County SCS Soil Survey Explained

Over 100 Hear Land Specialists

Explanations of the Lamb County Soil Survey began in Littlefield Tuesday with over 100 persons attending the meeting held in the Community Center. Several area soil specialists and agronomists were on hand to explain the various phases outlined in the book which gives a complete breakdown of the soils throughout the county.

Thurlo Branscom of Pleasant Valley served as moderator and introduced the various speakers for the evening.

Billy Gunter, area agronomist from Lubbock, explained the soil survey stating it is "an inventory of the land resources showing the sands, loams, medium sands, etc."

"The survey shows the distribution of the soils on maps, making them easy to read and have meaning," he continued, "and with the soils in orders and groups."

"It took over two years to make this survey of Lamb County," Gunter said, "with 10 different men working to determine the texture, depth and type of soil."

"This survey is very important to farmers," Gunter explained, "as it will show the soil on each individual farm thus giving the producers a better understanding of the land." He also stated that about 80 per cent of the state has now been surveyed.

"We must learn how to make the best possible use of our land," Gunter continued, "because we now have eight acres of land for every person living in the United States, but this figure will rapidly reduce as the population expands." He said that in China today there is less than a quarter acre per person.

Acid Chemical Plant Begins Construction

Announcement was made this week that construction will begin Friday morning on a new chemical plant in Littlefield. Bill Carroll, owner of the plant, made the announcement.

Carroll said they will break ground on the 30 by 60 feet structure Friday morning at the plant site, the corner of Dillon and Cedar Streets in the northwest section of town. The plant will manufacture water well and oil well acid and will operate the year around. The plant will employ 12 to 15 men during the winter months and about 25 during the spring and summer, according to Carroll.

Carroll said they will hire Littlefield people for the operation of the plant. The plant is being moved here from Odessa. "We think we are bringing something new to Littlefield," Carroll stated, "That is, an industry that is not already here."

"We manufacture our own chemicals here in our plant," he added. Carroll said he had over 10 years in the chemical business. The new firm will operate under the name Carroll Chemical Company and will provide oil well service, well acid, chemical testing, paraffin sol, emul breaking, engineering service, custom compounding, pulling unit and water well service. Carroll is moving several families here with his operation.

