PER FOOT COST OF PAVING NOW **GIVEN TO PUBLIC**

The preliminary work, looking toward the paving of Main street in Littlefield, is progressing nicely, according to the City Secretary. The Dozier Construction Co., who were awarded the paving contract, have filed their bond, amounting to 50 per cent of the total contract cost, with the Commission and it has been approved. The E. S. Rowe Abstract company has been engaged by the contractor to furnish property listing and abstracts along the line of proposed improve-

Figures submitted by the City's engineer show that the paving on Main street wil cost \$8.20 per linear foot, or a total of \$205.00 per 25 foot lot This amount will be paid in the following manner, intrest included: First payment on completion of work, \$34.17; the balance in five annual pay ments, drawing eight per cent interest a sfollows: 2nd year, \$44.50; 3rd year \$42.86; 4th year, \$39.63; 5th year, \$36.96. This will be an average cost of \$40.89 to the property owners, the city paving a like amount.

Since contract for paving Main street has been let, there has been consklerable interest manifest by property owners on other streets relative to the same kind of improvements. It is the general history of all towns, that when paving once starts it spreads. Citizens realizing the enhanced value of their property because of such improvements, also the value of added appearance, are generally desirous of having more of it.







The most hopeful sign today is that people are finding out that war not only costs them money and valuable lives, but destroys property and sets back business.

It would be a good thing if every boy and girl in the country were compelled to serve two years under the tutelage of army officers in constructing great public works, such as the Boulder Dam and the Mississippi Reclamation projects.

There is no objection to universal conscription if it is universal, and if it is not primarily for the purpose of fighting. These boys and girls would be potential soldiers in case we were ever attacked, but their employment upon constructive works would not be in the nature of a provocation of war to other nations.

Some way or other we must give up our arms and defer questions of international dispute to some other arbiter than crass nationalism.

One hopeful sign is that plans of peace are openly discussed in international councils. The late Pan-Ameri can Congress was full of peace talk. And peace-talking brings peace, just as war talk brings war. The uestion after all is one of public opinion and the sooner that public opinion is turned away from causes of war and toward the efforts of peace
