Almond Meringue Shells

250° 45 minutes 6 egg whites

12 medium-sized meringue shells 1 teaspoon almond extract ½ cup chopped blanched almonds

2 cups sugar, sifted Have egg whites warmed to room temperature. Beat egg whites until they hold very stiff peaks. Add sugar slowly, about 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition, until the mixture forms glossy, soft peaks. Lastly slowly fold in the chopped almonds and almond extract. Shape into shells on a cookie sheet lined with brown paper. Make a circle of the meringue on the paper, then build up the sides with spoonfuls of the mixture or shape with a pastry bag. Bake in a 250 degree oven for 45 minutes. At the end of the baking period, turn off the heat and allow the meringues to remain in the oven until they are cool. Served filled with scoops of peach ice cream and top with fresh sliced peaches.


