New Tower to Be Located in South Portion of City

H. J. Wright Employed by City As Gas and Sewer Inspector

City Secretary W. G. Street announced Tuesday that effective with February water accounts the irrigation water allowance will be 20,000 gallons, instead of 15,000, with no increase in price.

He also announced that the City is buying another water tower, and that the order for this was placed Tuesday with the Chicago Bridge & Iron Works, for a 150,000 gallon capacity overhead tank, to cost about \$20,000.

Immediate shipment is expected on this tower, and it is hoped to have it in service about June 1. It will be located in the south part of town.

The City also reported that effective Monday next the system of sanitary sewer and gas inspection will be re-instated. It was pointed out that the City passed ordinances several years ago, regulating this but these have never been enforced due to shortage of manpower.

H. J. Wright, who has many years plumbing experience, of south of town, has been employed as gas and sewer inspector. For this work he will draw the fees stipulated in the ordinances, which are 25, 26 and 41.

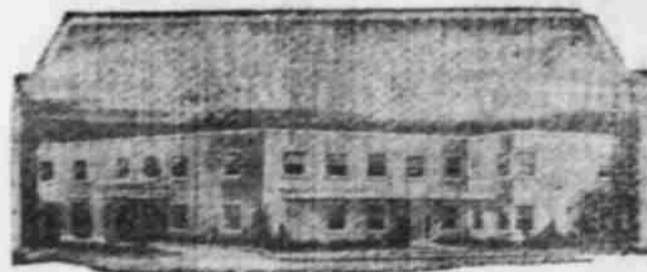

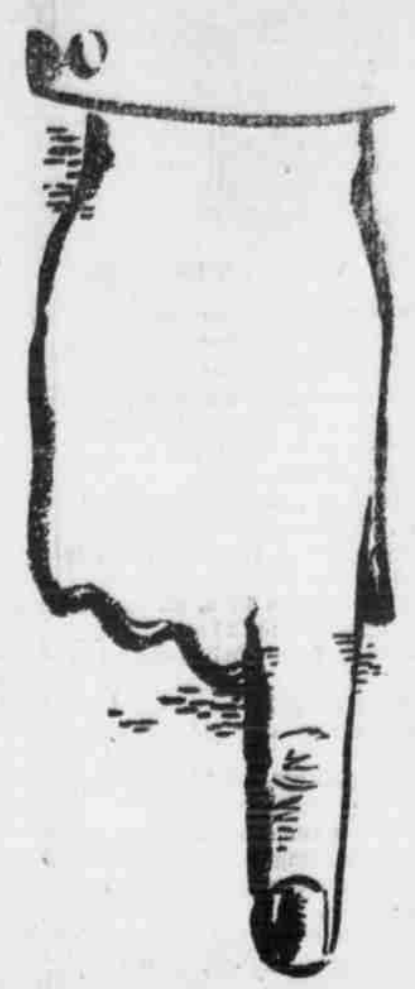

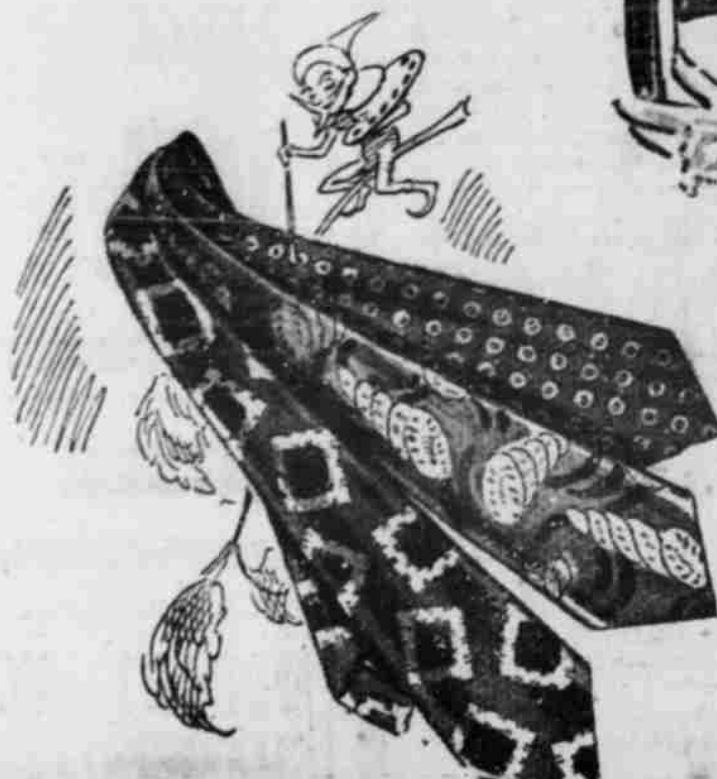

WHEREAS, it appears and I find that said petition is signed by the requisite number of free-holders and qualified voters of Lamb County, Texas, who are resident citizens of said County, and that the petition is a due form; and

