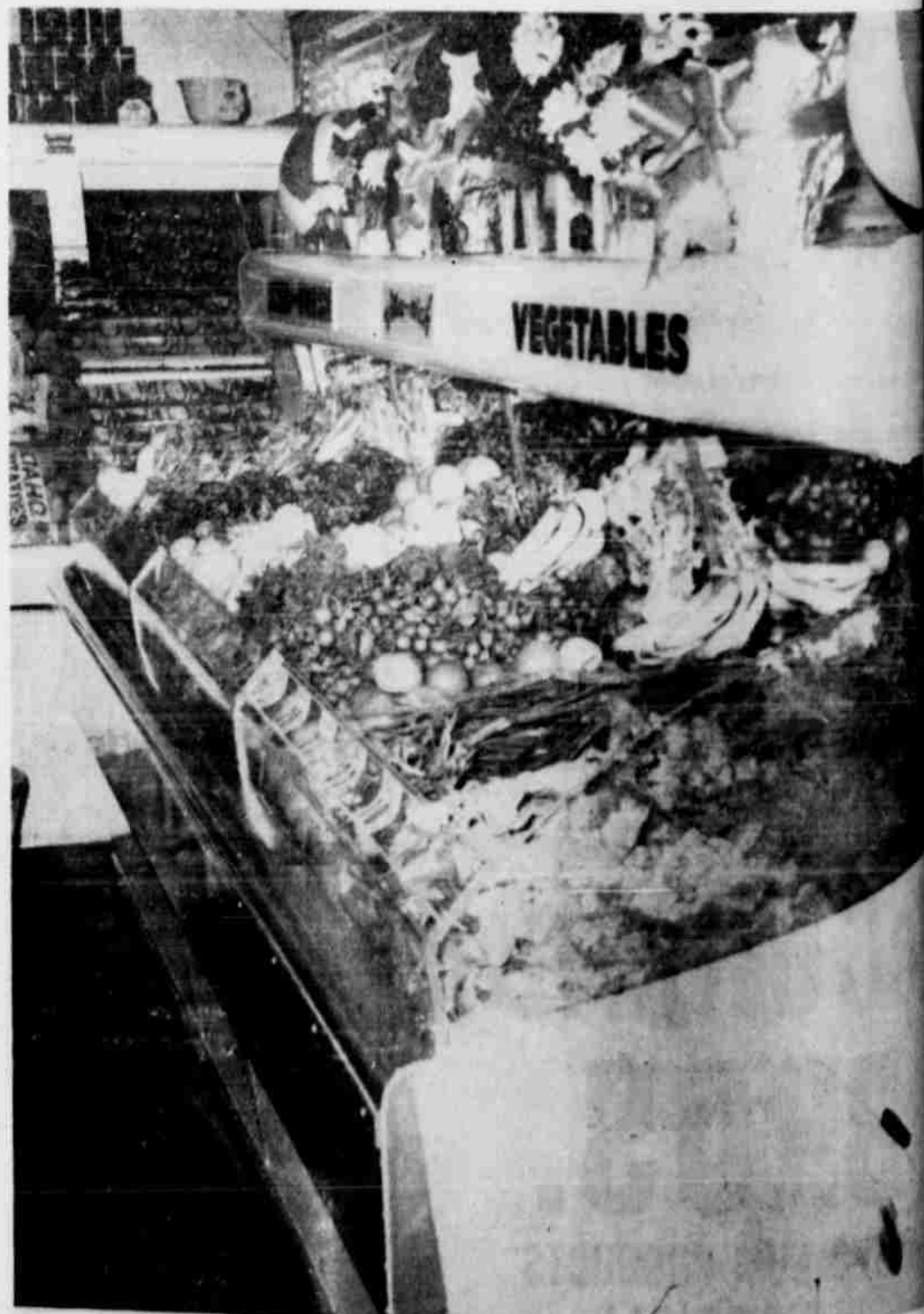
