



Is Standing 30 Feet In Water; May Be Good for 600 Gallons Per Minute

Work is now underway on the first test well under the new water works extension plan, which is being drilled on the south side of the farm of Leslie B. Davis, 3-4th of a mile east of present water plant.

According to W. G. Street, City Secretary, present indications are that it is going to be an excellent well. The driller is now down 108 feet, and has gone through 30 feet of water bearing sand.

"The well ought to be good for dive or six hundred gallons per minute, and maybe better.

"The water found looks very encouraging. If this well is as good as we think it is, we won't need to drill any more wells, as that will be enough to supply the city, "said Mr.

1 and has shown marked improvement in cream in this territory but a recent survey of conditions indicates that there is yet much to be done to bring all cream produced in this territory up to government stan-

"The Federal government is very insistent that extraneous matter must be eliminated from cream and we feel that you should be fully acquainted with the requirements of the Food and Drug Administration in regard to buying cream. Therefore we are holding a series of meetings similar to those held last May in order to acquaint you with this program.