WHEREAS, the law of this State provides that when such petition is presented the County Judge of the County to whom the petition is presented shall make a written order upon the minutes of Commissioners' Court of such County for the holding of such election; and

WHEREAS, after said petition was presented to me, and on the same day, to-wit, on the 17th day of January, 1946, another petition signed by Marvin Wagner and 486 others was presented to me, in which petition it is requested that I as County Judge of Lamb County in ordering an election for the removal of the County Seat of Lamb County, Texas, to place the name of Amherst, Texas, on the ballot to be used in said election so that in voting at said election the voters could vote for removal of the County Seat from Olton, Texas to Amherst, Texas as they desire and it appears to me that both said petitions should be granted.

THEREFORE, I, I. B. Holt, in my capacity as County Judge of Lamb County, Texas, do hereby grant said petitions and do hereby order that an

election be held in the various voting precincts of Lamb County, Texas, on Saturday, the 9th day of March, 1946, for the purpose of determining, and at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Lamb County, Texas, the question of whether or not the County Seat of Lamb County, Texas, shall be removed from Olton, Texas, to Littlefield, Texas, or to Amherst, Texas.

"FOR REMOVAL TO AMHERST, TEXAS"

Should the voter be in favor of the County Seat remaining at Olton, Texas, he or she shall write or cause to be written or printed on his or her ballot the words:

"FOR REMAINING AT OLTON, TEXAS"

Should the voter be in favor of removing the County Seat to some other place than Littlefield, Texas or Amherst, Texas, he or she shall write or cause to be written or printed on his or her ballot the words:

"FOR REMOVAL TO _____"

and the voter shall insert the name of the place to which he or she desires the County Seat to be removed.

A copy of this order certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper notice of said elec-

tion. And Thirty (30) days notice of the time and places of holding said election shall be given by posting true and correct copies of this order in one public place within each voting precinct in said county, and by publication thereof in the English Language in four (4) weekly issues of a newspaper regularly published in each of the towns of Littlefield, Amherst and Olton in Lamb County, Texas, and the date of first publication of said notice in such newspaper shall be thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election. The Sheriff of Lamb County, Texas, or his deputy, shall post said notices and cause the same to be published.

It is further ordered that this order shall be spread and recorded upon the Minutes of the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas.

SIDELIGHTS From Washington

Many farm and ranch people in Texas are experiencing a delay in getting rural electrification services. Where the delay is caused by the lack of funds by the local REA, much hope is offered by the fact that the President last week asked Congress to increase REA loan authorizations by one hundred million dollars. This would mean about five million dollars in new loans to Texas more than to any other state—and would take care of the more pressing applications for the next few months.

Claude Wickard, head of REA has asked some of us who have sponsored the REA program through the years to try to get Congressional action on the new request by March 1st. This we are trying to do.

Prior to July first, the beginning of the new fiscal year, we plan to provide an additional and greatly expanded REA program. It is estimated that it will take seven years to fully complete the REA program of making electricity available to all rural homes. Only one farm out of every three in Texas now has electricity. A rapid expansion of REA in Texas should be one of our major post-war objectives.

Many people have written me about the Poage Bill, which provides REA loan authorizations for a three year period. I am supporting the bill, as it would make possible a better system of planning for the local REA Co-ops. However, the best hope for early success on pending projects is the recent request of the President.

This week I was appointed chairman of a five-man subcommittee to handle all appropriations by Clar-

ence Cannon, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee.

By an act of Congress approved last December, Congress proposes to keep a closer rein on Government-owned Corporations.

We will have jurisdiction over the Commodity Credit Corporation, which handles loans on cotton and other commodities, Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, TVA, and all other wholly owned Government Corporations, totaling in all about forty. The programs of these agencies have a very direct bearing upon the welfare of our people.

It is too early to tell just what our committee will be able to do in promoting economy and improving the service which these various agencies are required to render to the American people. We will do our best to promote and safeguard the public interest.

