Pfc. Lee Is Many Times Decorated

Pfc. William J. Lee, 27, son of Mrs. Gesina Lee, of Rt. 1, Littlefield, has recently been awarded the Bronze Star medal, Silver Star, DSC and Oak Leaf Cluster. Pfc. Lee has been in the service since December 9, 1941, and over seas since May, 1944. He is currently serving with an intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon in the European theater of operations. In a recent release from the Public Relations office, HQ Seventh U. S. Army, APO 758, New York, the office reported that: "Pfc. Lee has been a member of the Regimental I & R Platoon since July, 22, 1944, and has constantly shown a great devotion to duty and when engaged with the enemy his courage and judgment have been flawless. On one occasion which occurred on 2 Dec 44, Pfc. Lee was acting as 2d scout for a reconnaissance patrol. The route of this patrol led them across an open field approximately 250 yards long which was occupied at the far end by the enemy. While the remainder of the patrol stayed under cover at the edge of the field, Pfc. Lee and the 1st scout advanced boldly across the field in plain view of the enemy. When about 50 yards from their objective, the enemy opened fire on the two men wounding the lead scout. Pfc. Lee immediately made his way back across the field under the same enemy fire and reported the information he had gained regarding the strength and disposition of the enemy. This, together with the information radioed back by the wounded 1st scout, enabled effective fire to be placed upon the enemy positions. When an attack was later made against these positions the objective was successfully gained with a minimum friendly casualties."

An interesting item appeared in the Marine Corps Battle News of recent date, published somewhere in the Pacific, regarding Pvt. Denzel Jackson, brother of J. M., L. R., and G. B. Jackson, all of Littlefield. The article reads as follows: "Okinawa (Delayed)—It was almost like Texas for a while, what with hens cackling and eggs sunny side up. But Jap artillery got between Marine Pvt. Denzel Z. Jackson and breakfast. "Jackson, a 21 year old jeep driver from Phillips, Texas, found two hens near the ruins of a farm house. Turning the front seat of jeep into a roost, he coaxed two eggs a day from the fowl by feeding them crumbs from his ration crackers. "When the unit moved south in the push for Naha, the chickens turned temperamental. "With Jap artillery shells exploding around them," he said sadly "they wouldn't lay." That's when Jackson had his first chicken in two years.

Sophomores—Friday, 1 to 4, and Saturday 9 to 12. Freshmen—Saturday, 9 to 4. There will be no formal opening exercises for any of the schools. Elementary pupils will report to their respective building at 9 a. m. Monday. Grades 1 to 3 inclusive will report to the primary school and pupils in grades 4 thru 8 will report to Central elementary. Several vacancies in key positions still exist in the teaching staff. VICTORY LOAN DRIVE

Secretary Vinson's announcement of a Victory Loan Drive for October is a reminder that, although the war has ended and along with it the bulk of armament production, the cost of immediate aftermath of conflict will require financing.

Billions of additional dollars will be necessary for returning forces from overseas, for providing their discharge pay of \$300 per service man in the vast majority of instances, for caring for the wounded, for financing contract cancellation and tax refunds. More borrowing will be mandatory as an offset to declines incident to war contract cancellation.

The Victory Loan Drive in the fall will have a further value of diverting surplus spending power into bonds from the consumer market until sufficient goods are available. The name for the campaign, "Victory," signifies celebrating the triumph of our fighting forces, but civilians as well will be benefited by extending the policy of wartime thrift into the early months of reconversion.

