Sgt. "Jack" Henderson Expected Home Soon

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Henderson received a message on Thursday of last week from their son, Sgt. J. C. Henderson, better known to his friends as "Jack," that he was being discharged from the Army on the point system, and would be home some time after Sept. 1.

Jack has been in the service more than four years; he was in the 8th Engineers, and drove a bulldozer for the First Cavalry Division from Fort Bliss, Texas. They were first sent to Australia, New Guinea, Admiralty Island, fought the battle of Los Negros. After entering the Philippines he was one of the first men to land on Leyte.

He was on the front line nine months and fought the Japs from house to house in Manila. He wrote his folks he would tell them about it when he got home if he felt like talking; said he knew what freezing prisoners is, and what a Typhoon is; and what it is to have Japs crawl in bed with you night after night. He also stated that on August 15th there were 122 men decorated with eight generals; said he was happy to be coming home to Mother and Dad and his friends after helping to do the job well done.

Lieut. Hite Liberated From Jap Prison Camp In China

Mrs. Lena Hite of Earth received the glad news at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon that her son, Lieut. Robert L. Hite, 25, is one of the four members of General Doolittle's first mission over Tokyo, who have been liberated from a Jap camp at Peiping, Japanese occupied China.

The telegram from the War Department to Mrs. Hite read as follows: "The Secretary of War has asked me to inform you that your son, 1st Lieut. Robert L. Hite, has been returned to the Military Control in China August 21, 1945, and is being returned to the United States."

In an interview with Mrs. Hite by the Leader reporter Wednesday night, Mrs. Hite said, "I am thrilled to death; I am so happy I don't know what to do."

The four members announced as liberated are believed to be the sole survivors of the eight fliers taken prisoners by the Japanese after the first bombing raid on Japan's home islands, April 18, 1942. The eight men captured were: Lt. George Barr, Madison, Wis.; Lt. William Glover Farrow, Washington, D. C.; 1st Lieut. Robert L. Hite, Earth, Texas; Lt. Robert J. Meder, Lakewood, Ohio; Lt. Chase E. Neilson, Hyrum, Utah; Lt. Dean E. Hallmark, Dallas, Texas; Cpl. Jacob B. DeShazer, Madras, Oregon; Sgt. Harold A. Spatz, Lebo, Kansas.

Mrs. Hite had not heard any word from her son since April, 1943, when she received an unconfirmed report that her son's voice had been heard on a short wave broadcast from Tokyo six months before.

Hite was born at Vernon, Texas, attended high school at Springlake, and was graduated from West Texas State College, Canyon. In September, 1940, he enlisted in the Army Air Forces.

In March, 1942, he was one of a group who volunteered for a "hazardous, important and interesting" mission before he left the United States, and without knowing just what the mission was, the group manned a squadron of B-25 medium bombers, which were especially equipped for the flight and for the bombing of Tokyo.

The four lost airmen were rescued by a daring American team which dropped from the skies on Japanese-occupied Peiping, and they are reported to be at the Grand Hotel De Peking, and receiving the best of care.

Mother Of M-Sgt. Lloyd Schroeder Dies Friday Morning

M-Sgt. Lloyd Schroeder was called home from overseas on an emergency furlough recently to be with his mother, Mrs. Paul Schroeder, 65, of Seely, Texas, who was seriously ill suffering from a stroke of paralysis.

M-Sgt. and Mrs. Schroeder, the former Miss Ruth Wells, after spending two weeks with Mrs. Schroeder, Sr., had only arrived here Friday morning about 4 o'clock when they received the sad news at 9 o'clock the same morning that she had passed away. M-Sgt. and Mrs. Schroeder left again at 5 o'clock for Houston, where Mrs. Schroeder, Sr. had been a patient in a hospital.

M-Sgt. Schroeder, who had been stationed on the Schouten Islands, north of New Guinea, first received an emergency furlough of 21 days, but on the death of his mother received, through the Red Cross, an extension of 14 days. He is with the Ferry Command and flew in a plane from his base to Los Angeles in 33 hours.

Mrs. Schroeder had been an invalid for four years, and has suffered at various times four strokes of paralysis. Her husband passed away just two weeks previous to her death.

Besides M-Sgt. Schroeder, she is survived by four other sons and two daughters. Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at Seely, Texas, with burial in the local cemetery. M-Sgt. Schroeder and Mrs. Schroeder are expected to return home this morning.

He was among the VII Fighter Command "Sun Setters" to fly the first escort mission for XXI Bomber Command Superfortress on April 7 making his sixth mission over the Japanese empire.
