Safe Driving Aim Of New Speed Limits hours' time, whichever comes

By BILL TURNER It's always been accepted that

the fellow who drives the legal speed limit is a safe driver. And it figures that the driver

who passes the limit, besides leaving himself open for a traffic ticket, is flirting with an accident. But that's not necessarily so. It could be, instead, that the

speed-limit driver is the one who's flirting with injury or death on the highway.

That was one line of thought expounded here by Paul Mills. State Highway Department en gineer of Lubbock, when he met with Littlefield's city council last to discuss speed zoming on

"The safe speed," said Mills. "is not necessarily 30. It is a speed which lets a driver move with the mass of traffic and which

cuts down the passing movement." What Mills was saying, in effect, was this: The fellow who goes along with the crowd in traffic is usually going to get along better than the driver who moves slower, or faster, than the normal flow of traffic.

Mills has a sort of "if-you-can'tlick-'em-join-'em' attitude about traffic on highways inside a city When the normal flow of traffic is going 40 miles-per-hour in a 30-mile zone, I don't think you should pin it down to the idea that everybody's speeding," said

"It'd be closer to right," he added, "if we'd admit that the 30-mile speed limit is just too

It was this sort of reasoning that led city councilmen to accept the idea of new speed zoning on highways here. As a result, they passed a speed zoning ordinance which will raise speed limits or parts of highways 84, 385 and 54 in Littlefield

The highway department ran a survey on highway speeds in Lit-tlefield. It showed drivers were traveling average speeds of more

than 30 on some in-town portions of the highways, despite 30-mile speed limit signs.

This sort of situation is not pe culiar to Littlefield, said Mills, who added, "It happens in towns all over Texas.

It is for this reason that the highway department makes sur veys and comes up with speed zone recommendations, he ex plained.
