





Lawyers say that if judges and juries were not bound by aw and precedents -if I each awsuit the judge or juror couldset up a private stadard of rights and duties as a basis or deciding that case-no one would know in advance of the iecision how he should have acted in a particular situation, Cases arising out of similar circumstances would not be de-cided on settled principles but on the personal ideas of the

trial judge or juror. Because cases must be tried and determined on established and recognized public standards

the jurors in each case accept the law as the judge gives it to them. They are therefore required to base their verdict on his instructions as to the law, rather than on their own notions of what the law is, or ought to

For somewhat similar reasons there are rules governing the way a case is to be tried Nowadays we hear the term in court. These rules prescribe 'Government of Law' from what must be stated in the pleadings, in what order evito think that this phrase means dence must be presented, what just what it says and that it is evidence is proper, what form especially important to us as questions must take, in what order lawyers are permitted to Judges get the law by which argue, what is permissible and what is not permissible argu-

ment. If it were not for these rules no one could foresee what would happen during a lawsuit. It would be impossible to prepare properly for the trial. No one would know, until the judge had ruled, what he would be permitted to say or do, or in what order. Such a situation would inevitably result in confusion

and injustice. The whole purpose of laws and rules is to insure equal justice by providing a single stan-dard of rights and duties, ap-plicable to all persons similarly