In addition to the new assignment, I will continue my work on the War Department and Independent Offices Subcommittees.

According to the latest census report, the 25-county 19th Congress-

sional District has harvested 202,000 bales of cotton from the 1945 crop. This seems very small when compared to the 1,120,000 bales produced by the same 25 counties in 1937.

Production of Badly Needed Implements Has Ben Crippled

An apparent effort by the C. I. O. to cripple production of badly needed farm implements and tractors resulted recently in the calling of a strike of 1,700 employees of the Charles City, Iowa wheel and tractor plant of the Oliver Co-operation, according to information received by Lon Campbell, dealer for Tractor Equipment.

The Charles City Oliver Plant is the second in the Company to be struck, Mr. Campbell said, the South Plow works having been struck more than three months ago. In addition, eleven plants of one company and five of still another maker of implements and tractors are on strike, with the result the supply of necessary equipment for farmers of the nation is becoming tighter and tighter with no indications of relief.

Farmers who have struggled along for years without sufficient equipment

will be interested in the demands made upon implement manufacturers, Mr. Campbell believes.

The C. I. O. originally demanded increases at Charles City of 132 per cent which would boost the annual payroll from \$2,938,000 to \$6,400,000, and increase of 3,500,000, he said. If granted by the company, the company would have only two courses open to it—boost the prices of its tractors to figures the farmer could not afford to pay, or lose money and eventually shut the plant down and go out of tractor business.

The company did, according to Mr. Campbell, make every effort to prevent the C. I. O. from calling the strike.

It offered to raise wages to a point where the rates would be 56 per cent over earnings in the base period of 1941, which would be a bonus of 23 per cent over the rise in living costs. With the increase offered by the company, he said, the lowest paid worker would receive weekly for 40 hours of \$36.80, and employees in the highest bracket would be paid \$57.20 for 40 hours. Since production on a longer week would

have been possible for some months, the employees would receive time and a half for each hour above the basic 40, giving them still greater earnings in an agricultural area community living costs are lower, and where many storekeepers, store employees, bank employees and some farmers themselves don't make nearly as much.

"The lack of plows, tractors and other farm machinery is something that has been troubling farmers for many months, and the fact that they will have difficulty obtaining them now because of the action of the C. I. O. makes the situation more serious. Farmers, always patriotic, were willing to make sacrifices and to forego new equipment where there was war work to be done, but now that the war is over and food demands are as great if not greater, they will wonder why a union is permitted to keep them from having badly needed farm equipment.