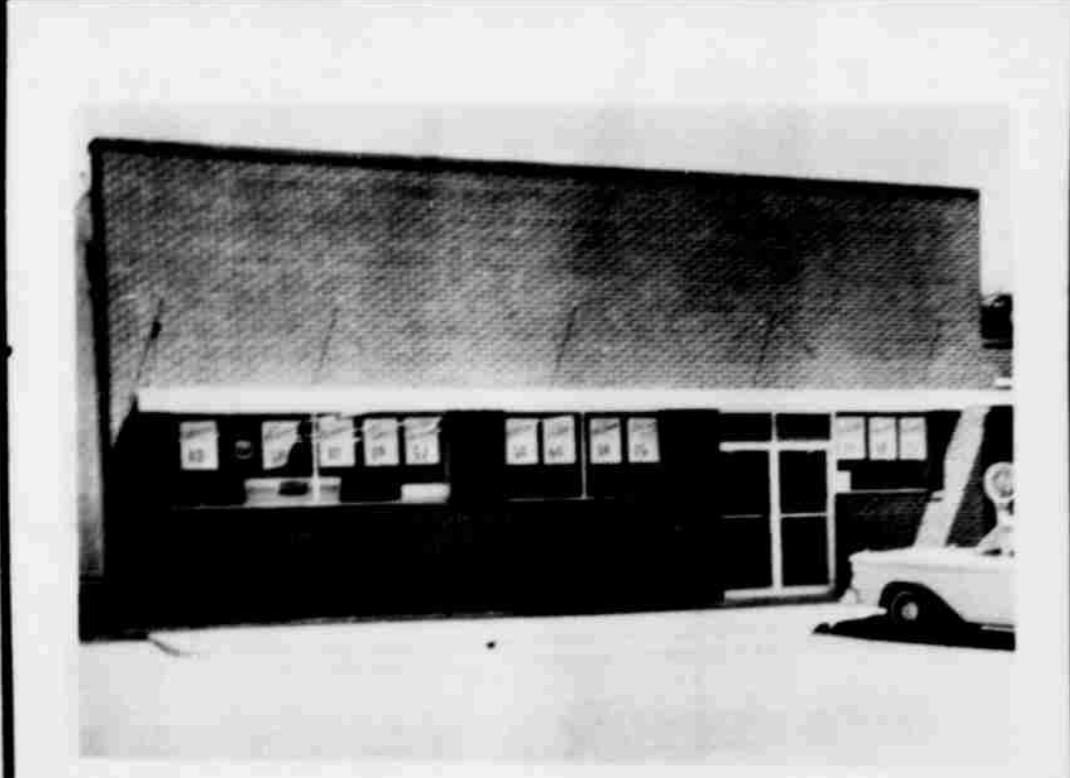

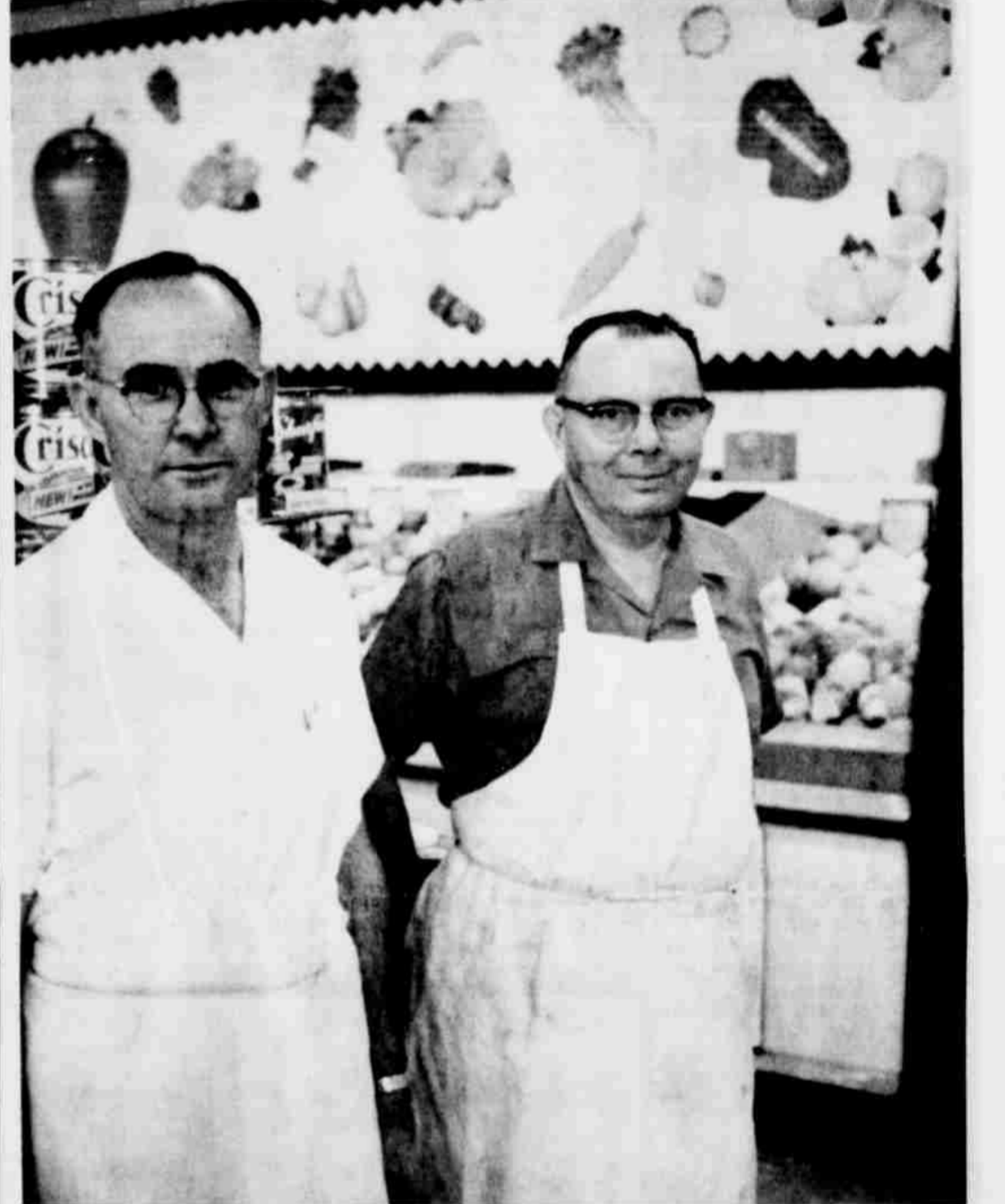

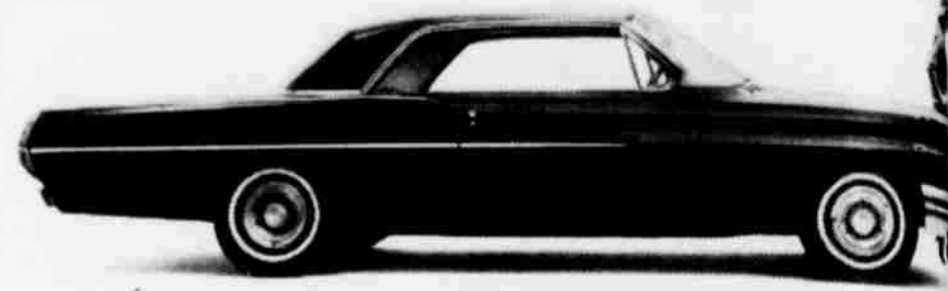

Is the country heading toward a recession or a boom in business

No one can foresee exactly what will happen. But people have money and are spending freely. The uncertainty of the economic trend seems to be a quick-acting tax cut is being advocated by many to bolster consumer purchasing power. 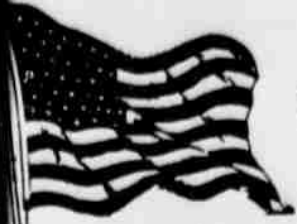

State Estimates 30 Will Die In Road During Labor Day

Senator Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official estimate that 30 persons will be killed in some 3,000 traffic crashes during the upcoming 72-hour Labor Day weekend.

