The Littlefield United Fund was kicked off Wednesday morning as the advanced portion of the drive got underway.

Workers for the advanced portion were given their cards, and Charles Duval, advance chairman stated that he hoped the advance portion would be completed within a week, prior to the start of the general and the employee portion of the United Fund Drive,

Different conditions on individual farms and different areas of the High Plains make it impossible to calculate the economic effect to the area in dol-

The turn out, according to several observers, was better than expected, as a total of 1174 voters out of a possible 3506 who paid their poll tax cast ballots in the special election, The issues passed by the vot-

ers will be put into effect January 1, 1966. The voting by local voters corresponded with the feeling of the majority of Texas voters who split on the full ballot with the only issue still in doubt the veterans' land fund.