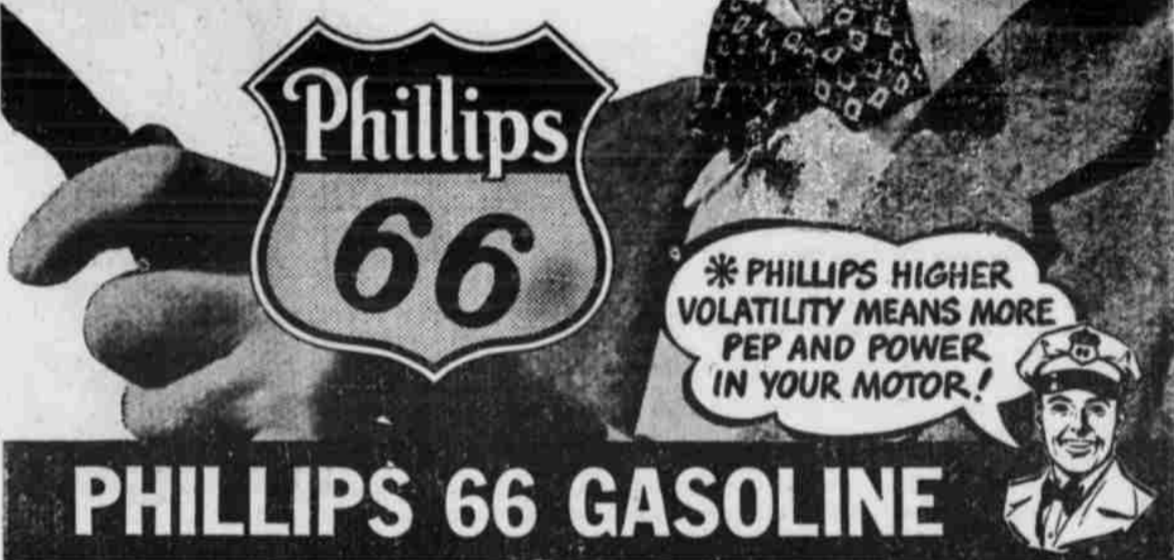

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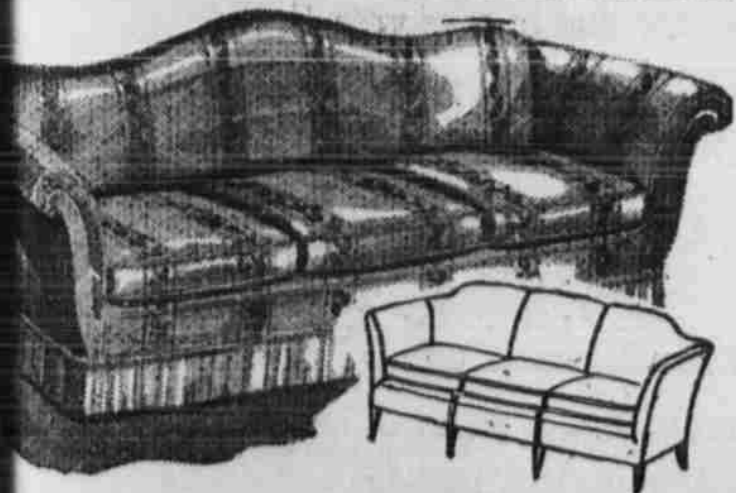

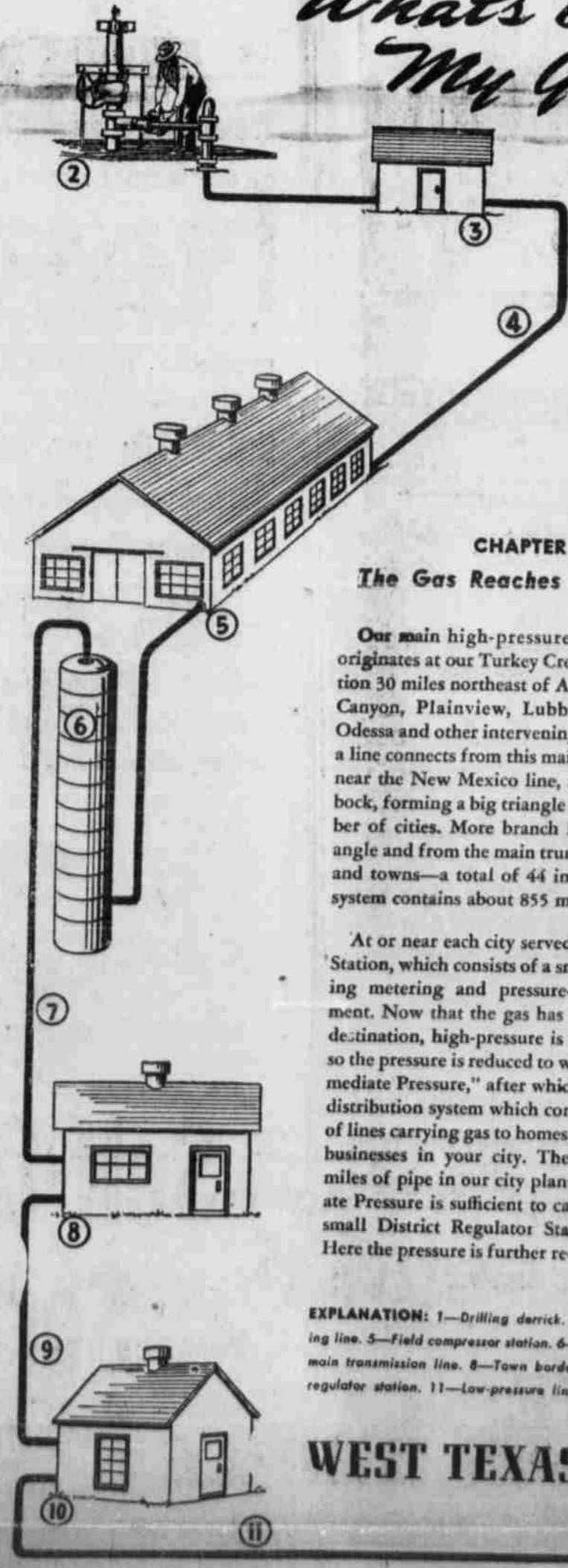
