

Handy Hotbed Can R. Outside Basement W

Most economical hot-bed in space, cost and upkeep, is built around a window opening from a heated basement, preferably a south window.

In front of the window make a shallow excavation, about a foot deep The size must be figured carefully, so that a frame set in this excava-tion can be covered by window or hot-bed sash. As in the case of other hot-beds, a glass substitute may be used on the sash, if desired.

Build a frame to fit in the excavation. The sides must slant sharply from a point above the window almost to the ground. Fit the sash on this frame, using hinges at the top so the sash may easily be raised for ventilation. Earth may be banked around the frame to keep out the cold; and the sides should be as tight as possible to keep out

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

In fact, while Tech is a major college, many sportswriters in other sections are inclined to value its players as "Little All-America" prospects instead of for the big team.

That doesn't mean the Red Raiders don't play good football. They do, year in and year out. But they simply can't c manpower, with a school in a major conference. You just can't convince a guy who's been a high school hero that he can make the same splash in a minor conference.

This handicap may loom important to a coach who's thinking of moving to Lubbock. Then again, it may not enter into picture. But it certainly is worth thinking

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



In every month of the year there is important service a cold frame can render to a garden. In the spring it is a nursery for young plants; under its protection vegetables and flowers can be started weeks earlier than they could be sown outdoors; and guarded from belated frosts until time to set them in the garden.

Any one who can wield a saw and

Any one who can wield a saw and hammer can make a cold frame. It is usually made 3 by 6 feet, or some multiple of this, for the reason that standard hot-bed sash are of these dimensions. This standard sash may be used for both hot-beds and cold frames, which are alike except that the cold frame is unheated. But a cold frame (or a hot-bed either) may be any size you wish, to fit old windows, or frames covered with one of the modern glass substitutes.

These glass substitutes are worth

These glass substitutes are worth ensidering. They do not break, and the breakage of glass in windy ey do not let in as mu

The substitutes most commonly covered with material resembling celluloid, or fabrics treated with wax to make them waterproof, and let more light through.

The frame of a cold-frame should

be constructed according to the plan herewith of 1-inch boards, of cypress, white pine or some wood which resists rot. Then dig a hole in the ground slightly larger than the size of the frame and a foot the size of the frame and a foot deep. Into this hole put the frame so that the front is 4 inches above the surface, and the rear, 9 inches. It must slant toward the south, where the winter sun shines. It is well to hinge the sash at the top of the frame, so it can be easily opened for transplanting purposes and airing.

A sunny spot in the garden, pro-tected as much as possible from the full force of winds and driving rain, is the best situation for the cold frame. It may be too cold now to dig in the garden, but the sash may be procured and the lumber frame made, so that when the first warm days arrive you are ready for serious gardening.

Here are the facts: Today, heart disease is the leading cause of death in th United States.

One out of every three deaths is due to diseases of the heart and blood vessels. It is estimated that one out of every 20 persons suffers from some form of heart or blood vessel disease.

There are few people who have not lost friends or relatives as a result of the heart diseases. The obituary page of the daily press further emphasizes the seriousness and extent of heart disase.

Heart disease takes a greater toll than the next five leading causes of death combined.

In 1948, the last year for which complete figures are available, more than 637,000 persons died of diseases of the heart and blood vessels. During the same year, fatality figures for the next five highest causes of death were: cancer, 197,000; accidents, 98,000; nephritis (kidney disseae), 77,000; pneumonia 56,000 tuberculosis, 44,000.

Mortality from diseases of the heart and blood vessels is three times as high as cancer, six times as high as accidents, ten times as high as pneumonia, and fourteen times as high as tuberculosis. Heart disease is no respecter of age.

There are congenial malformations of the heart which are evidenced at birth, but these are comparatively few.

Rheumatic fever and the resulting rheumatic heart disease together constitute the leading fatal disease among young people between the ages of

Over the age of 35, diseases of the heart and blood vessels lead all causes of death. Nearly one out of every two deaths after the age of 45 is caused by heart diseases.

Heart disease takes a heavy toll in sickness and disability as well as death. It strikes down thousands of men and women in the prime of life,

Here are a few simple statements of fact that when they are beginning to make the richest contribution to society.

The economic cost of heart disease is staggering in terms of loss of life, absenteeism, disability, loss of gainful employment, and care and treatment

An estimated 152,100,000 work days or billions of dollars in productivity, are lost each year because

of heart and blood vessel disorders. Heart disease is a leading occupational disease of business executives. It drains business of brain

power, training and leadership. The term "heart disease" covers a broad variety of different diseases.

Most of these diseases are unrelated. But all involve the circulation including the heart and blood vessels.

The three most important forms together account for about 90 per cent of all neart disease. They are rheumatic heart disease, which is caused by rheumatic fever; coronary heart disease, caused by hardening and narrowing of the coronary arteries (arteriosclerosis); and hypertensive heart disease, resulting from high blood pressure (hypertension).

Congential malformations of the heart, present at birth, are estimated to account for about two per cent of all heart disease,

Syphilitic cariovascular disease, which appears as a late result of syphilis, is now among the less frequent types.

Rheumatic fever frequently attacks the heart, resulting in rheumatic heart disease. It causes a large percentage of all heart disease at all ages and 90 per cent of heart disease in children.

Rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease are responsible for almost five times as many deaths as infantile paralysis, whooping cough, diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles and cerebrospinal meningitis combined.

It is estimated that more than 1,000,000 people in the United States today are suffering from rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease.

All may be bedlam down in the house and Senate on the second floor.

But at the stroke of 9 on each Wednesday morning, the nine members of the Supreme Court gather in their consultation room, march around the rotunda in the middle of the capitol and file into the courtroom in the north wing.

"Oyez, Oyez, the honorable supreme court of the State of Texas is now in session, pursuant to adjournment," cries the clerk at the

The court has been sitting in session in Austin since January 13, 1840, in the days of the Republic of Texas.

"There's been no break in continuity," said Chief Justice John E. Hickman. "New judges - they filter in, but the court goes right on. There's been no change in policy, and our policy is just trying to find out what the law is."

The chief justice and eight associate justices meet each Monday morning for consultation on applications for cases to be heard before their court. In a year's time they handle five to six hundred of these applications, known as writs of error, on appeal from a court of civil appeals. The court must decide whether it will grant a writ of error and hear the case.

Each Tuesday morning the court meets again to discuss opinions Each case is assigned to a Judge; He studies the case, sometimes for months, and then writes an opinion. This opinion is passed around to the other judges. If five of the nine members agree with the opinion, it is then ordered by the court

Each Wednesday morning the court asembles in its courtroom and announces its decisions. After that, it listens to oral arguments from lawyers on cases. Just lawyers - no witnesses - appear be-

The rest of the week is left for research and study.

"Here we have opinions that have been delivered on every question in the English-speaking world. They have been the balance rules of equity and justice through the

"Sometimes a ruleing works a hardship. But laws must be universal."

Once a case has been decided by the state Supreme court there is no appeal except in a case where a man believes that his rights of freedom under the Federal constitution have been deprived. Then he goes to the U. S. Supreme court.

"Very rarely has the United States Supreme Court reversed the state supreme court." Justice Hickman said. "I recall once in the past 15 years in the case of a labor organizer who did not have a certificate of permit under the state

The court of criminal appeals handles al criminal cases such as murder, rape and assault. The supreme court handles all else-personal injury, workman's compensation, land title, oil litigation,
