Attend Funeral Of Marine Killed In Korean War

Mr. and Mrs. Wiley Roberts and Mr. and Mrs. O. S. Sullivan attended the funeral services at the First Methodist Church, Childress, at 4 p.m. Sunday, for Russell Avery, 23 Marine, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Avery of Childress, who was killed in the Korean war. The remains arrived in Childress Saturday from overseas.
Mr. Avery was a cousin of Mrs. Wiley Roberts and a nephew of Mrs. Sullivan.
Burial took place in the Childress Cemetery following a full military funeral.
The deceased left surviving his parents and a brother and three sisters.
He was overseas about eight months when he was killed.

City Delivery Service Is Requested For Additional 25 Blocks in Duggan Area

City delivery service has been requested by some 1200 residents, for 15th and 16th streets and other blocks where city delivery is not now available including approximately twenty-five additional blocks. Should this service be granted it will require the hiring of another city carrier, to properly distribute the mail in these congested residential sections. Practically all of the new addition has been built since the original grant was allowed, it has been announced.
Many of the new streets will have to be better marked, and visible house numbers will have to be placed on houses.

Scarlet Fever -- A Menace To Children

"Scarlet fever still continues to be a menace to children," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, in discussing diseases common to children. "Many cases are slight, but they may infect others who may become seriously ill. It is treacherous and undesirable, and the only good thing about it is that if one can avoid it until grown, the chances of never getting it are excellent.

"Scarlet fever is spread by the transfer of the infection in the discharges of nose and throat, ears, or abscesses of persons ill with the disease and those who are carriers of the infection. The handling of

articles soiled by the patient may cause the disease. "Children under ten years of age are usually susceptible to scarlet fever. Children becoming suddenly ill with fever, sore throat, vomiting and showing a fine red rash, should have medical attention and be immediately quarantined to prevent the spread of this disease. The appearance of scarlet fever in the home should be immediately followed by a rigid quarantine for at least three weeks. The public should be warned against exposing young children to those exhibiting acute catarrhal symptoms of any kind. Take no chances—be on the safe side."

Health Talks

You can eat all the seven different kinds of food which are considered essential to good health and still lose weight if you eat the proper amounts of those foods. Any active person burns up more than 1500 calories a day so that a diet which contains no more calories than that means he would have to use up some of the stored fat to go about his daily duties.

The average person, therefore, who built himself a daily diet of 1500 calories, all of those taken in proper proportions from the list of seven basic foods would, in time, lose weight at about two pounds a week, without injuring his health. The caution with which your doctor approaches any reducing diet, even this one, is based upon whether or not you are an "average" individual. The least you should do, to safeguard your health, is to have a physical examination and obtain your doctor's approval for this or any other diet you plan to undertake.

A reducing diet will usually include about twice as much carbohydrate food as either protein or fat; fruits and vegetables are generally thought of as the high-carbo-

hydrate foods, containing starches and sugars. There are some diseases of the body in which the carbohydrate intake must be limited, so it is easy to see why a physical examination before undertaking a reducing diet is the safest way.

When a reducing diet is safe, about 150 of your 1500 calorie budget is taken over by potatoes and vegetables; when calories are turned into cents, that would make 15 cents of your \$1.50 calorie budget set aside for the vegetables.

Of that 15 cents, 10 cents is your daily allowance for the so-called high carbohydrate vegetables, which include potato, rice, noodles, spaghetti, macaroni, corn and shell beans. One-half cup of any of these potato substitutes uses up your 10 cents but gives you a lot of "stick to your ribs" food for the money. And one of those must be included in your diet every day to keep you in line with the seven basic foods.

After you spend 10 cents on your potato, you are left 5 cents to spend on vegetables during the rest of the day. Since you probably eat that potato at the main meal of the day, you can usually figure on us-

Information For Veterans

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I want to name my two children as beneficiaries of my National Service Life Insurance policy, but I'd like to arrange things so that one of them will receive 60 percent of the insurance and the other 40 percent. Is it possible to do this?

A—Yes. You may specify exactly how you want your insurance money paid out, in addition to specifying who is to get the money. Any VA office will help you with the details.

Q—I'm a soldier, badly hurt in line of duty, and expect to be discharged from service soon. While I'm in the service, I'm covered by the free \$10,000 indemnity insurance, but that coverage will stop 120 days after my discharge. What type of GI insurance may I get afterwards? I realize I'll have to pay for this coverage.

A—After your discharge, you will have two choices: (1) the five-year level premium term policy, issued without a physical examination, but for which you must apply to VA within 120 days of your separation from service, or (2) any plan of the special NSLI that is issued only to disabled veterans. You may apply to VA for this within one year from the date VA finds

ing a real cheap second vegetable at the same meal, or little bits of several vegetables in the form of a combination salad.