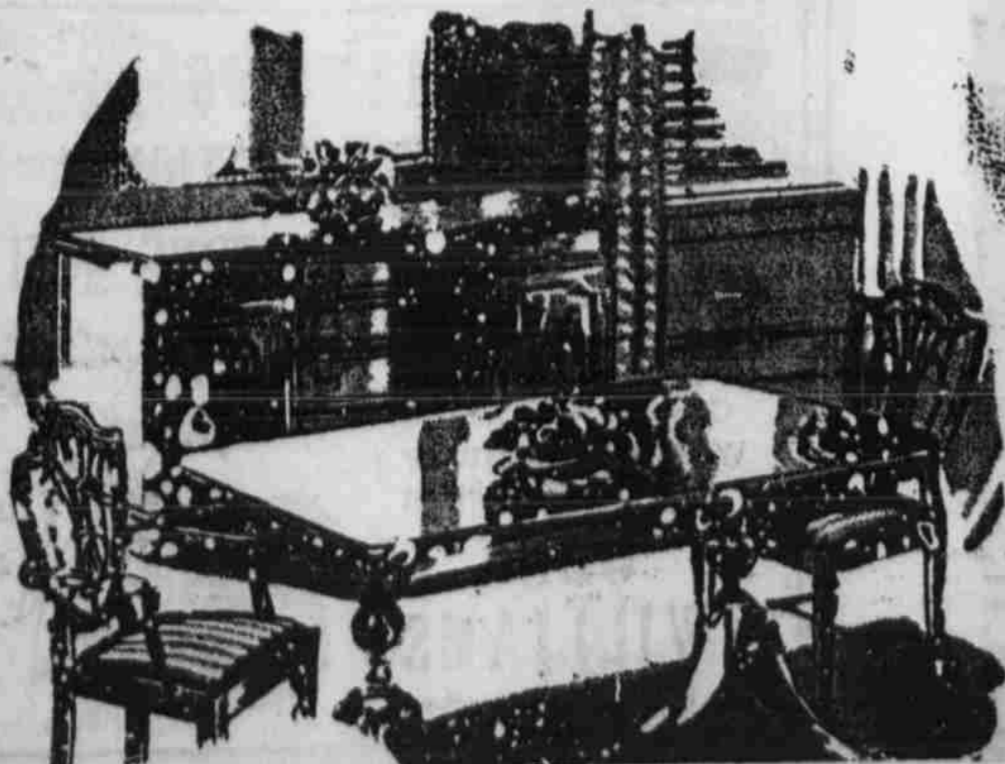

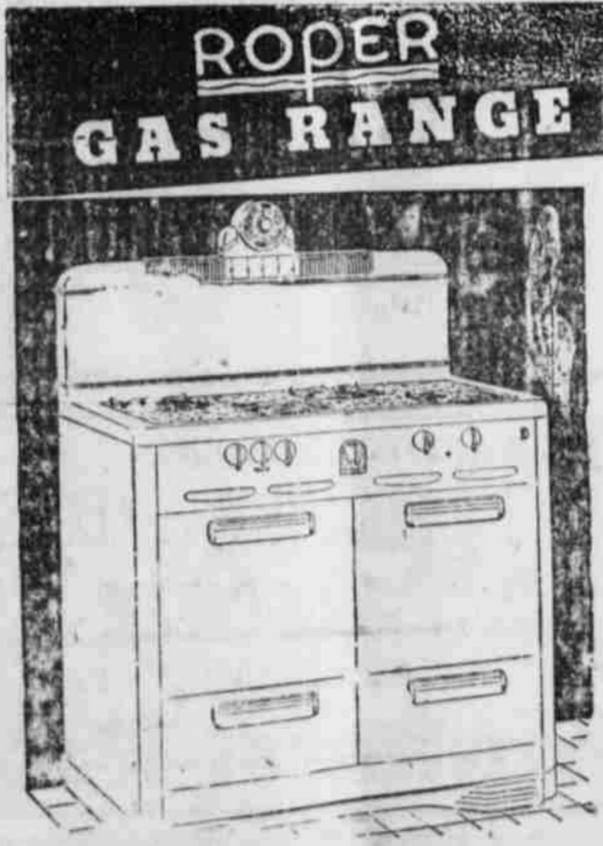

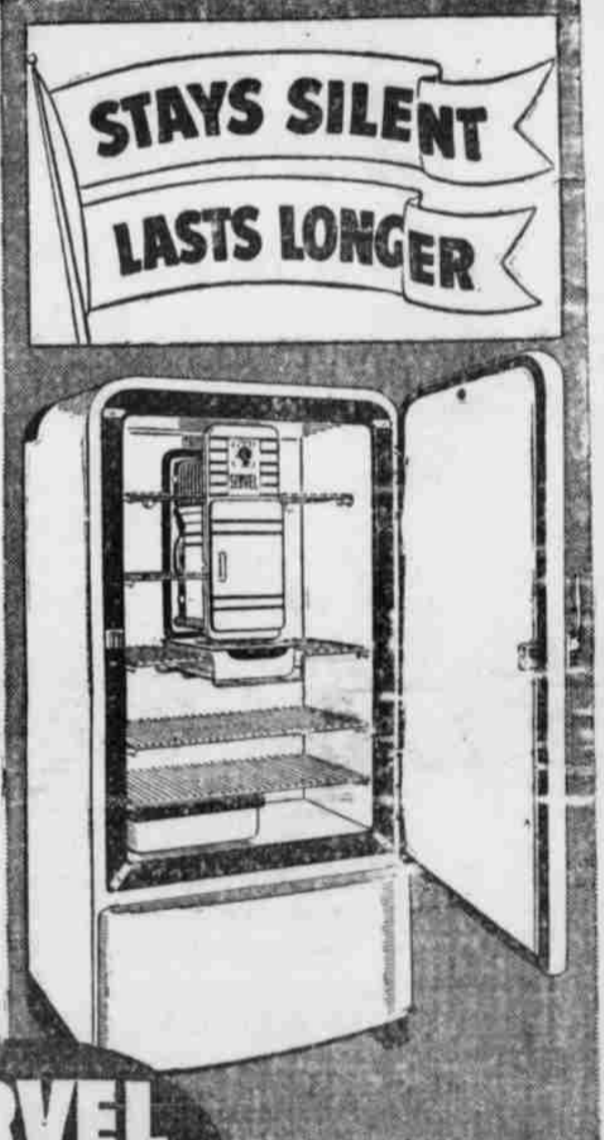

Without regard for his own safety he heroically dashed out from his position of safety into the field of hostile fire and carried his wounded comrade to safety. He then made his way back to his position, defying more enemy fire all the way, and as the advance began again he and his squad were once more pinned down by sharp enemy fire. Again he boldly moved forward to deal the enemy telling fire and which enabled the squad to continue on with its mission and mop up pockets of enemy resistance within the town. His steady courage, intrepidity, sincere devotion to duty are highly commendable and duly uphold the highest traditions of the United States Army."

Pfc Clark entered military service from Littlefield.