"Because this holiday is so much a family affair, more people will be occupying cars. Thus any traffic accident might result in several casualties. This has been evidenced several times on Texas highways in recent weeks. During one seven-day period in August, three crashes claimed the lives of 20 persons."

"Drivers should remind themselves during the Labor Day weekend, and every time they drive, that the operation of a motor vehicle is a full-time job. \$637 Million Loaned By F. H. A. In Fiscal Year 1962

The Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture loaned farm families and other rural people a record \$637 million in fiscal 1962 which ended on June 30, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today.

The volume of loans, largest during any 12-month period in the agency's history, was 61 percent larger than the 1961 total of \$395.7 million, and 106 percent above the \$308.5 million loaned in 1960.

Nearly half of the total loaned during fiscal 1962 went for farm operating expenses, almost a third for the purchase, development, or enlargement of family farms, and about a sixth went for the construction and improvement of houses and service buildings on farms and in rural communities.

Approximately 205,000 families were using Farmers Home Administration credit for these and other purposes at the end of the fiscal year -- 12 percent more than the year before.

"The rise in the number and amount of loans," said Secretary Freeman, "reflects a continuing increase in operating expenses necessary to keep pace with today's modern farming methods. It also indicates the reduced returns from the sale of farm products which have many efficient farm owners hard pressed."

Secretary Freeman added, "I believe it is especially noteworthy that in spite of the enormously increased activity in its pending programs and management work with farm families, the Farmers Home Administration has scarcely increased its personnel at all."

Repayment by borrowers during the year totaled \$336 million in principal and interest. This compares with repayments of \$307 million last year and a similar amount in 1960. About 22,000 borrowers repaid their loans in full during fiscal 1962.

Of the \$637 million loaned by Farmers Home Administration last fiscal year, \$275,360,000 went to 74,741 farmers to buy equipment, livestock, fertilizer, pesticides, feed, tractor fuel, and other supplies for farm and home.

Ownership loans amounting to \$183,008,000 were made to 11,785 farm families to buy, develop, or enlarge their farms. Among these borrowers were

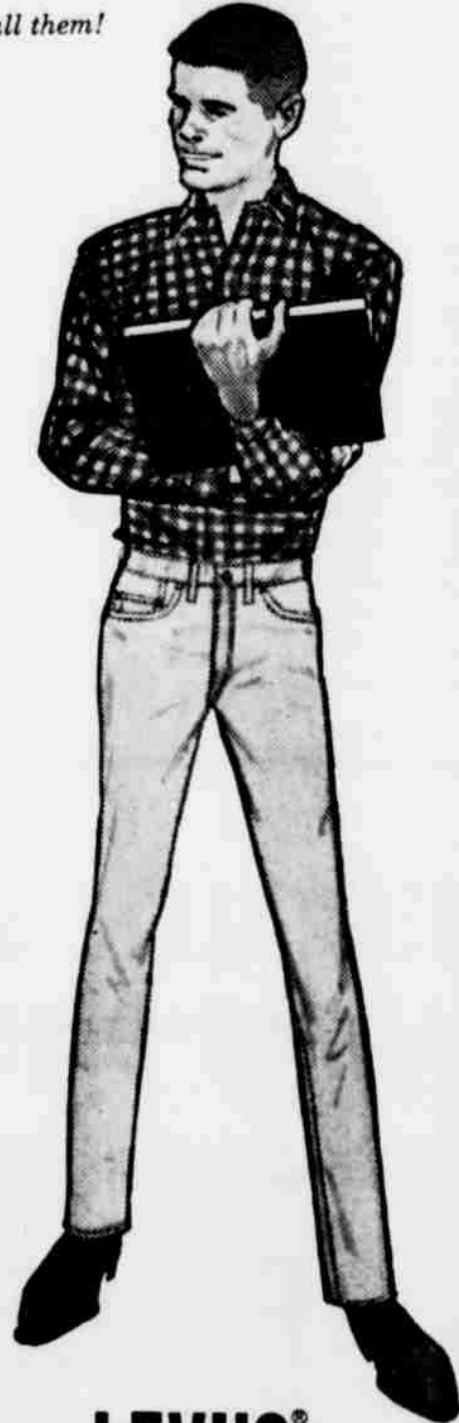