"Calorie-ly" speaking, the cheap vegetables add up about as follows:

Five stalks of asparagus, 2½ cents; one-half cup of broccoli, 2 cents; half-cup wax or green beans, 2½ cents; 3 Brussels sprouts, 3 cents; one-fourth small head cauliflower, 2½ cents; half-cup Swiss chard, 3 cents; 10 slices cucumber, 1 cent; 3 large lettuce leaves, 1 cent; half-head endive or escarole, 1 cent; half-cup mustard greens, 2 cents; half-cup turnip greens, 3 cents; half-cup kale, 3 cents; 5 okra pods, 2 cents; one pepper, 2 cents; 9 red radishes, 2 cents; half-cup sauerkraut, 2 cents; half-cup spinach, 2 cents; one bunch watercress, 2 cents; half-cup squash, 2 cents; half-cup cabbage, 1½ cents.

You will notice that most of those are leaf or head vegetables. They make the bulk of the vegetables known as three per cent carbohydrate vegetables. The "blublike" or root vegetables such as carrots, beets, onions, and turnips are the six per cent carbohydrate vegetables and could be used as the other part of your "five cents" that you have left to spend on vegetables, at the other meal for the day.

A half-cup of those six per cent carbohydrate vegetables runs into the following calorie costs:

Fresh: beets, 5 cents; canned beets, 4 cents; fresh or canned carrots, 3 cents; turnips, 3 cents; one medium-sized raw onion, 3 cents; kohlrabi, 2½ cents; and pumpkin, 3 cents.

Most of those sound like soup vegetables, don't they? So a mixture of them, adding up to whatever vegetable "money" you have left, might be tossed into a clear soup broth or into a salad to give you all you've got coming in the way of vegetables for your daily budget.

TORONTO (AP)—Leslie Higgins, Liverpool-born barber, says the Duke of Edinburgh likes his hair "a bit long, but neat."

And it suits him perfectly, says the 45-year-old hair snipper. He should know—he cut the Duke's hair in England for 14 years. Higgins, once barber to the Duke of Kent and the Duke of Gloucester, and to King Carol of Romania and Paul of Yugoslavia, now is working in a Toronto barber shop.

He plans to offer his services to the Duke during the royal tour in October. "It would be nice to get back to the artistic side of hair-cutting," he says. "Canadians just jump into the chair and shout: 'Short, front and back.'"

Olton Family Seriously Injured

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Myer, sons, Jerry and Johnny of Olton were all seriously injured in an accident late Sunday night, Sept. 2, 8 miles east of Matador.

Mr. Myer, who is manager of the Cash Way Food at Olton, was driving west in their 1949 Buick, when they were in collision head-on with a late model Ford pick-up driven by Raymond Everett Byars of Lubbock. Mrs. Myers was thrown through the right side of the windshield and to the pavement some 15 feet from the car. She received compound fractures of both legs, gashes, bruises and scratches about the upper part of her body. Jerry got out with a fractured pelvic bone and a gash in his head which required 8 stitches, and Johnny with a broken arm, each with scratches. Mr. Myer's jaw bone was crushed, his ankle bone chipped off and one leg broken just above the ankle, scratches, bruises and lacerations.

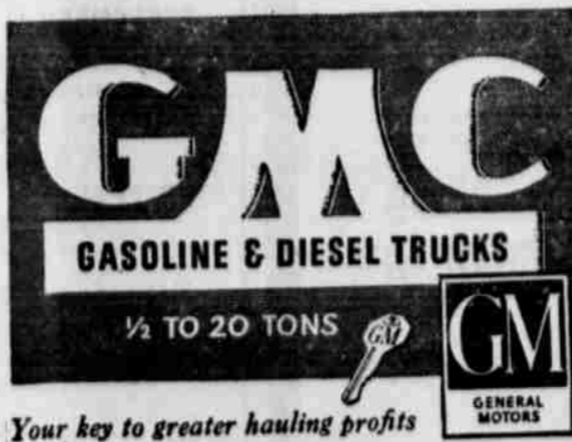

40,000 Qualified Young Women to Be Added to Air Force by 1952

The U.S. Air Force has greatly increased its enlistment quotas for women, and an intensive recruiting drive is being launched here in Littlefield, it was announced today by M/Sgt. Gerald F. Cutshall in charge of the local Army and Air Force recruiting office.

The local drive is in line with the recent announcement by the Women in the Air Force—WAF—that more than 40,000 highly qualified young women will be added to the air force by July 1952. It was learned that 35,000 of these will be enlisted women.

