Editorial This Might Be YOU

You're not immune! None of us are!

It could happen to any of us at any time! "What?" You ask.

A serious traffic accident causing a death or serious injury to a loved one or a good personal friend. Sometime during a life time we become involved wither directly or indirectly with such an accident. It isn't a very pleasant thought.

The Texas traffic safety council predicts that 25 persons will die on Texas highways during the July Fourth holidays. Only twice in the history of the council has this figure ever been higher than the ac-

Are you planning to go somewhere during the holidays? Yes, then just take a few minutes and read what might happen.

It wasn't your fault, was it? It all happened so fast, but it happened. You can't remember much about it, but your car is demolished . . . and so is the one that you hit. What you do remember, you would like to forget. . .you were speeding.

Speeding! Why is it in this day and time when modern medical science is making life longer. . . and you through your speed are trying to shorten it?

You found out that two of the passengers in the other car were seriously injured and were taken for medical attention. You weren't hurt. . . just shaken. . . but you begin to worry about the others.

The investigating officer comes up and asks a lot of questions, but the answers don't come easy, and you don't have answers for all his questions.

You ask him about the condition of the two injured. After his investigation, he presents you with a citation for reckless driving by speeding.

Your holiday is finished. . . and maybe your holidays for some time to come. You were just in a hurry. . . a hurry to get somewhere so you could have more time to kill. . .and you almost killed more than time. Don't let this happen to you. Drive to arrive alive.

In Lamb County, as reported by the Littlefield Press, so far this year there have been 31 accidents, killing six persons and injuring 34 others. Slowdown and live. . .you can't be in that big a hurry to die.

nb County Leader Editorials An Even More Modest Proposal
