published by the Agricultural Extension Service and designed to familiar -- hem with the underground water conservation law. County / . " t David Eaton has announced plans for mailing the booklet to all farmers and water users in the county.

Using a question and answer method, the booklet outlines the basic concept of the Underground Water Conservation Law, which was passed by the Texas Legislature in the spring of 1949.

"Every farmer and every water user in an area depending on underground water should be familiar with this law and how it will affect him," the Extension Service points out.

The law hinges on two points. First, it declares that the water under his land belongs to the individual owner and its use cannot be limited, allocated, pro-rated or taken away.

Second, they lay the framework for organization of underground water conservation districts assigning to them powers of conserving, preserving, protecting and re-charging the underground water in reserviors over which they have jurisdiction.

Coupled with power to re-charge underground water reservoirs, the district has the right to prevent waste of irrigation water, thus insuring a continuing supply of the irrigation water which is vital to the prosperity of thousands of High Plains farmers and

Sowing Seeds in Hills. Really Means in Hollows



Hills Are Fixed Points for Planting, Lined Up and Speni Equal Distances Aport.

Instructions on the seed packets of cucumbers, bush and vine type tom, fill squash, pumpkins, melons and then pla some other crops that like plenty of space to spread out, usually say to "sow in hills."

Beginners would naturally sup pose that this means in mounds, elevated above the surrounding

Only where the ground is so low that it does not drain well, or rainfall may be so heavy it runs off slowly should garden bills be slowly, should garden hills be elevated.