"To qualify for enlistment in the air force," Sgt. Cutshall said, "A woman must be a high school graduate, between the ages of 18 and 31, inclusive, be a citizen, unmarried, in good health, have no dependents under the age of 18, and of high moral standards."

The pay scale for enlisted women is exactly the same as that for men. A private receives \$75.00 a month for the first 4 months, after which her pay rises to \$80.00. Base pay increases with promotions and

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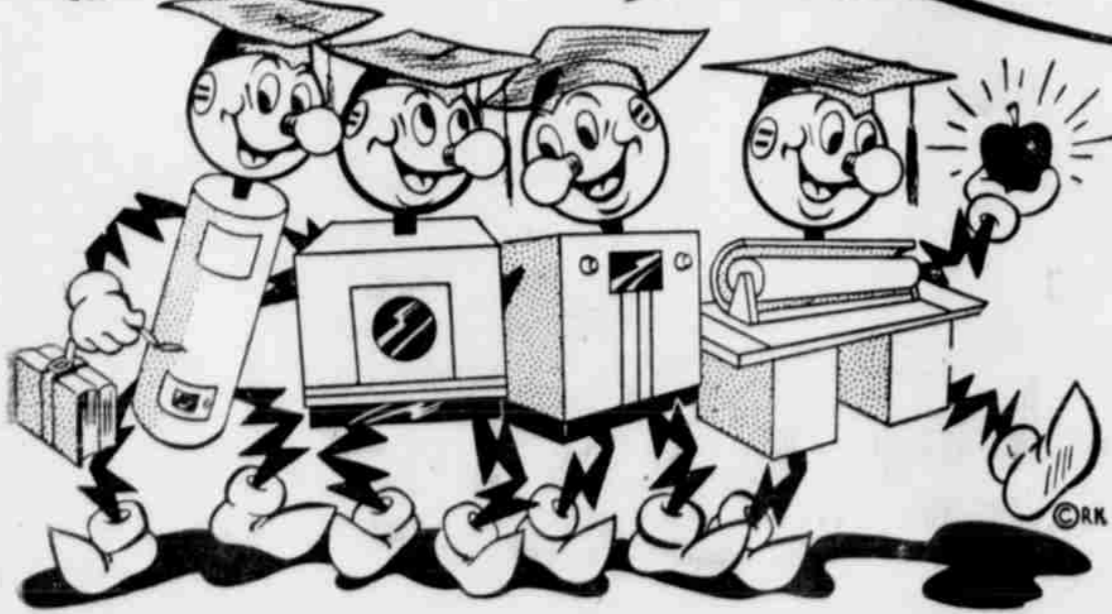

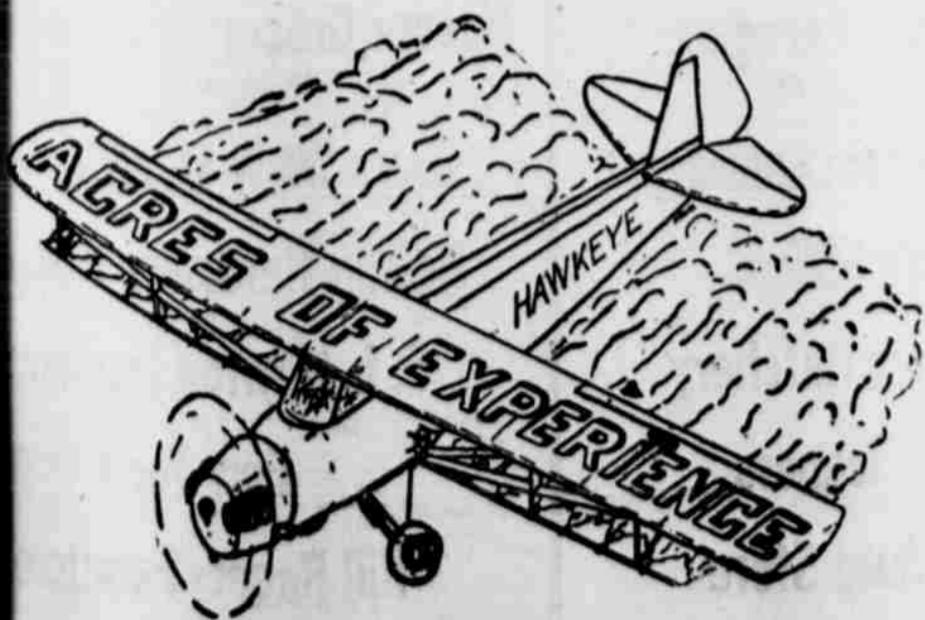

Garnish moldings and instrument panels are available in six colors to harmonize with the upholstery fabric selected.
